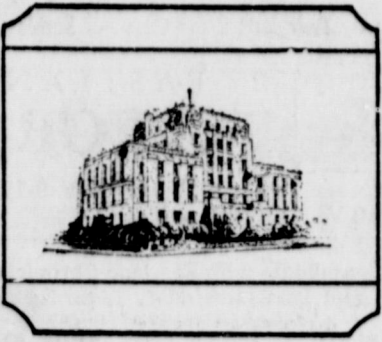

Eastland Lions Club will conduct its annual Light Bulb Sale Tuesday evening, in cooperation with the city-wide Clean-Up program, it has been announced.

The sale will provide householders with a variety of 60-watt bulbs. This assortment has been found to be the most needed and local residents will not only stock-up on their needed bulb supply but also be helping the local club with its worthwhile civic projects.

Sales Chairmen Bill Leslie and Bill Walters are reminding citizens of the club's activities which include support of the Lions' Crippled Children's Camp at Kerrville, purchasing of glasses for local and other projects, (so far this year, the club has purchased a dozen pair of glasses for as many local youngsters, as a continuing program of sight conservation.)

The sales chairmen remind too that citizens can assist the sales by being home, with porch lights burning as the Lions come to offer the bulb assortment.

The club also has another major project in the planning stage, with plans to be announced soon, for a teacher appreciation dinner to be held in May, at which all local public school faculty members will be honored. Proceeds from the sale will go toward this event too.

The entire membership of the Lions Club here will be organized to supply friends and neighbors with light bulbs delivered right to their doors in the handy Project-Paks.

Funeral arrangements were through Arrington Funeral Home.

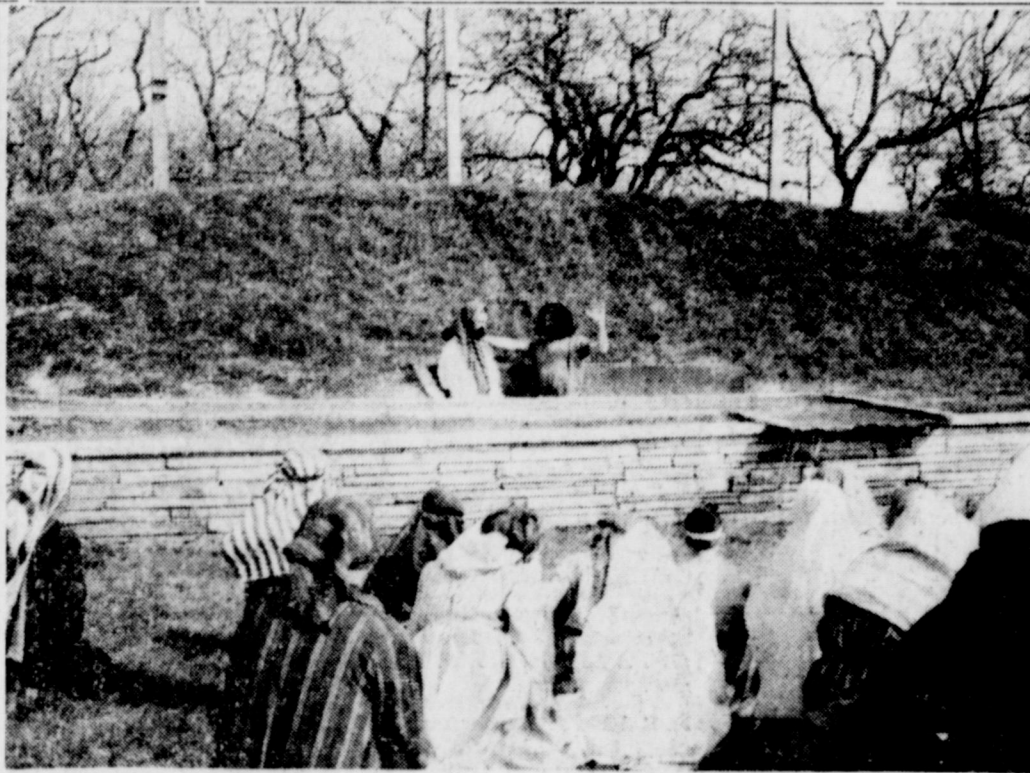

## Olden Water Supply System Due To Be Completed By End Of Month

Barring unforeseen difficulties, Olden residents will have their own water system by the end of April, according to announcement of Pahnandle Construction Company of Lubbock, contractors for the project.

