## Don C. Hill Is Buried In Final Rites Saturday

Funeral services for Don C. Hill, 53, of Las Vegas, N.M. (formerly of Eastland), were held at 4 p.m. Thursday, Aug. 4, in the First Methodist Church of Las Vegas and 2 p.m. Saturday, Aug. 6, in the First Methodist Church of Eastland with Rev. J. Lester Davenport, pastor, officiating. Burial was in the Eastland Cemetery with Arrington Hamner Funeral Home in charge. The Hill family lived in Eastland from the early 1940's until 1954. He owned and operated the local hotel. While a resident of Eastland, he prospected and developed uranium holdings in eastern Utah at the time of his death, he was a project supervisor of the New Mexico Highway Department. Mr. Hill was born in February of 1913 in McAlister, N.M. In 1933, he married Eleanor Brown in Tucumcari, N.M. A member of the Methodist Church, he held membership in the Texas Blue Lodge No. 467 and the Mosiah Temple Shrine in Fort Worth. He was a 32nd Degree Mason. His only son was killed in an automobile accident in 1948. Survivors include his wife; one brother, Dale Hill of Albuquerque, N.M.; three sisters, Mrs. Ed O'Hara of Albuquerque, Mrs. Charles G. Walls of Clovis, N.M. and Mrs. Carmen Mansfield of Odessa.

## COMANCHE CO-OP WILL GET \$564,000 EXPANSION LOAN

The Comanche County Electric Co-op has recently received a \$564,000 REA Loan which will promote construction needs in the seven-county area which it serves, including the building of a new sub-office in Eastland near Hollywood - Vassarette, according to Bill Parks, manager.

Extensive system improvements will also include 16 miles of new tie-line and the conversion of the 63 miles of line presently existing.

The loan will also finance the construction of a 127 mile distribution line which will serve some 700 new customers.

The combination office-warehouse to be built in Eastland will be of new steel decorative construction, Mr. Parks said.

Construction will begin in about two months.

Counties being served by the Association are Mills, Brown, Comanche, Eastland, Callahan, Stephens and Shackelford.

# Stricter Firearms Sale Control Laws -- Yes or No?

A sociology textbook defines a social problem as "a condition affecting a significant number of people in ways considered undesirable, about which it is felt something can be done through collective social action."

When enough people start inquiring, "Why is this?" a situation, then we have a social problem.

People have begun (again) to say, "Isn't it awful" about how easy it is for persons to buy guns and ammunition. Heinous crimes such as a president's assassination and the more recent ambush slaying in Austin occur.

It has been proposed that the problem can be solved or

at least alleviated by the ban or control of the sale of firearms. President Johnson is urging Congress to pass some control measures.

The Ranger Times, The Cisco Press and the Eastland Telegram have interviewed few citizens of this area to get their opinions on the issue.

## Ranger Views

In Ranger, H. C. Wilkinson said of any proposed ban: "It is not the proper way, because the law-abiding citizens would be unarmed and the lawbreakers would be armed. People are killed by knives, but they (the legislators) do not keep people from buying knives; people are killed by

automobiles. Yet, there is no law keeping people from buying automobiles."

Another Rangerite Homer Robinson, said: "I do not think it's right — it would be taking away the rights of people. But I would like for them (the legislators) to find a way to keep habitual criminals from buying guns. I would not sell a gun to one of them."

## CISCOANS

In Cisco, policeman Charlie Moad, on the force for six years and acting chief while Chief S. E. Parkinson is on vacation, said: "Yes, firearms sale should be controlled, to keep weapons out of the hands of 'morons' but I do not know how it can be

done. It would be a 'bugger' to enforce. Enforcement would be a burden on citizens."

Mr. Moad said people should have the right to keep arms in their homes for protection.

## E. L. JACKSON, Cisco civic leader, said an attempt to keep criminals from buying guns would not be successful.

Those who would use firearms for crime would get them anyway. "How would you keep them from smuggling guns from Mexico or other countries?" Mr. Jackson asked. He said he hates to see the nation or anyone make a hasty decision so close on the heels of a tragedy. How to solve the problem should be thought over thoroughly.

## EASTLANDERS

County Judge Scott Bailey had this to say about bearing arms: "The right to keep and bear arms is well established in both the US and Texas Constitutions. Article II of the US Constitution says, 'A well regulated Militia, being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear Arms, shall not be infringed.' This language is very clear on the subject and appears to strongly favor the position of complete liberty of arms possession."

