Preliminary Reports Delivered In City's Current Master-Plan Study

Engineering Associates of Odessa, hearing preliminary reports on suggested future needs of the city.

Committee Chairman H. T. Wilson and his group met with Reed and others at 6:30 a. m. until 9 a. m. hearing discussion on street needs.

At noon, Chairman Bob Perkins and his group met for a talk on sewerage needs, and Dr. Bob Alexander's airport committee met Tuesday evening beginning at 7 p. m. All the meetings were held at the White Elephant Restaurant.

At least two city commissioners attended each meet, and the total accumulation of preliminary data will be discussed at the regular commission meeting Monday evening beginning at 7 p. m. at the City Hall Mayor Deaton said.

Presentations include maps and charts, and recommendations on priorities for the various projects.

One of the commissioners said of the firm, with which the city has contracted, "We have already got our money's worth." The master plan survey is costing \$1,200.

About three months ago the City paid the last \$1,500 monthly payments on the old water and sewer bonds, and presently owes only some \$32,000 in old tax bonds. With the tax statements about ready to go, with at least a 40 per cent

collection of the some \$60,000 being billed, it is hoped that the city can "go a long way" on that last old debt. There's also some \$8,000 to \$10,000 in escrow, the use of which too could help the city's financial status.

The mayor appointed committees last year to study and make recommendations for the city's future development.

Curley Maynard Elected President American Roque League at Conclave

Veteran Eastland County Ford salesman Curley Maynard of Eastland has been given the esteemed honor of being elected national president of the American Roque League at that sports annual convention in Wichita, Kans., last week.

First Texan to serve in the top position, Mr. Maynard was elected by acclamation at the annual banquet of the players and officials in Wichita Thursday evening. He succeeds Paul Ferguson of Decatur, Ill., as president.

Another countian, Orville Luker of Staff, accompanied Mr. Maynard to Kansas, and

won himself a third-place trophy in the Division II category of the annual competition. He won ten straight games before being defeated.

Mr. Maynard, who won the Division II title at a Dallas convention in 1961, played in the 1966 tournament, but found himself pitted against Wayne Stephens of Lubbock, previous national roque champion who went on to re-win the title in Division I this year.

Some 40 players from all over the nation compete in the 10-day tournament in the two divisions.

Upon election Mr. Maynard appeared on Wichita television and was interviewed by newspapers there. (In so doing he got commitments from many players to attend the Eastland tournament which is held each May at the Eastland City Park.

Mr. Maynard says that he plans to visit several roque clubs over the country during the year, and talk to schools and young people in the association's continuing program of education the public about the game with a view to its continuance. He describes the game as one of skill and strategy, requiring a great deal of practice.

Mrs. Maynard generally makes the trip each year with Curley, but elected not to go this year because their daughter and husband of Abilene,

were vacationing later this month, and wanted her to accompany them.

It was Mr. Luker's first attendance at a national tournament. He is an active member of the Eastland Club.

The American Roque League dates to about 1890, Mr. Maynard reports, and game records go back as far as 1881.

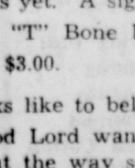

2 Young Men Are Promoted With Agent J. M. Cooper's Retirement



EASTLAND COUNTY'S new agricultural agent is DeMarquis Gordon, seated above, who will take over his duties Sept. 1. Shown with him are County Judge Scott Bailey, left, and J. M. Cooper, who is retiring after 31 years as an active farm agent. Announcement of the agent change was made Monday by Judge Bailey after a meeting of the commissioners' court.

The retirement of J. M. Cooper, veteran Eastland County Agricultural Agent, on September 1 will result in promotions for two young farm agents, according to action this week by county governments in Eastland and Hamilton Counties.

DeMarquis (Dee) Gordon, Hamilton County farm agent, has been transferred to Eastland to succeed Mr. Cooper, and Bill M. McCutchen, assistant to Mr. Cooper for some two years, was named to the Hamilton County Agent's office.

The Eastland County commissioners' court interviewed Mr. Gordon and District Agent John E. Burleson of Stephenville at their regular meeting Monday morning. The court formally accepted the resignation of Mr. Cooper and, acting on Mr. Burleson's recommendation, named Mr. Gordon as his successor. The new agent will be in his office Sept. 5.

