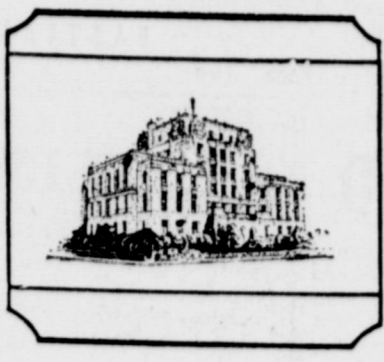

Navy Cross Awarded To Viet Victim, Sgt. Will Tyrone

PARRIS ISLAND, S. C. — The Navy Cross, the nation's second highest military decoration for heroism, was posthumously awarded to Staff Sergeant Willie D. Tyrone here December 3 for his bravery in Vietnam.

Accepting the medal was his wife, Mrs. Willie D. Tyrone, now residing at 2424 Vermont Ave, Savannah, Ga.

Staff Sergeant Tyrone served at Parris Island from 1957 to 1959 as a drill instructor.

The citation which accompanied the medal read: "The President of the United States takes pride in presenting the Navy Cross posthumously to Staff Sergeant Willie D. Tyrone, U. S. Marine Corps for service set forth in the following:

For extraordinary heroism as Assistant Advisor to the Vietnamese 39th Ranger Battalion while serving with the Advisory Team Seven of the U. S. Military Assistance Command, Vietnam on the night of 30-31 May 1965. When the battalion was subjected to and 57-mm recoilless rifle fire, Staff Sergeant Tyrone, with complete disregard for his own safety, moved about to point out targets and improve the position.

Although painfully wounded in the shoulder, he refused evacuation, and when the Battalion Commander and Battalion S-2 (Operations Officer) were also wounded and the Battalion Advisor killed, creating a critical command situation, Staff Sergeant Tyrone, in spite of his wound, assumed the advisory responsibility alone.

He maintained radio contact throughout the night and continually encouraged his comrades by his words and valiant example. When the Viet Cong launched a strong counter-attack early in the morning, he was mortally wounded, but continued to inspire his comrades by firing his weapon, killing at least an additional ten of the enemy before he died.

Staff Sergeant Tyrone's Firemen were called to Eddie's Texaco Service Station Friday at 1:20 a. m. to extinguish flames on the burning tire of a truck, according to the Fire Dept.

conspicuous bravery reflected great credit upon himself and the Marine Corps and were keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service. He gave his life in the cause of freedom."

The citation was signed by the Honorable Paul H. Nitze, Secretary of the Navy in behalf of the President of the United States.

Major General James M. Masters, Sr., Depot Commanding General, made the presentation during a regimental parade and awards ceremony.

Sgt. Tyrone was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Pete Tyrone of Carbon. He attended school in Nolan County and had been in the service about 16 years.

Billy McCollum, 19, Killed Friday In One Car Wreck

Billy Gayle McCollum, 19, son of Mr. and Mrs. Edgar McCollum of Eastland, was killed about 9 p. m. Friday night in a one-car accident on U. S. 183, 2.5 miles south of Cisco. Also injured in the accident was Steve Blair, 18, of Eastland.

According to a reliable source, McCollum's car failed to make a sharp curve and turned over.

Early Saturday morning the McCollum boy's body was at a Rising Star funeral home.

McCollum was a 1965 graduate of Eastland High School and was presently enrolled and attended Cisco Junior College in Cisco.

Cornelius Employees Given \$10,000 in Yule Bonuses

Over \$10,000 was given in Christmas bonuses Friday by Victor Cornelius to employees of his theatrical advertising and menu company in Eastland.

Receiving the bonuses were 55 employees, the largest number ever employed by the firm.

Payroll for the year will total an estimated \$260,000.

For the first time, receipts from menu sales have exceeded those of the theatrical advertising.

A new product of the company, an invention of Cornelius, called Rediclip, has also increased the volume of business. The clip of white vinyl plastic provides the restaurant owner with an at-

tractive method of attaching his daily items to his regular menu, and it provides advertisers with a point-of-purchase reminder of their product.

Bakeries, bottlers, and dairy products companies across the country have ordered the item in quantities of up to 150,000.

In supplying their customers, the firm brings approximately \$60,000 in post office receipts to the local post office, whose total yearly receipts are approximately \$100,000.

Excellent service from the Eastland Post Office personnel has helped enhance the firm's reputation for fast service.

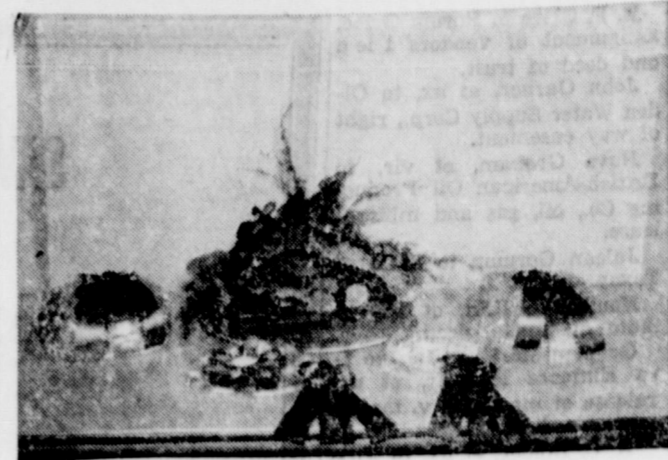

Farmers Home Administration-insured loan for \$130,000 has been given tentative approval for the development of the Morton Valley Water Supply Corporation which is to provide water for at least 91 families, it has been reported here.

