Saturday Is Election Day

(An Editorial)

The residents of this county will have an opportunity Saturday to express themselves at the ballot boxes as they go to the polls in the First Democratic Primary Election. They will select the nominees of the Democratic Party for offices from the precinct to the district and state levels.

Voting in all elections is, of course, one of the obligations of good citizenship.

In making some recommendations concerning the election, it is not our purpose to try to tell you how to vote. Rather, we seek to call your attention to things that you might want to consider when you cast your ballot. In this light, we offer these thoughts for your consideration in some of the races:

STATE SENATOR — Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells was elected to the State Senate from the 22nd District in 1961 and has advanced to 11th place in seniority. He is serving as chairman of several important committees. He is a graduate of the University of Texas law school, is a military veteran, served as a county attorney eight years, and has done an outstanding job during his five years in the Senate. The new 22nd district includes half of Tarrant County. Senator Creighton has pledged that he will give that part of the district the same fine representation that he has been giving the small towns and less populated counties. He is a young man "going places." Let's give him a big vote.

FOR CONGRESS — The 17th District has a very able representative in the Honorable Omar Burleson. He took a heritage rooted deep in the soil of West Texas to Washington with him 20 years ago, and he still stands for the same high ideals and standards. His actions in the Congress over the years have reflected the feelings of a vast majority of his constituents. We need his strong voice in Washington to stand guard over the rights of the people and the states to fight against pressure groups.

FOR GOVERNOR — John Connally has done an outstanding job and deserves a big vote as an expression of appreciation.

FOR LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR — Preston Smith has demonstrated ability in handling the duties of this office and merits re-election.

FOR RAILROAD COMMISSIONER — Since his appointment to fill a vacancy years ago, Byron Tunnell has shown that he is a man of ability. He has the background as a lawyer, a legislator and as a member of the Railroad Commission, and he has earned election to a full term of office.

The following Saturday, May 14, the County Convention will begin at 2 p.m. in the District Courtroom, Court House, at which time delegates will be named for the state convention, Bailey said.

Regardless of how you vote, we would like to urge you to take the time Saturday to visit the polls and cast your ballot.

125 Vote Absentee

Only 125 persons voted absentee for Saturday's Primary election the county clerk's office has reported.

This figure is down from corresponding past election years.

Absentee voting ended at 5 p.m. Tuesday, and that number had either come in in person to vote, or made application to vote by mail. Those who have been sent ballots through the mail, must have them back to the clerk's office by noon Saturday to be eligible, he said.

By town, absentee voting was: Eastland, 52; Ranger, 10; Gorman, 21; Carbon, 4; Desdemona, 3; Kokomo, 2; Rising Star, 2; and Cisco, 22.

Dozen Precincts To Handle Votes

Approximately 5,000 voters are expected to turn out Saturday for the Democratic Primary election in Eastland County. Polls will open from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. in a dozen precincts and, if the weather remains dry and fair, the 5,000 figure was forecast.

County administrative posts and state and national representative races appeared to be the key questions to be decided in the Saturday voting.

The County Commissioners Court could be re-organized with the county judge and two commissioner positions up for election. Eastland Countians will also help decide on a state representative and senator and a United States Congressman when they mark their ballots.

The county Republicans are not holding a primary, and nomination in the Democratic primary traditionally means the victor for an office in the general election in November.

It was presently estimated that there are from 8,500 to 9,000 qualified voters in Eastland County.

Key race on a county-wide basis is that which pits Incumbent Scott Bailey and John Hart for the county judge's office. Cisco precinct voters will also decide between Incumbent C. B. Dill and Charlie Pence for the commissioners post from Precinct Four, and in the Gorman-Carbon-Desdemona precinct voters will decide between Incumbent Glenn Justice and Dick Foster.

Eyed with a great deal of interest will be the state representative's race to elect a successor to Wayne Gibbens. In the race are Saul Pullman of Eastland, Pat McGough of Cisco, Burke Musgrove of Breckenridge and John Musseiman of Albany. There are five counties in District 63.

The county will probably give strong endorsement to Sen. Tom Creighton who is opposed by Vernon (Gene) Smith of Fort Worth, in view of support given the Mineral Wells senator in the past few years.

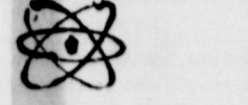
The U.S. congressional race which pits Cong. Omar Burleson and Abilene Attorney Eldon Mahon will come in for close observation, too, as the two vie for the 17th District representative's seat. Eastland was the site in March for an appreciation banquet for Cong. Burleson, indicating that the 20-year congressional veteran will carry the county. There are 23 other counties in the district.