Mr. McCutchen, who goes to Hamilton County on Sept. 1, met with commissioners there Monday. His successor in this county will be named later, Mr. Burleson reported.

Mr. Cooper, veteran of 21 years in Eastland County and some 10 years in Stephens, Trinity and Jasper Counties, requested retirement due to ill health, including eye trouble that necessitated two major operations, and a heart ailment.

Mr. Gordon, who is 31 years of age, is a native of Cleburne in Johnson County. He is a graduate of the high school there and of Texas A&M University with a BS in agricultural education. He started his work as a farm agent as an assistant in McLennan County and went to Hamilton as county agent in August, 1963. He is a military veteran, including overseas duty in Germany.

Married to the former Jo Anne Stansbury of Cleburne, who is a graduate of Baylor University, Mr. Gordon is a veteran in 4-H Club work. He and Mrs. Gordon have two children. He is a Baptist and a Lion and has been active in various civic functions. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John T. Gordon of Cleburne.

County Judge Scott Bailey told interviewers that "the commissioners' court is highly impressed with Mr. Gordon, based on his record and our interview with him."

The court accepted Mr. Cooper's resignation "with regrets." Judge Bailey noted that "filling Mr. Cooper's office has been a difficult task due to his long and faithful work as an outstanding aid to the farm and ranching interests of our county and region."

Mr. Cooper is a native of Center in Shelby County where he grew up on a farm. He finished high school there and graduated from Texas A&M University in 1931. After teaching vocational agriculture for four years in Wise and Cooke Counties, he joined the Soil Conservation Service for a brief tour of duty. The next 31 years were spent as a farm agent.

Mr. Cooper is married to the former Betty Jo Siddons of Bridgeport. They have two children — Mrs. D. L. Kinaird, Jr., of Eastland and Joe Cooper, junior at Texas A&M. They are active in church and civic affairs.

Mr. Cooper has won wide recognition for his work as the farm agent in Eastland County. Particularly noteworthy was his leadership in orchard development, including organizing the first county pecan growers association in Texas. He has worked with poultry growers, dairy herd owners, peanut growers and has been particularly interested in helping rural communities improve their conditions through the formation of clubs. He has directed a

Speaking at the White Elephant Restaurant luncheon meet, the coaches outlined prospects for the year—pointing out strengths and weaknesses.

Darwin Miller was program chairman and introduced Frazier, who in turn introduced Line Coach Harold Price and new coach Doug Dallas.

Dallas, a Cross Plains High School griddier and Sul Ross graduate, told the Lions that if the five seniors prove to be good leaders, "We'll have a good season." He asked the cooperation of the men in

helping instill in the boys that "they too, have the potential of being good football players," as well as others whom they remember and cite as examples.

Describing the District 7-AA into which Eastland has been placed this year, Frazier said that maybe Granbury and Hamilton (only two new opponents for the Mavericks)

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 65 proposing an Amendment to Section 3-b of Article VII of the Constitution of Texas providing that school taxes theretofore voted in any independent school district or in any junior college district shall not be abrogated, cancelled or invalidated by a change in boundaries nor shall bonds voted, but unissued, at the time of such change, be invalidated by such change; authorizing the levy of taxes after such change without further election in the district as changed; providing an exception in the case of the annexation or consolidation of whole districts; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 3-b of Article VII of the Constitution of Texas be amended to be read as follows:

"Section 3-b. No tax for the maintenance of public free schools voted in any independent school district and no tax for the maintenance of a junior college voted by a junior college district, nor any bonds voted in any such district, but unissued, shall be abrogated, cancelled or invalidated by change of any kind in the boundaries thereof. After any change in boundaries, the governing body of any such district, without the necessity of an additional election, shall have the power to assess, levy and collect ad valorem taxes

subsequently sold and delivered and any voted, but unissued, bonds of other school districts involved in such annexation or consolidation shall not thereafter be issued."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to Section 3-b of Article VII of the Constitution of Texas providing that taxes or bonds previously voted in any independent school district or in any junior college district shall not be abrogated, cancelled or invalidated by any change in boundaries and authorizing the continuance of the levy of taxes after such change without further election.

