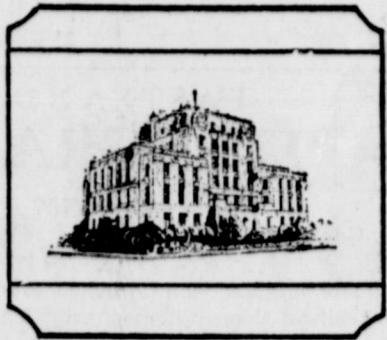

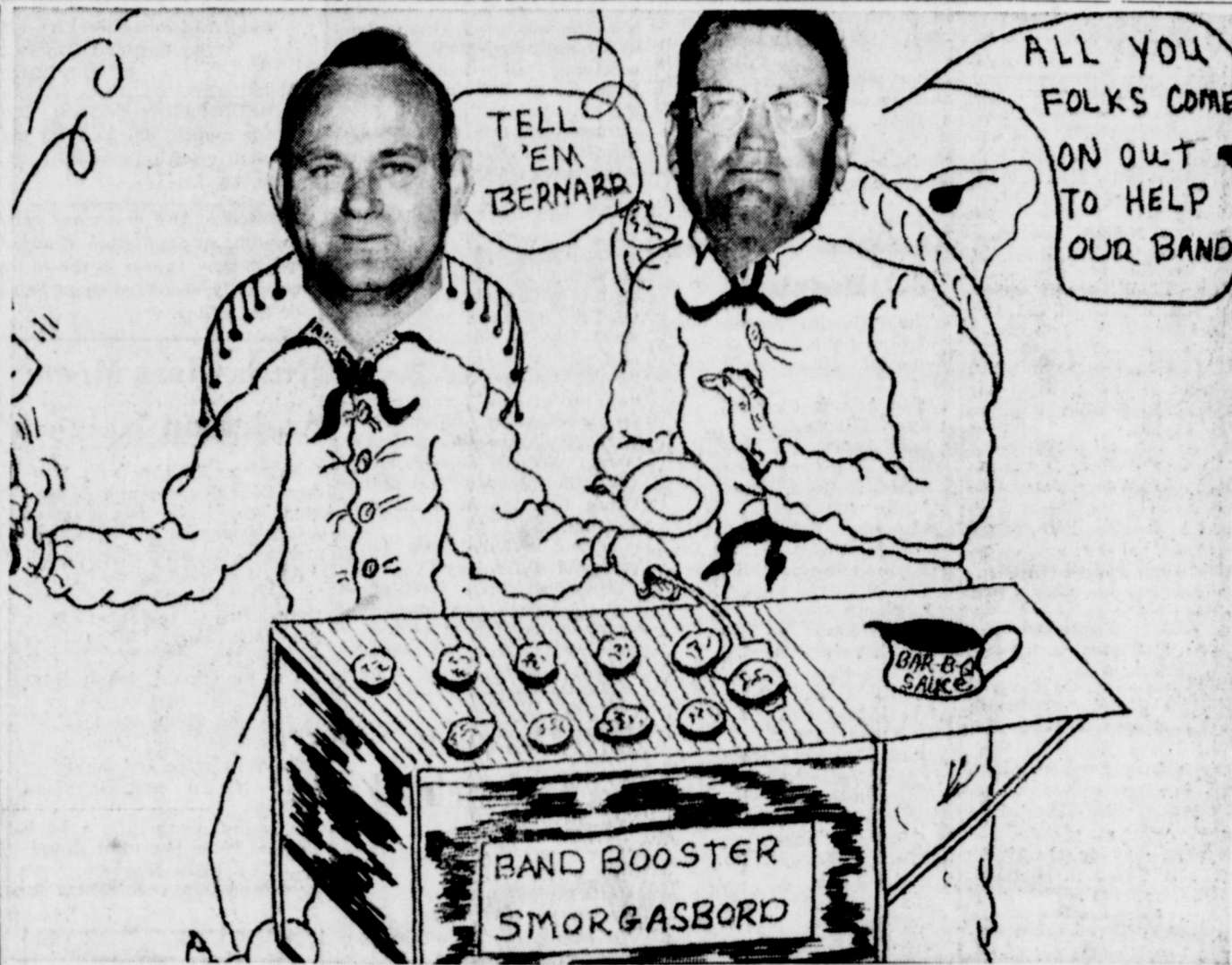

Bailey, Dill, Foster Win; County Goes For Pullman

Only 4,472 Eastland County voters of a possible 6,000 turned out Saturday to renominate County Judge Scott Bailey and favor Cong. Omar Burleson and local man Saul Pullman in their district races in the first Democratic primary.

Bailey polled 2,922 votes to win the Democratic nomination for another term as county judge, easily outdistancing John Hart, who had 1,517 votes. Hart of Eastland led Bailey of Cisco by only four votes in Eastland (485-481) and out-pollled the incumbent (62-46) in absentee voting. Judge Bailey lead handily in all of the other boxes.

