> Mrs. Melvin E. Harvick, who was also to have appeared in court Friday for arraignment in connection with the shooting of her husband, failed to appear, but Judge Sparks set her trial date for the 24th also, and said arraignment will be held as soon as Mrs. Harvick returns from a visit.

District Attorney Perry T Brown said Friday that he will not seek the death penalty for Allen, who is indicted for the murder of his nephew, Dr. Albert F. Reidel Jr., 37, on Allen's Ranch south of Ranger on Sunday, Nov. 7. Mr. Allen pleaded "Not guilty" at free on bond.

Mrs. Harvick is represented by Eastland Attorney Earl Conner Jr., and she is also free on bond.