This marks the climax of a dream of progressive citizens who began, late in 1964, to make a dream come true.

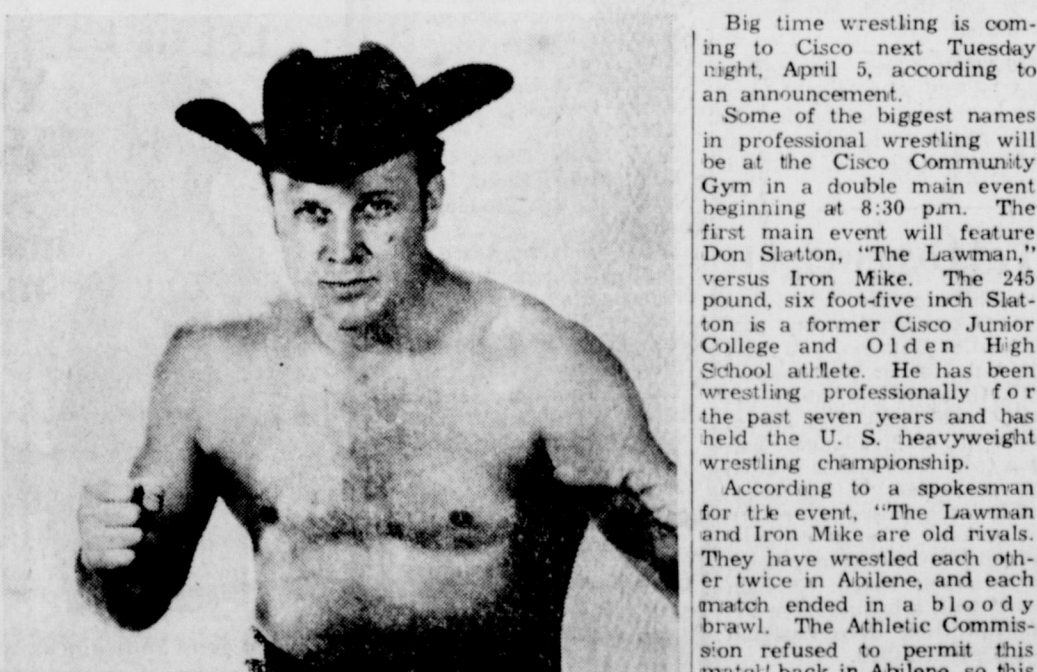
The original incorporators were Charles (Pat) Moseley, Danny Woods, Lee Williamson, Bill Hunter, Gilbert Copeland, Travis Hilliard, and Gene C. Woods. Dewey Cox is attorney.

Olden Water Supply Corp., a non-profit organization, financed the down payment for the project through sale of \$50 membership fees to 230 members. Indebtedness will be liquidated through the sale of water furnished by Eastland Water Supply District. The 30 year loan is with Farmers Home Administration.

The corporation received its charter from the Secretary of State on May 14, 1965.

## Pro Wrestling Matches In Cisco Tuesday Night Feature Big Names



Big time wrestling is coming to Cisco next Tuesday night, April 5, according to an announcement.

Some of the biggest names in professional wrestling will be at the Cisco Community Gym in a double main event beginning at 8:30 p. m. The first main event will feature Don Slatton, "The Lawman," versus Iron Mike. The 245 pound, six foot-five inch Slatton is a former Cisco Junior College and Olden High School athlete. He has been wrestling professionally for the past seven years and has held the U. S. heavyweight wrestling championship.