The county voted for Pullman but saw their candidate lose out to Burke Musgrove, 25, of Breckenridge, who got 5,068, and John E. Musselman, 24, of Albany, who got 2,224, who got into a runoff race for the June 4 nomination. Pat McGough of Cisco got 1,231 votes in the five-county state legislative race. Musgrove carried Palo Pinto and Stephens counties, while Musselman commanded Callahan and Shackelford counties.

Mrs. J. L. Kuhn, 63, died at her home in Olden Sunday morning following a short illness.

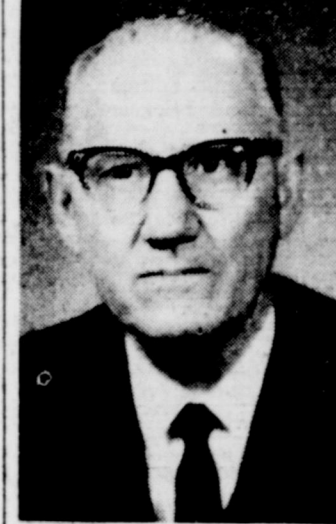
Funeral services were conducted at 10 a.m. Tuesday in First Baptist Church, Olden with the pastor, Rev. Bob Farrell officiating.

Lt. Thompson In Attack Group

This was the first Marine unit ever to be assigned full-time to NORAD. At Key West, VMFA-531 stood ready on the "hot pad," where four Phantom jets were poised 24 hours a day, ready for a scramble alert.

Teamwork between pilots and crews enabled the squadron to launch its aircraft in 150 seconds after the alert siren sounded.

