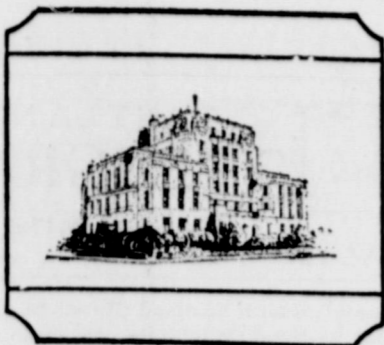

Kay Morton Buried Saturday Afternoon

Funeral services for Lyndia Kay Morton, 21, were held at 2 p. m. Saturday, June 11, in the First Methodist Church in Eastland with burial in Eastland Cemetery.

Miss Morton, born Oct. 13, 1944, in Dallas, passed away at 5:30 a. m. Thursday, June 9, in Scott and White Hospital, Temple. She had been ill for about six months, suffering from a rare skin disease.

In 1964, Miss Morton graduated from Eastland High School where she lettered four years in basketball, was band sweetheart, drum major, cheer leader, 4-H member, a member of the Tri-Hi-Y and the Beta Club. She was a junior at the University of Texas.

Miss Morton was a member of the Methodist Church.

Survivors include her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Bill Morton; one sister, Mrs. Alvis (Jannie) Rodgers of Eastland; one brother, James B. Morton III of Eastland; several aunts and uncles; and two nephews, Richard and Rodney Rodgers of Eastland.

Funeral arrangements were made through Arrington Hamner Funeral Home.

A Kay Morton Medical Fund, set up by friends, received over \$1,000 in contributions, and a special Kay Morton Benefit Show, scheduled for Saturday afternoon, was cancelled following the popular girl's death Thursday morning.

Graveside Rites Are Held Friday For Mrs. Marlow

Graveside rites for Mrs. C. P. Marlow of Grand Prairie were held at 3 p. m. Friday in Eastland Cemetery. She was buried beside her late husband, Charles Paul Marlow, who died in 1953.

Mrs. Marlow died at 8 a. m. Tuesday at her home in Grand Prairie after apparently suffering a heart attack. She was a native of Cisco, the former Winnie McWhorter, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. W. E. McWhorter.

Funeral services were held at St. Andrews Episcopal Church in Grand Prairie at 10 a. m. Friday.

They were married in 1920 in Cisco and lived there, in Stamford and Peacock until 1942 when they moved to Grand Prairie where he was in the lumber business.

Mrs. Marlow graduated from Cisco High School in 1920.

Survivors are three sons, Lloyd Marlow of San Antonio, H. V. Marlow and Ronald E. Marlow of Fort Worth; three grandsons; four granddaughters; three sisters, Mrs. Sam B. Dignitaries Expected Impressive Plans Complete For Flag Day Here Tuesday

"Flag Day, June 14th, is a day and a way, to express our humility and gratitude that we still live in a free land. A day to show our patriotic zeal and loyalty to our Forefathers who, in 1776, gave us a Constitution to support that privilege."

Postmaster Mrs. Marene Johnson speaking, and that quote began a letter of invitation which has gone out to over 1,500 people who are being invited to participate in Flag Day ceremonies in Eastland Tuesday.

It will be one of the few chances that many have to march behind a 36-piece military band in an all-out militant parade. The Sheppard AFB Band, a ten-man color guard from Dyess AFB, dignitaries, and patriotic citizens will form in front of the Post Office at 8:45 a. m. for the three-block march to downtown and the square, where a 14-man precision drill team from Dyess AFB will perform.

The entourage will immediately reform and march back to the post office lawn for the official ceremonies. Virgil Seaberry Jr. will be master of ceremonies and Wendell Seibert will introduce the guest speaker. Mayor Frank Deaton will give welcoming remarks.

Significant of the cooperation in the town for the special day's activities is that expressed by Hollywood-Vassar-ette Manager Don Viergever who is advising his some 300 employees that they may be excused for the special ceremonies. An invitation was issued by Mrs. Johnson.

A brunch for the some 70 men and women in uniform will be served at the First Christian Church Annex with the women of the First Christian, Presbyterian and Methodist Churches as hosts. Mr. Ed Sargent is contributing ice and coffee for the brunch.

General Guy S. MeLOY will be the honored speaker at the ceremony on the Post Office lawn Tuesday morning.

The program begins promptly at 8:45 with the band marching to the square where a precision drill team will perform. The entourage will return to the post office for the formal ceremony.