"AGAINST the amendment to Section 3-b of Article VII of the Constitution of Texas providing that taxes or bonds previously voted in any independent school district or in any junior college district shall not be abrogated, cancelled or invalidated by any change in boundaries and authorizing the continuance of the levy of taxes after such change without further election."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective on and after the date of its adoption.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

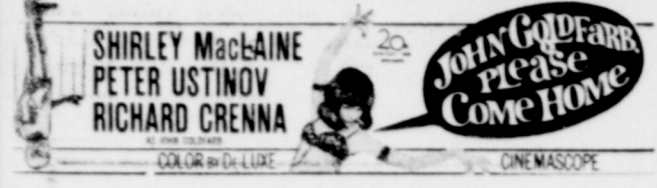

U.S.D.A. Joins Protest Of Katy Suspension

The loss of the Missouri-Kansas (Katy) Railroad would adversely affect approximately 2,347 farms in Eastland County. The peanut industry would be affected most, as a large amount of peanuts are shipped to and from the peanut facilities located at Gorman, Carbon and Cisco, R. G. Lyerla, County ASCS chairman, said in a public hearing on the proposed abandonment of the railroad in Dallas Tuesday.

Mr. Lyerla spoke in behalf of this county as well as Bosque, Erath, Callahan and McLennan counties.

In a recent statement, Tim Moore, program specialist for the ASCS, said:

"The railroad has made a request to abandon rail service from Bellmead to Stamford. It is believed that the abandonment of the line would adversely affect agriculture in that area. For this reason, the department has decided to intervene in the railroad's request to discontinue such service."

A large delegation from Gorman as well as from other towns along the Katy line was to have appeared at the hearing in Dallas Tuesday, it was reported. The intervention of the U. S. Department of Agriculture is expected to add weight to their appeal to retain the rail line.

Armed with a bundle of statistical data, Mr. Lyerla was expected to speak forcefully for agriculture's interest in the line.

Using material assembled by the Eastland County ASCS

Committee and the ASCS staff office, Mr. Lyerla pointed out in his presentation:

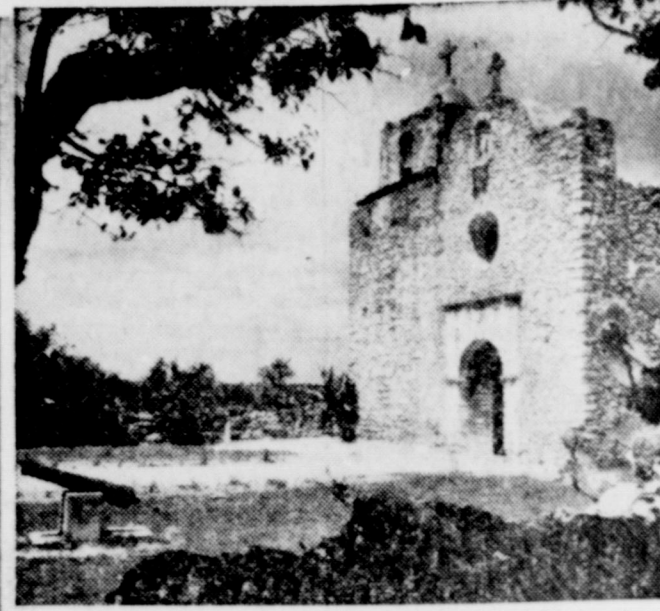
"It would be hard to evaluate the loss of the freight service to the peanut industry. Gorman and Carbon are not served by Texas and Pacific Railway and would not have rail service if Missouri-Kansas lines are closed."

"The cost to convert present facilities for handling peanuts by truck from all processing facilities in Eastland County would be hard to accurately estimate, but I feel that it could cost as much as \$250,000."

"The loss of rail service to Eastland County would greatly affect the marketing procedure, especially for peanuts. Large quantities of peanuts are shipped to Eastland County for processing in transit. The absence of rail service would increase the cost of freight and place processors in a bad position to compete with other processors with rail service."

"Buyers of peanuts definitely prefer rail shipments due to present handling procedures."