"The Texas State Constitution (Article I, Sec. 23) says, 'Every citizen shall have the right to keep and bear arms in the lawful defense of himself or the State; but the Legislature shall have power, by law, to regulate the wearing of arms, with a view to prevent crime.' The Texas Constitution confers the right to keep arms but does also provide for the regulation of 'wearing Arms.'"

"With reference to your question of Arms Control. It is my opinion that the Texas

Constitution would have to be amended before the Legislature would have any real authority to enact any effective legislation on this subject. It is my feeling that we have a very effective Pistol Law at this time. I feel that the general public should co-operate with law enforcement agencies for better enforcement of the present laws on this subject as well as concerted effort to educate and inform the Public concerning responsibilities that go along with the various Rights of

## Investment Is Needed To Keep State Highways Modern

TIN — Texas will need to invest more than one-half billion dollars a year in new highway construction by 1985 to keep pace with the growth of the state, a new study released today by the Texas Highway Department predicted.

The forecast was contained in a 24-page brochure entitled "Great Challenge — Highway Needs." The study is based on projections by planners in the department.

A comparison of highway construction expenditures in Texas in 1965 and 1966 showed a 10 percent increase in the latter year.

The highway system to meet the challenge of the future is active, alert public opinion, the brochure said. It requires sound, adequate financing.

The public should be alert and attempt to divert or ease any current highway

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revenues," the report warned.

The failure — even by one day — to fulfill the obligation to build better, safer highways will be costly in human life and suffering. The economic loss is irreparable.

The report pointed out: "A vibrant economy produces its own problems. Population growth, the rapid urbanization of Texas, the increasing number of motor vehicles and the complexities of modern society compel a constant vigilance."

By 1985, the brochure noted, Texas will drive a total of more than 77 billion vehicle miles each year, compared with 52 billion vehicle miles rolled up in the state in 1965.

Vehicle registration will more than double — from 6.2 million to about 14 million in the next two decades.

To keep pace, the State-maintained highway system is expected to grow to a total of 79 thousand miles. Presently, 66.5 thousand miles of highways are under State maintenance.

More significant, Highway Department planners said more miles of high-type highways will be needed to carry ever-increasing burdens of traffic. In the next two decades, 17 thousand construction miles of new freeways should be built, including traffic arteries on new locations and conversion of older, conventional roads to freeways.

In general, all existing highways will require one reconstruction and two resurfacings before 1985. All bridges built prior to World War II will require replacement.

The report notes the role of the highway system in the unprecedented growth and development of the state during recent years.

The Texas Highway Commission presented the report to Governor John B. Connally as an aid to consideration of future highway needs of Texas.

### Advice Given On Signing Up For Medicare

"Medicare enrollment will be a continuing process from now on," said R. R. Tuley, Jr., social security district manager for the Abilene area. The general enrollment period that ended May 31 was an all-out effort to enroll those persons who were already age 65 or older.

Persons not yet 65 will have 7 months in which to enroll for doctor bill insurance, Tuley continued. The individual's enrollment period for that part of Medicare will run from the third month before his 65th birthday month to the third month after it. Thus a person who will be 65 in October, 1966, may enroll from July 1, 1966, through January 31, 1967.

"There is no special enrollment period for the hospital insurance part," he went on, adding that a person past 65 could sign up for that even after he becomes an in-patient at a participating hospital. There are no premium payments involved for the hospital insurance half of Medicare.

Whether or not a person has retired or has ever worked under social security has no effect on Medicare coverage, but failure to enroll in the 3 month period before age 65 will result in a delay of from one to three months in acquiring the medical or doctor bill part of Medicare coverage. A higher premium cost will apply for those who do not enroll at their first opportunity but decide to come in during a later October-December period in 1967, 1969, or other odd-numbered years. Persons nearing age 65 are urged to ask their social security office for the free booklet on Medicare, Tuley added.

Arms ownership."

"I am definitely in favor of tighter controls on firearms," County Sheriff L. E. Sublett says. "At the same time, I believe that every person has the right to own a weapon to protect his home and family, but even these should be registered, and the law so written that the registered owner would be responsible for his own particular weapon."

How would registration be accomplished?

"Counties in some states register firearms through the tax collector's office, the county clerk's office, or even the sheriff's office," he said. Such registration would be a great help to us and to the public in locating, and returning stolen guns, the sheriff added.