Most county and precinct officials whose terms expire this year are uncontested. Contested state-wide races include those for governor, lieutenant governor, U.S. Senator, attorney general, commissioner of general land office, railroad commissioner, & court of criminal appeals.

Safeway Celebrating 10th Anniversary

The grand opening was held in December of that year and the Eastland store is celebrating its 10th anniversary beginning with Mr. C. P. Jenkins as the first store manager. Mr. Bernis Copland, present manager, has announced that special Anniversary sav-

ings will be featured throughout the store in observance of the event.

Safeway Stores, Incorporated came into being on March 24, 1926 — yet the company's history dates back to 1915. The man who deservedly rates as the founder of this company is Marion Barton Skaggs.

In American Falls, Idaho, S. M. Skaggs decided to open a food store, different from any others. Observing strict economy, reducing operating costs and waste, and encouraging customers to pay cash, he opened his first store and the predecessor of all Safeway stores. Skaggs got a loan, rented a lot, and built his dream-store.

In 1926, a group foreseeing the tremendous potential that lay in the relatively new concept of chain store operation, took over the "Sam Seelig" food store and renamed the new firm Safeway Stores. The principals in these negotiations included Charles E. Merrill, W. R. H. Weldon and E. M. Selby.

The result of greater interest was a corporation formed on March 24, 1926, in Baltimore, Maryland, Safeway Stores, Incorporated.

Three months after the formation of Safeway Stores, incorporated — on July 1, 1926 — M. B. Skaggs linked his chain of 428 stores to the Safeway enterprise. The lifeline of Safeway actually stems from the time M. B. Skaggs assumed control on July 1, 1926, and through him there is a direct line of descent from that first store in Idaho. Obviously the name of Safeway goes back to 1926, but, the principles and the creative-ness that have spurred the business from the very beginning took seed 51 years ago.

Within the industry, Safeway has pioneered in many developments — first to institute "self-service," first in pricing fruits and vegetables by the pound for easier shopping comparison; first to conduct special merchandising campaigns to provide sales relief for farm and livestock production; first in the food business with "buy-build-sell-lease" real estate program to reduce capitalization costs; first to use farm tank-to-tank truck in haul of milk from dairies for sanitary handling economy; and first to establish guaranteed meat trim programs and retailer-owned cutting and aging facilities.

In April, 1934, the Board of Directors elected Ligan Warren as President and he served for 21 years. In 1955, Warren retired and was succeeded by Milton L. Selby who had joined the company in 1926. This was a period of reorganization, with Robert A. Mogowan taking over as Chairman of the Board. In 1957 Robert Mogowan assumed the responsibilities of President and Chairman of the Board with Mr. Selby remaining active with Safeway as a member of the board of directors and executive committee.

Today the "Safeway Family" encompasses 70,000 people in over 2,100 stores in 27 of the United States, 5 Canadian Provinces, 23 stores in England, 3 in Scotland, 5 in West Germany, 11 in Australia and heading toward greater heights in the food retailing business.

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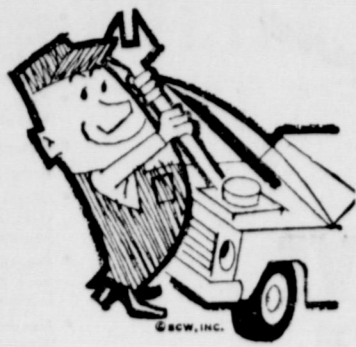

Book About Pioneer Preacher produced By Area Publisher

NWOOD — A rare book has been reproduced in a facsimile by the Cross Timbers Press here. The book is "Twenty-five Years in the Outside Row," a biography of Peter W. Gravis, a pioneer Methodist preacher.

It was printed in the "Exponent Steam Press" at Comanche. History of only three copies of the original book still exist and two of these are in private hands.

The book not only tells the story of Gravis' life as a front-

ier preacher, but gives many interesting sidelights into historical events in Central Texas and the Panhandle, beginning in 1859. Gravis literally rode or walked to his appointments with a pistol in one hand and his Bible in the other. He had several narrow escapes from the savage Indians and suffered many other hardships.

Gravis also tells his experiences as a Confederate soldier, participating in several battles, and later as a chaplain with the Frontier Army at Camp Colorado.

**Abandonment M-K-T
Railway In Area Seen**

The M-K-T Railroad has re-activated a request with the Interstate Commerce Commission to discontinue operating the 220-mile segment of the line from Waco to Stamford through Eastland County, according to information here Friday.