According to a spokesman for the event, "The Lawman and Iron Mike are old rivals. They have wrestled each other twice in Abilene, and each match ended in a bloody brawl. The Athletic Commission refused to permit this match back in Abilene, so this is the reason we are holding it in Cisco."

Iron Mike is rated number five in the world rating. He is six feet and weighs 255 pounds and is considered one of the roughest men in wrestling today. He is a graduate of the University of Texas.

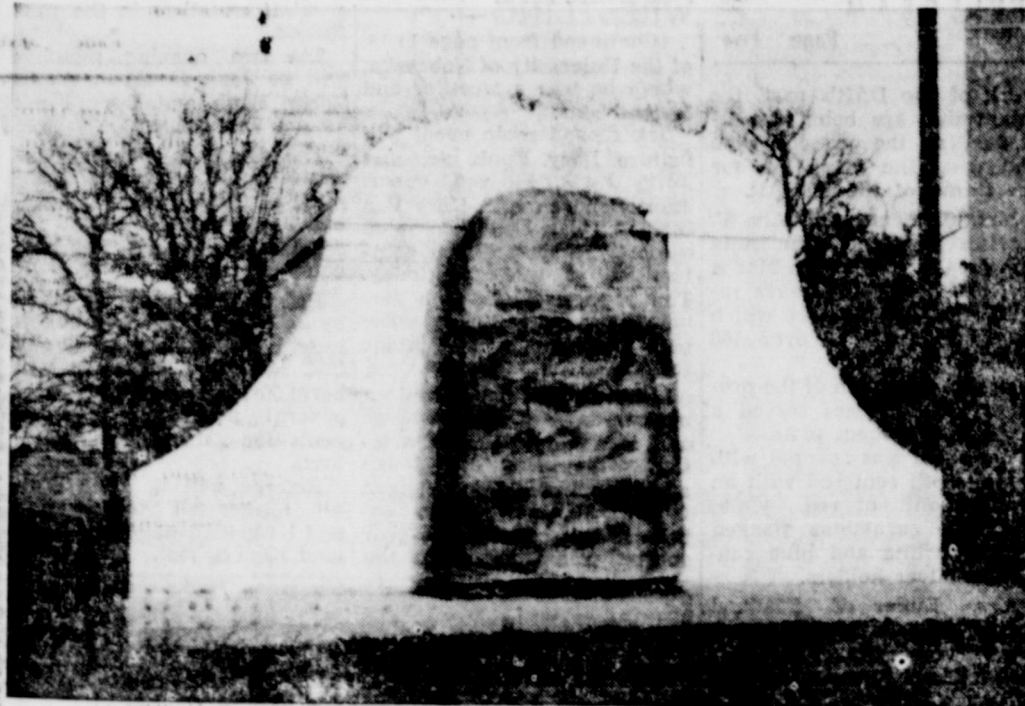

BOAT OPERATORS ADVISED ABOUT NEW REQUIREMENTS

Boat riding and fishing smaller than 14 feet in length are rapidly approaching; thus, water recreationists are being advised that all motor boats must be officially numbered, it has been announced by Maurice Dry, game warden.

Owners of motor boats

and college students. Many of the stations — Texaco, Shell, Mobil, and Standard — will relocate near the new highway to bring their business back up to where it was before the highway bypassed them.

Baird — The highway left its mark upon this small town. While the main traffic was passing through the main route, its business was thriving. Then the highway was bypassed, and the cafes and stations were affected the most. Their sales dropped around an estimated 50 per cent. Plans are being made for new business around and along the new highway to restore the lost income to the small town.

Abilene — When it was announced that Interstate 20 was to bypass Abilene, everybody felt that it would affect the hotel, motel, and station business. As time went on, the hotel and motel business was not affected more than 5 per cent, and the service station business not more than 10 per cent. The highway has opened up a complete new commercial area which has meant a considerable increase in tax income to this city and has brought in several new businesses.

Merkel — The stations and cafes were the only businesses that were really affected. The stations and cafes reopened but they have relocated along the highway.