"Seriously, I believe that the new criminal code under which law enforcement officers are now having to operate, is a greater threat to good than controlling firearms sales," Sheriff Sublett said.

"I don't see how the simple registration of firearms would hamper anyone — even sportsmen who might have a great number of weapons for hunting and target practice use."

"A routine form stating that the purchaser of a gun had never been convicted of a crime, nor been treated for

mental disorders, might resemble a little 'red tape,' but if such a form were required before a gun could be bought, perhaps many guns could be kept out of the hands of those persons who have no need for them," Sheriff Sublett said.

"I would want to see the law written so that the responsibility of such statements would rest with the purchaser, and not restrict the seller, who's business it is to sell guns."

"Locally we have excellent cooperation from our dealers, and I believe that all do a real good job of trying to keep guns out of the hands of those who have no need for them. Of course, that's a local condition, and the big-town dealers and the mail-order houses can't know our peoples as well."

Highway Patrol Sgt. Roger Soosebee, who stated that he was not speaking officially for the Department of Public Safety, but merely expressing his own opinion, said:

"There's no way of legislating out this kind of crime (referring to the tragedies in Dallas, Chicago and Austin), and there's probably no way of keeping these people from getting guns when and if they want them."

"I think it would be wise to control mail-order sales of guns and to register the weapons to show ownership, so a crime, nor been treated for

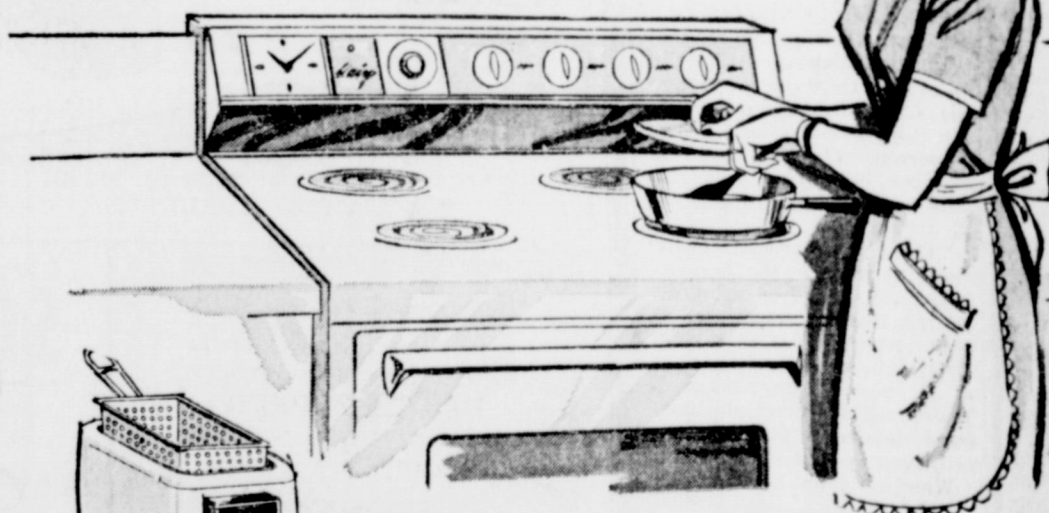

WASHINGTON, D. C. The vice president of the United States was recently quoted as saying in New Orleans that if he lived in conditions such as

some of those he saw, he would be in revolt, too. In Phoenix, Arizona recently a Mr. John Brinkley, Deputy Director for Field Services of the U. S. Civil Rights Commission, said that the Commission "not only sanctioned civil disobedience, but encouraged it." He said that the Commission responded to pressure and that the squeaking wheel got the grease. This is a neat summing up of morality surrounding some of the present programs. The implication is clear. What is being

said is that conscience or fairness has nothing to do with their activities, but only politics, power, and pressure. Another Federal employee lends his encouragement to riots and protests by saying, "Nothing ever came about in the Civil Rights movement by being nice. It takes direct and militant action. I have little patients for diplomats." Remarks by highest officials in our government would seem to give encouragement and promise to marches, riots and boycotts. They are saying, in substance, that un-

less the Federal Government continues with its direct handouts, riots and looting can be expected. What is taken to be a suggestion is followed in a great many places. Even Secretary of Defense McNamara in a recent speech in Canada, which had nothing to do with Defense, suggested that poverty drove people into the arms of the Communists. He suggested that, to head off social upheaval which provides Communism with its entire into undeveloped nations, requires an extensive Foreign Aid Program.