John W. Barriger, president of M-K-T, announced last week that the Katy would seek to carry out the abandonment to the three lines crossment proceedings that it with-

draw for one year in April of 1965. Mr. Barriger's statement, in part, follows:

After study of the 1965 financial result of operations, it has been decided to re-activate the abandonment proceedings relating to a 220-mile segment of our line, originally built by and still locally known as the Texas Central Railway, from a point six miles west of Waco to Stamford.

"M-K-T, however, will continue to operate the western end of this branch beyond Stamford in order to continue to serve a large gypsum plant at Hamlin and another at Rotan, the terminus of the line. These two stations produce sufficient traffic to support his 42 mile segment of the line and its operation of trains over trackage rights have been secured from the Fort Worth & Denver Railway for a distance of 114 miles from Stamford to a connection at Wichita Falls with M-K-T's line into Denison.

"While abandonment proceedings are pending before the ICC, the Katy will make ing this route (Fort Worth & Denver at Stamford, T&P at Cisco, and Santa Fe at Dublin and Morgan) that any sections of this prospectively discontinued M-K-T trackage that any one of them may wish to acquire will be for sale to them."

It was understood here last year that the T&P might be interested in acquiring the line from Cisco to Hamlin. Since the Katy plans to continue serving the Hamlin and Rotan plants via Wichita Falls, however, it appeared doubtful that T&P would still want the spur.

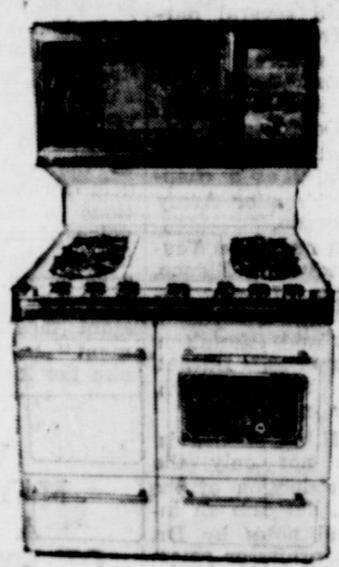
City officials have expressed an interest in a quiring the M-K-T right-of-way north past Lake Bernie and Lake Cisco. This right-of-way would be turned into a road, possibly a farm - to - market highway, to serve new cabin site areas on the north and west sides of Lake Cisco.

Texas Highway Department officials have been awaiting word on what will happen to the M-K-T line southeast of Cisco to determine their needs for Interstate 20 crossings, it was reported.

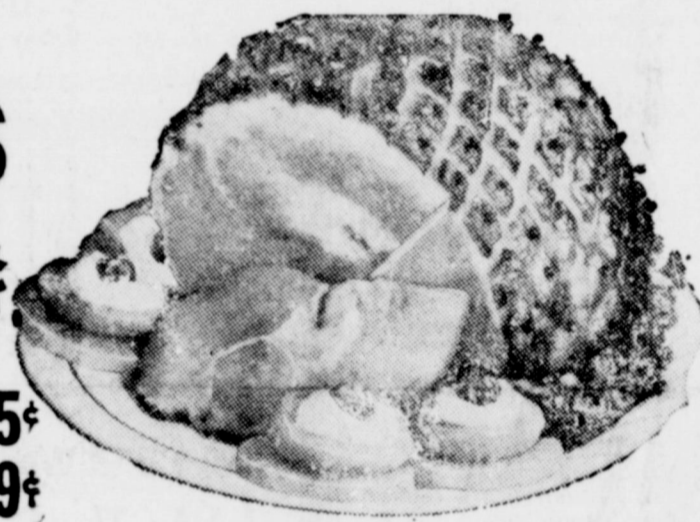

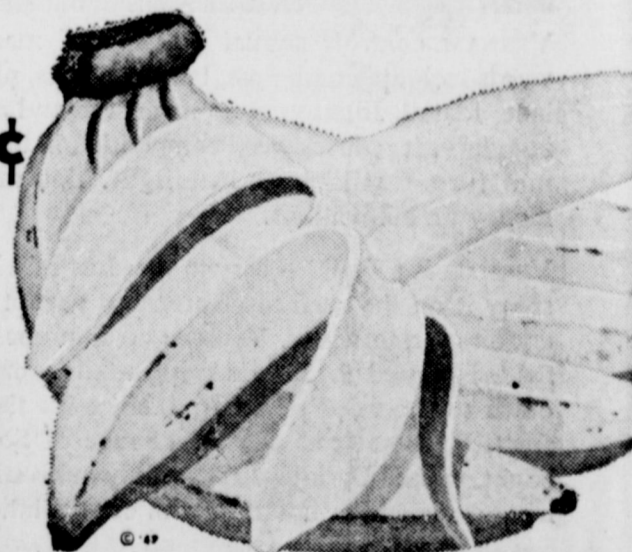
