

state, Fisher said. The symposiums bring together students, teachers and outstanding scientists for discussions dealing with basic nuclear science and for educational guidance in this field, it was pointed out.

The foundation is supporting a major research effort aimed at controlling nuclear fusion reactions for peaceful purposes, such as the generation of electric power. The research is being done at the General Atomic laboratory in San Diego and at the University of Texas and Texas A&M University.
