Case loads in two of the four programs, for the years 1963 and 1965 showed an increase in the number of families with dependent children that required aid. That increase was \$25,258 to \$37,500.

Also there was an increase in the aid given for the needy olind from \$14,025 to \$25,263. While there was a drop in the number of people who receiv ed old-age assistance of \$994, 135 to \$993,624 and also a derease in the aid to the per manently and totaly disabled of \$26,177 to \$25,263.

The State Department of Public Welfare said much of the decrease was due to the transfer of those who were elgible under the Old Age Assistance program and the could benefit greater by be





Items having foam rubber backing or padding can be fire hazards. Potential threat are the padded knees of children's crawlers and the foam rubber backs of many skidproof rugs.

It's best to air dry these items since the foam may build up heat in the dryer and catch on fire if left at a high temperature for a long period of

> The type of fabric will determine the best way to remove a fruit stain.

If you are not sure whether or not the fabric can withstand boiling water, sponge immediately with cool water. Then apply a glycerine or soapless shampoo and rinse. Do not use soap, as this will set the stain.

If the stain remains after the shampoo treatment, use a chlorine or peroxygen bleach. Be sure to test the effect of bleaches on a seam that doesn't show or on a sample of the fabric before using the bleach on the stain.

If the fabric will withstand boiling water, pour it through the fabric while the stain is still fresh. If the stain is allowed to dry or set, it will be much more difficult to re-
