County Jaycee Chapters Develop Program To Benefit Young People

A program to stimulate physical training and interest of young people of Eastland County was undertaken by the Junior Chamber of Commerce chapters of Cisco, Eastland and Ranger at a joint meeting in Cisco last Thursday night.

After hearing an address by Tiny Dozier of Mineral Wells, state Jaycee director for Area 3-C, on the need of working with young people, particularly in the physical training field, the Jaycees went to work on their program. The meeting attracted a good

crowd at the Corral Room of the Victor Hotel. Dinner was served to open the meeting.

Dozier, well known for his civic work in Mineral Wells, told the Jaycees that "you can find no greater reward in community work than in working with young people — our leaders of tomorrow."

The county program includes a track and field meet to be held in Ranger in May, a tennis tournament in Eastland, and a golf tournament in Cisco. Dates for the three events will be announced in the near future. Each event

will be open to area young people. The program will include events of interest for young people, ages 9 to 18.

The parade was led by the Eastland Police Chief Ray Laney and followed by the Eastland Fire Department Trucks. The Ranger High School Band provided the streets of Eastland with the first strains of music.

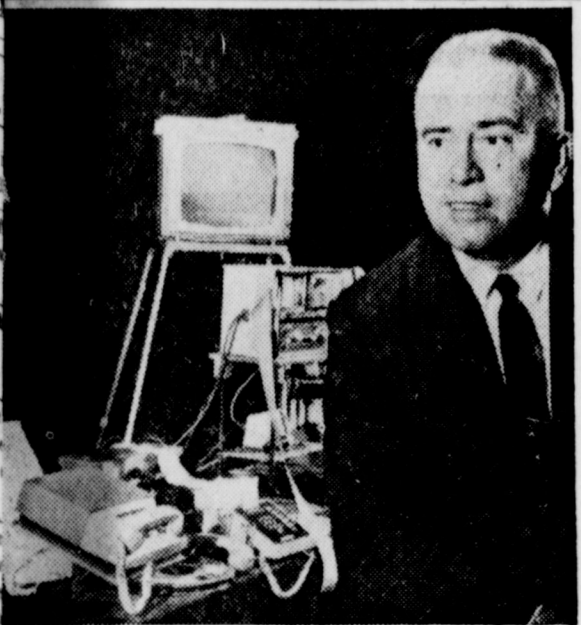

The audience will have a chance to participate in some of the latest communication processes as Scott reveals developments that will have an increasing effect on the lives of area residents.