This has been the central theme of our extensive and farflung Foreign Aid since its inception. The results are not supported by the record. It is a curious fact that some of the poorest countries in the Western Hemisphere have the smallest internal Communist countries best off, such as Italy and France, have the largest. According to the logic followed by Mr. McNamara, Cuba, the first Latin American nation to go Communist, should also have been the poorest. It was, in fact, the richest.

It has been related time and again that there is an irrefutable relationship between poverty and social disorder, paving the way to Communism. A U.S. census has been taken every ten years since 1790. 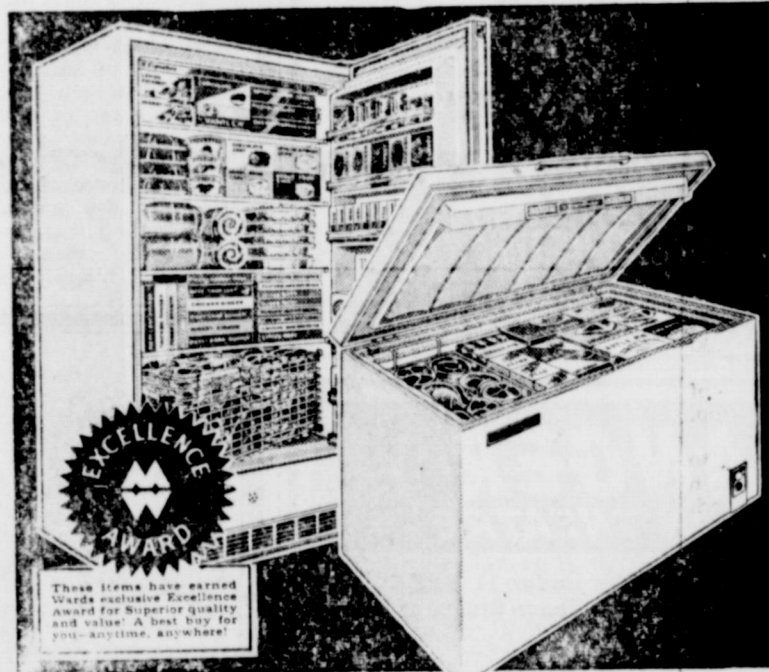

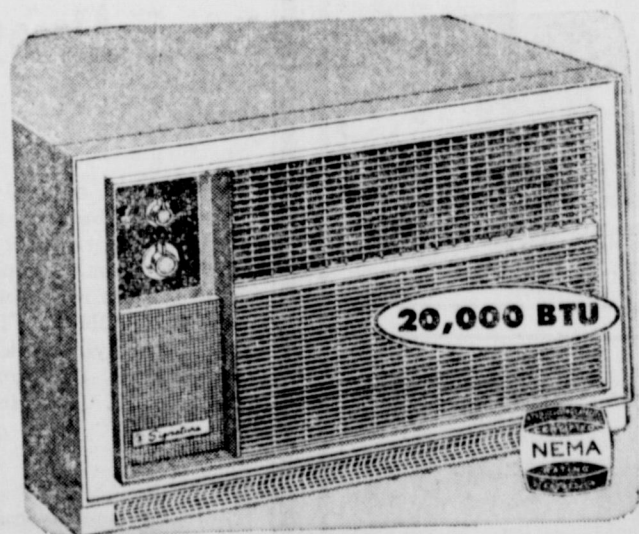

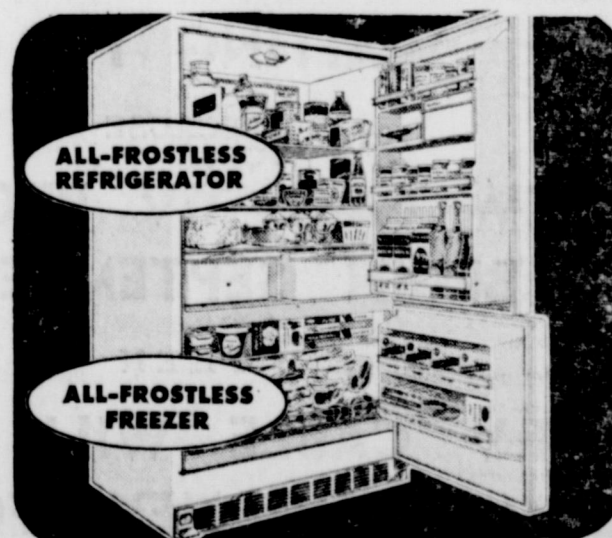

the engine and disconnecting the spark-plug wire. A mower blade is like a small airplane propeller; the slightest twist could start the engine, with great danger to your hands.