The Morton Valley group was to have met Friday evening to begin drawing up their non-profit corporation papers.

westward along the Farm-to-Market road, serving quite a few other customers along the route. The line will probably extend westward to the Robert Kincaid property, west of Morton Valley.

Customers pay \$50 for a share in the non-profit corporation. Dewey Cox of Ranger is attorney for the corporation and Yeatts and Decker of Abilene are engineers.

Cost of the M-V project will be somewhat higher than the Olden project because of the some five miles of pipeline that will be required, it is reported. The corporation is expected to be finalized by mid-January and engineering surveys to determine how many customers, how much water and how much money will be needed, is expected to be completed by mid-February.

Right-of-Way easements are virtually all in for the Olden project, and bid opening will probably be in mid-January, with construction hoped to begin by mid-February. Originally, it had been guessed that some 75 customers could justify the Olden project, but over 130 have been signed up. Bill Hunter and Pat Mosley have been active in the Olden project. Olden will buy its water from the City of Eastland at a rate of cost plus ten per cent, and minimum water bills are expected to be from \$4.50 to \$5 it is reported.

The community water development and recreational projects are popping up all over the state. FHA-man Darrell Cooper reports, with the state offices covered with applications and loans in various stages of completion.


The loan is expected to be closed on the Lakewood Recreation center by Christmas and construction will probably begin immediately after the first of the year, he said.

Extensive development of the Cisco Park area is planned including the construction of a small train, club house, golf course, re-vamping of the swimming pool, cabins, boat docks, and other attractions as part of the master plan for the recreation center.

Revised '20' Plans Provide Eastland Frontage Roads, Two Interchanges

Only two minor objections were raised during a 40-minute public hearing in Eastland Friday at which time revised geometric designs of Interstate Highway 20 through Eastland County were explained by Texas Highway Department officials.

The 34 persons attending were generally receptive to the revised changes, with but questions raised as to re-loc-

ation of water service, and the transport of livestock.

Purpose of the hearing, according to Resident Engineer Tommy Magness, who presided, was to publicly explain the revisions, which have been incorporated into the design as the result of a delegation of Eastland residents' appearance before the Highway commission in July, requesting frontage roads and an interchange at Basset St. crossing.

The frontage roads have been granted, but the interchange was not, he explained. The segment in question is from 2.5 miles east of the East City Limits of Cisco, east to one mile of Eastland.

Only a short segment of frontage roads had been originally scheduled from the Int. 20-Highway 6 interchange, westward to some oil activity. Under the new design, frontage roads will extend from a point at the end of the old Base Line Road, eastward to the Highway 6 interchange, on eastward across the Basset St. extension (with no exits or entry to the main highway at this point) and terminate at the Leon River.

At the river point, southeast of Eastland, the frontage roads will loop, providing for a turning about, but not for crossing the river or getting onto the main highway. On the other side of the river, the frontage roads, coming westward from the big interchange (at the Harry Jordan location), will terminate with "turn-arounds" just short of the river, meaning that a driver can only turn around and return on the same road he came in on.

Virgil T. Seaberry Jr., chairman of Eastland's Chamber of Commerce Highway Committee, did get into the record that if traffic in the future should justify an interchange at the Basset St. intersection, that one could be obtained.

Other highway officials present included: R. P. (Buddy) Haun, Supervising Resident Engineer; District Engineer

E. M. Pritchard of Brownwood; E. L. Russell, construction engineer; Jack Kirby, right-of-way engineer; Don Johnson, area engineer for the Bureau of Public Roads, and his assistance Dick Hayes.

Eastland Mayor Frank Deaton thanked the Highway Department for its cooperation and said "We're satisfied" with the revised plans.

Acquisition of right-of-way for the six-mile western part of the segment will be completed in about three months it was said, with contract expected to be let in late spring, Pritchard said. (The western segment will extend to Highway 6, and the other section will go on to Old Highway 80, he said.)

Magness recalled the public hearings of Jan. 15, 1964, and Aug., 1967 in prefacing the Friday meeting in the County Courtroom. He also read a statement relative to the re-location of homes and individuals because of the highway's route, and urged that affected persons contact the re-location department in the Brownwood office.

There will be but two points at which traffic can get onto or off Int. 20 reasonably near Eastland — at the Highway 6 and Harry Jordan interchanges (east of town). There will be an interchange at the Pleasant Mound intersection between Cisco and Eastland.

Winston Boles and B. T. Moser raised questions about re-location of water supply and Mrs. C. M. Pogue asked about moving of livestock, all were told that such points would be worked out in individual right-of-way negotiations.

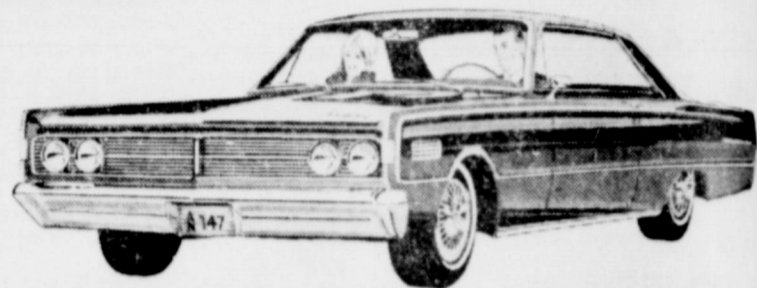