Sweetwater (the first city in Texas to be bypassed by an interstate) — The motels and stations were the only businesses affected but they weren't affected with such a great loss. All the motels except one are still operating. In addition, two large motels have been built on the bypass, and a Holiday Inn will be built in February. Several small stations were closed, but two large stations have been located on the bypass plus two large truck stops. Although the bypass closed a number of businesses, it resulted in millions of dollars of investment currently on the tax rolls which would not have been there had the bypass not occurred and has definitely shown a tendency to increase station sales totals in this area.

Colorado City — There was some decline in business for certain businesses such as stations and cafes. This type of business has moved to the highway, and a few stations which closed have reopened. This city, like many others, is facing the challenge of the bypass with more determination for survival through local co-operation and interest.

Midland — Interstate 20 is not completed, so no effects on Midland as of now. Percentage figures indicate traffic will decrease about 30 percent from the old routes. After three years, increase of usage will cause traffic to return, percentage wise, back to original course.

Odessa — At present the city of Odessa has not been affected by the bypass, since it has not been completed. It will be completed during the spring of 1967. Plans call for a number of promotional programs and the development of attractions to draw people.

After mulling all of this material together we have come to a conclusion about the "Effects of Interstate Highway 20" on the businesses of the towns it bypassed.

Interstate Highway 20 has not had any bad effects on the cities it is bypassing and it may bring new and better horizons in the future.

The other committee had this to say about Cisco:

J. D. Yardley, operator of the Soot Restaurant, expects a 30-55 per cent reduction in sales after the highway bypasses. Most of the Soot's customers are comprised of local, area and college people. The loss will be felt primarily in the summers when tourist sales are usually up.

One Mobil station manager anticipated a 50 per cent drop in business, and Hal Page of Price Texaco Station said his station's loss would be between 60 and 70 per cent. The Texaco Co. has purchased three acres of land near the bypass for \$45,000.

Our research indicates that Cisco will benefit from the change in the long run.

Will Hwy Bypass Fold Economy? Student Research Says, 'Nay'

How will Cisco, Eastland and Ranger be affected by the bypassing of Interstate Highway 20? Will they wither away as commercial communities? Or, will the bypass actually bring new vigor to economy? The latter statement seems to be the conclusion of two student committees at Cisco Junior College who have studied the effects of the bypass on several towns as a project for their introductory business course.

Highway 80 (Interstate 20) began a bypass stretch in Texas in 1960, beginning at Sweetwater. Its completion in Eastland County is scheduled for 1970.

The student committees began their research last October. Data for their reports were gathered by writing to chambers of commerce of the towns that were bypassed or are being bypassed by the highway. Some of the towns did not answer inquiries.

The students (13 in both committees) found that the type of business who suffered greatest losses from the bypass were service stations, motels, hotels and restaurants.

One of the committees was composed of students Roger Oldenburgh, chairman, Terry Clift, Roy Lynn Gann, James Hulse and David Austin.

Members of the other committee were Linda Galle, chairman, Jo Lyn Buntin, Jimmy Haught, Larry Butler, Cecil Hopkins, Don Ballard, Tommy Edgar and Tommy Chambers.

The latter committee's report, "The Effects on Cisco of Interstate 20 Bypass," compiled by Miss Galle in January and edited by The Press follows:

The effects of Interstate Highway 20 on the businesses of towns it bypassed shows that the highway did not affect the businesses as greatly as expected. To prove this statement we have written to many towns that the highway is bypassing, asking them to send any information they could on their businesses since the highway has bypassed them. Several of the replies came out this way.

Cisco — Many owners and managers of restaurants and stations said they would not lose less than 40 per cent of business, since most of the business is composed of local

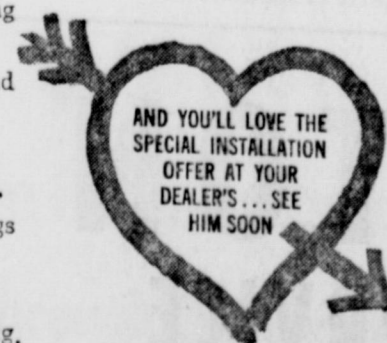