12. Stop the engine when you are approached by any child, pet or inattentive person. Warnings can rarely be heard or understood over an engine's roar. The machine can be stopped far faster if engine controls and stop mechanism are handle-mounted.

13. Never lift or tip a running mower or expose the blade over the edge of a bank or incline. This increases the danger of missiles and negates many safety features designed into better machines.

14. Avoid steep inclines with riding mowers — overturning sideways is a potential hazard. If it must be done, mow up and down, not sideways.

15. Never reverse a riding mower without looking behind. Children or pets may not anticipate your change in direction.

• • • Your shoes should be built for walking, and your old shoes are your best guides to what you need in a new pair.

So, if you made mistakes in selecting your last pair of shoes, both your shoes and you have suffered. The way the old shoes look now may show you what those mistakes were.

Here are some of the common signs you may find on your old shoes that indicate some "buymanship" mistakes.

If the shoe is worn unevenly, with most of the signs of wear in the front, the shoe is too short for you. Soles should wear through first at the center.

If the upper portions of the shoe bulge over the shoe line, the shoe is too narrow. Shoes that are worn completely out case, you'd better have your eye all wrong for you. In that check of the exact size you shoe salesman make a special need.

When the shoe heel pushes under or new laces are needed often, the shoe is too short. Wear at the toe tip also means that the shoe is too short.

## Fewer Farmers Are Making More From Crop Land

COLLEGE STATION — Are we running out of farmers and land? With the great decline in the number of farmers and ranchers what is going to happen to food production in the future?

These and similar questions are often asked of John McHaney, Extension economist at Texas A&M University and he has an answer. We've got plenty of both to take care of our needs for a mighty long time, he says.

The economist says people often overlook the scientific advances that have been made through education and research in agricultural production and marketing. There is no reason to believe these advances will not continue in the future, perhaps at even a faster rate, he says. They also forget about the large number of acres that have gone under irrigation with much higher yields and more stable production. These projects have been developed, he adds, through the use of private capital as well as government assistance. And finally, people overlook the fact that local farmers no longer produce just for local consumption but for consumers in other parts of the nation or even the world.

Today, with our efficient farmers, efficient suppliers of production items and our expanding and efficient marketing system, one farm worker supplies farm products for 34 persons compared to 11 persons in 1940.

McHaney says crop production is 30 per cent and livestock production 27 per cent since 1950. Even with fewer farmers, production continues to increase making Americans the best fed in the world. And, he adds, they eat for less.

## Vacation Trade Whooping It Up At State Parks

AUSTIN — The vacation trade is whooping it up at state parks in record numbers and also setting some kind of a mark for tidiness.

This word reaches the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department from hard working crews who catch up on their off season months. Of course tons of refuse are hauled from parks every day but an unusual amount of that this summer comes from the containers. Still the managers note, the hardest part of policing job is collecting assorted waste scattered about the grounds.

Posters and strategically located collectors have combined to cut down the littering problem, according to the men on the scene. Rules generally are being better observed too, state field reports.

Key regulations include:

Pets will be permitted on least only.

Firearms or fireworks will not be used or displayed.

Intoxicating liquor or beverages may not be sold or publicly consumed.

Wild flowers or shrubs may not be molested.

No hunting in any state park.

Speed limit in all parks 20 MPH.

Only authorized traffic permitted after 10 p. m. Minors will not be permitted to register or stay overnight in a park unless chaperoned and accompanied by adults.

Radios and recorded music and musical instruments will not be played after 10 p. m. in the picnic, camping, shelter and other overnight facilities areas of the parks. Swimming permitted only in designated areas.

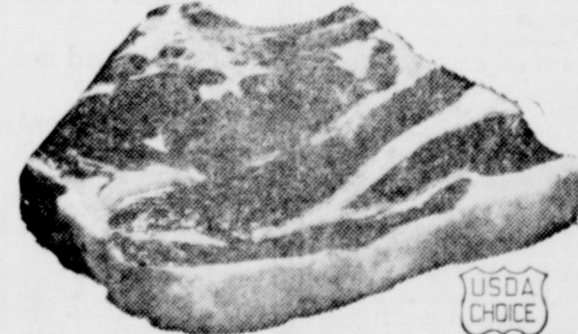