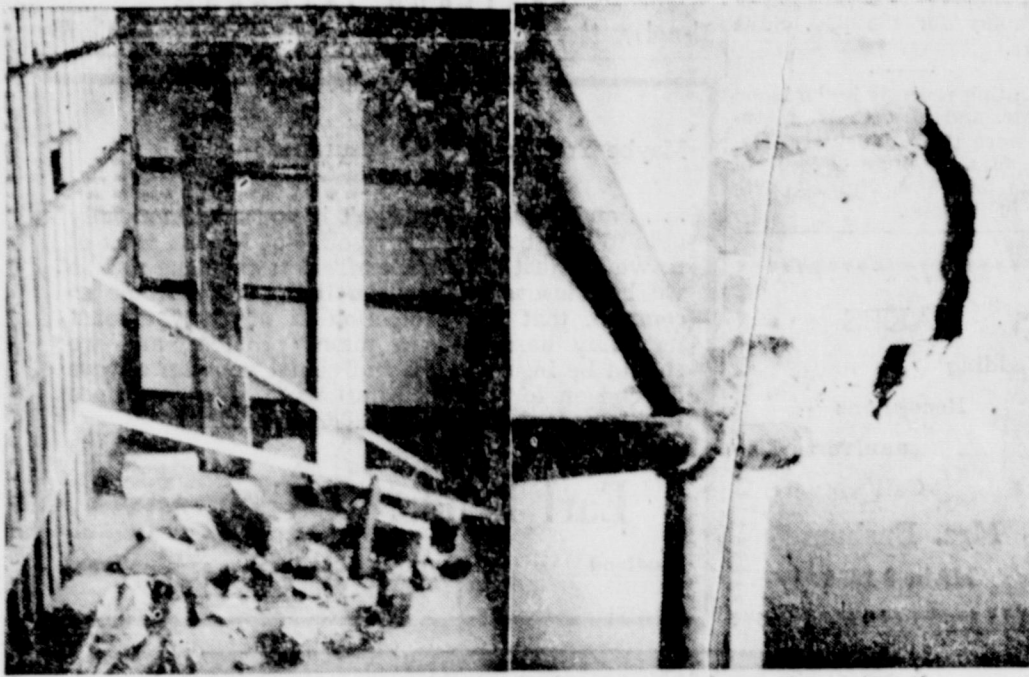

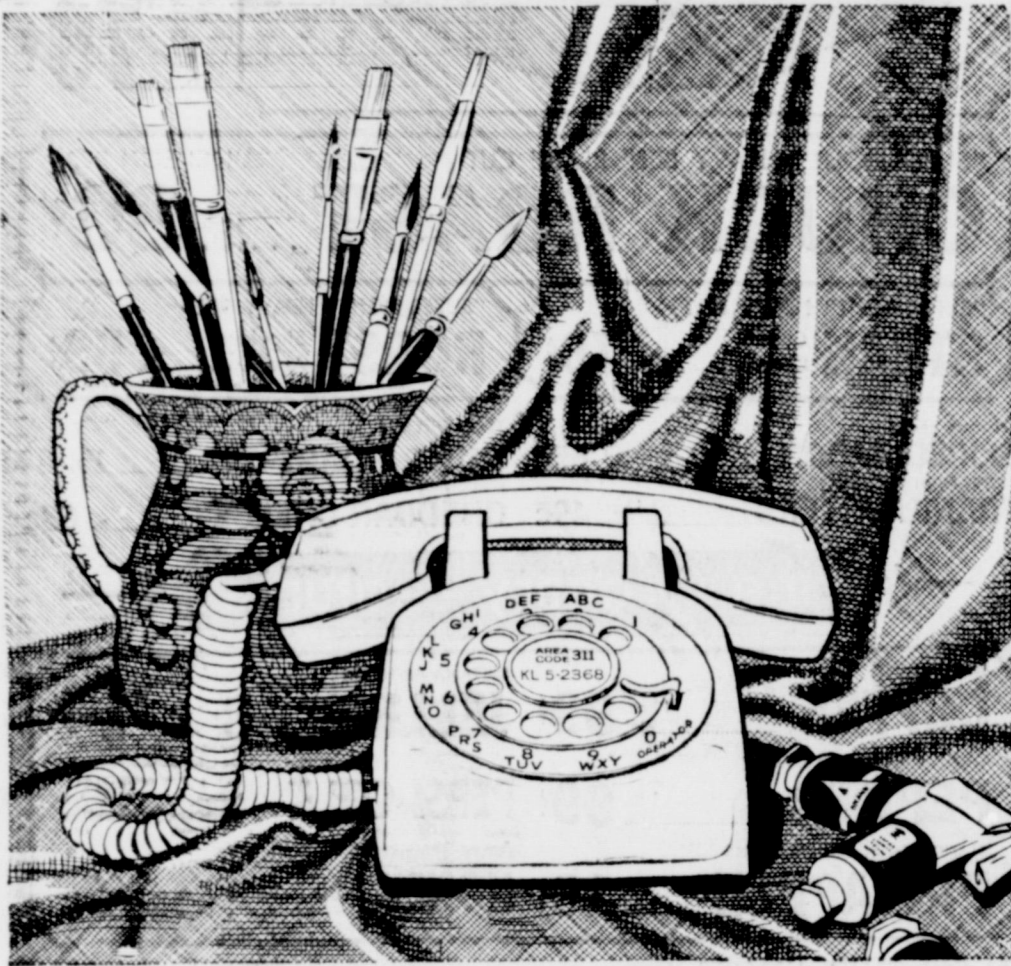

Photos, taken by Jailer John Shook shows, at left, the debris used and taken from a hole in the upper level of the north wall. Circled is a window weight apparently used as a ramrod, and the boards are those taken from windows. At right is the actual hole closeup — some 12 inches deep into the 16-inch wall. The work was done, Shook reports, during the time he was away from the jail assisting as a field deputy, and while his wife was alone at the jail in charge of prisoners. At the time of the attempted breakout there were some ten persons in the jail and the inmates carefully cleaned up the area, putting the broken plaster and bricks on top of the upper "tank" and pasting white paper over the hole, to prevent detection. Mrs. Shook, who spends many hours a week at the jail while Shook is out, said that she repeatedly heard a "tap-tap" but would not go into the tank area alone, although she does have to feed the prisoners through a trap-door daily.

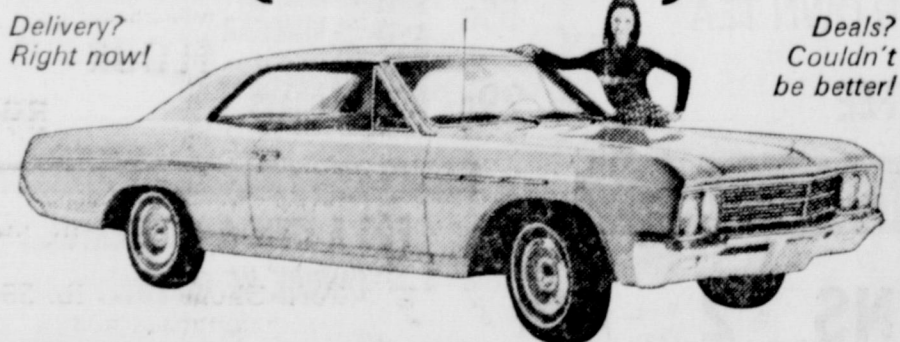

SAC's Mission Outlined During Rotary Meeting

SAC's recipe for peace was outlined for Rotarians at their regular luncheon meeting Monday as Lt. Col. John R. Spalding Jr. of Dyess AFB spoke and showed a film.

Col. Spalding, commander of the 337th Bombardment Squadron at Dyess, explained the Strategic Air Command's reliance on the manned bomber as a deterrent, as opposed to the "missiles alone" attitude.

As commander of a B-52 wing, Col. Spalding pointed out that the manned bomber can "be called back" if necessary, and men have the ability to make corrections in targets, missions and technical malfunctions whereas missiles do not.

"Missiles and manned bombers are the perfect recipe for peace," he outlined. The film portrayed B-52 duty during a regular 24-hour air alert and a simulated all-out alert, in which all segments, bombers, fighters and missiles are on a "go" basis — unless called back.

Henry Pullman was program chairman and introduced the Air Force veteran pilot.

Burleson lead Mahon in 23 of the 24 counties in the 17th district with Glasscock giving Mahon 78 and Burleson 77, and the veteran congressman even carried Mahon's native county of Mitchell. Unofficial statewide returns showed Gov. Connally with 716,924 and his closest opponent only 214,256; Preston Smith for lieutenant governor had 697,498, his opponent, 162,492.