"In 1965 peanut production almost doubled due largely to the increased irrigation facilities installed in the county. We estimate that 250 irrigation wells are in operation in the county with approximately 5,000 acres of peanuts being irrigated presently. We anticipate at least 10,000 acres of irrigated peanuts in 1967. This could increase production to 50,000,000 pounds which

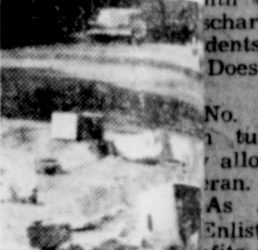

NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 26 proposing an Amendment to Sections 4 and 5 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members; prescribing their qualifications; elections, appointments, tenure of office and compensation; and prescribing the term of court of said court.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 4 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 4. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall consist of five Judges, one of whom shall be Presiding Judge, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of three Judges shall be necessary to a decision of said court. Said Judges shall have the same qualifications and receive the same salaries as the Associate Justices of the Supreme Court. They shall be elected by the qualified voters of the state at a general election and shall hold their offices for a term of six years. In case of a vacancy in the office of a Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, the Governor shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, fill said vacancy by appointment until the next succeeding general election.

"The Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time when this Amendment takes effect shall become Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals and continue in office until the expiration of the term of office for which each has been elected or appointed under the present Constitution and laws of this state, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.

"The two members of the Commission of Appeals in aid of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time when this Amendment takes effect shall become Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals and shall hold their offices, one for a term of two years and the other for a term of four years, beginning the first day of January following the adoption of this Amendment and until their successors are elected and qualified. Said Judges shall by agreement or otherwise designate the incumbent for each of the terms mentioned.

"The Governor shall designate one of the five Judges as Presiding Judge and at the expiration of his term and each six years thereafter a Presiding Judge shall be elected."

Section 2. That Section 5 of the Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 5. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall have appellate jurisdiction coextensive with the limits of the state in all criminal cases of whatever grade, with such exceptions and under such regulations as may be prescribed by law.

"The Court of Criminal Appeals and the Judges thereof shall have the power to issue the writ of habeas corpus, and under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, issue such writs as may be necessary to enforce its own jurisdiction. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall have power upon affidavit or otherwise to ascertain such matters of fact as may be necessary to the exercise of its jurisdiction.

NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 13 proposing an Amendment to Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas as so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 2 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, effective February 1, 1966, by deleting the following language:

"and provided further, that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said tax before offering to vote at any election in this State and hold a receipt showing that said poll tax was paid before the first day of February next preceding such election. Or if said voter shall have lost or misplaced said tax receipt, he or she, as the case may be, shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any election in this State which shall be made in writing and left with the judge of the election. The husband may pay the poll tax of his wife and receive the receipt therefor. In like manner, the wife may pay the poll tax of her husband and receive the receipt therefor."

provided, however, that before offering to vote at an election a voter shall have registered annually, but such requirement for registration shall not be considered a qualification of an elector within the meaning of the term "qualified elector" as used in any other Article of this Constitution in respect to any matter except qualification and eligibility to vote at an election. Any legislation enacted in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment shall not be invalid because of its anticipatory nature. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting. And this provision of the Constitution shall be self-enacting without the necessity of further legislation. Any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or component branches thereof; or in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of en-

tering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces."

Sec. 2. That Section 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by changing the word "may" to "shall" in the last clause thereof and by deleting the words "in all cities containing a population of ten thousand inhabitants or more."

The text of this Section, as so amended, is shown below, with the deleted language marked through by a broken line and with the new language underscored:

"Section 4. In all elections by the people, the vote shall be by ballot, and the Legislature shall provide for the numbering of tickets and make such other regulations as may be necessary to detect and punish fraud and preserve the purity of the ballot box; and the Legislature may shall provide by law for the registration of all voters in all cities containing a population of ten thousand inhabitants or more."

Sec. 3. If any other Amendment to Sections 2 or 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, being for a different purpose, is adopted at an earlier election or at the same election, the adoption of this Amendment shall not be construed as nullifying any change made by such other Amendment.

Sec. 4. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR repealing the poll tax as a requirement for voting."

"AGAINST repealing the poll tax as a requirement for voting."

Sec. 5. If the foregoing Amendment is adopted, the proclamation of the Governor declaring the adoption of the Amendment shall set forth the full text of the amended Sections, as amended herein and as amended by any other proposed Amendment which is submitted by the 59th Legislature and which has been duly adopted prior to such proclamation.

Sec. 6. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

aren't so tough." (Granbury is picked by some as being at least second-best in the state.)