Marene Johnson, postmaster, extends an invitation to all to attend this patriotic way of appreciation of our freedom.

Children will be especially welcomed.

Upon retirement from active service, General MeLOY of San Antonio was appointed Southwest Regional Vice President for Freedoms Foundation at Valley Forge, Pa.

Gen. MeLOY is a 1927 graduate of the United States Military Academy, and is a graduate of the Infantry School, the Command and General Staff College, and the National War College. His military career includes services as Commandant of Cadets at Texas A&M University, and Commanding General of the Fourth U. S. Army with headquarters at Fort Sam Houston.

He served many years in Europe and the Far East. He is a parachutist and his decorations include among others the Distinguished Service Cross, the Distinguished Service Medal, the Purple Heart and the Distinguished Unit Citation, as well as Foreign Decorations. He retired in August 1963, a four star general, as commander in chief of the United Nations Forces in Korea, commander of the U. S. Forces in Korea and commanding general of the Eighth U. S. Army.

Other officials scheduled to attend include: Mr. Charles A. Miller, field office manager for General Services Administration for the Post Office Department with his assistant, Mr. H. H.



POSTAL INSPECTOR WILL ATTEND — Mr. Jack V. Staples, postal inspector in charge of the Fort Worth Division (Louisiana and Texas) will attend the Flag Day Ceremonies in Eastland Tuesday. He will be accompanied by his wife, who is the former Nancy Bates, related to the Coffman family who are from Baird and Cisco, and at one time lived in Eastland. Mr. Staples entered the postal service in 1932 at his native home in Marshall as a substitute clerk carrier.

Whitfield from Fort Worth Federal Center, will also be in Eastland for the Flag Day ceremonies.

Hon. Donald B. Horne is Director of Engineering and Facilities Division Post Office Department, Dallas Region. He started his postal career as a railway postal clerk in Arizona in 1928 and has continued with time out for the Navy 1943-46. He returned to the postal service as Assistant District Supervisor of Postal Transportation in 1947 and two years later became district supervisor of the same branch.

James B. Riley, Chief, Buildings Management Division, Public Buildings Service, has been in Government service for 30 years. Prior to joining GSA he served 18 years with the Department of Agriculture beginning as a construction engineer and subsequently achieved the position of State Engineer for FFA. In 1954 he transferred to the Construction and Repair Division, PBS, as Construction Engineer.

He worked for two years in this capacity before appointment to Chief, Repair and Improvement Branch of the Buildings Management Division. He was promoted to his present position in August 1961.

Prior to entering Government service, he worked with a firm of contracting engineers headquartered in Chicago. During this period he gained wide experience in the field of management and construction on major projects in Indiana, Kentucky, Michigan, Florida, and Virginia.





Eastland's Famous Stamp Mural Featured in National Publication

Eastland, Texas, its postmaster and their stamp mural are now well-known to every dedicated stamp collector in the United States.

A major feature story about the famous stamp mural, its designer and executor, Mrs. Marene Johnson and the Eastland post office appeared this week in "Linn's Weekly Stamp News", a Sidney, Ohio, weekly publication that is distributed all over the country, and recognized as the "Bible" of the stamp collectors.

The article featured photos of Mrs. Johnson and the mural itself. It was being read by several Eastland subscriber-collectors Friday.

Text of the article is as follows:

Seven years of research and tedious preparation combined with 962 hours of cutting, fitting and cementing some one-half million stamps by Eastland, Texas Postmaster Marene Johnson-Johnson, resulted in the unveiling on June 14, 1963, of one of the most attractive "stamp windows" in the world.

This mural, 6 feet by 10 feet, fills a window in the lobby of the post office and has been viewed by at least 12,000 who have signed the register since the presentation to the Post Office Department by Mrs. Johnson. It was received on Flag Day 1963, by Stanley Hodziewicz of the Agency accepting of the department.

Mrs. Johnson disclaims any credit as an artist but states the result is strictly from a determination to create a spirit of patriotism through this tapestry of history made of postal items.

A special frame was made to hold six panels (two sheets) of tempered glass which was recessed for fitting into the window. The design was worked on glass and another sheet placed over it with each panel being individually sealed and mounted by a professional glazier.

The six panels are combined to form a huge single unit with the top-most section on a horizontal plane and the United Nations section vertical. It is interesting to note that approximately 75 per cent of the stamps representing the 194 countries that are parties to the UN are autographed by dignitaries, attaches and representatives of their countries.

The uppermost panel consists of three sections with the portrait of Franklin in the center one. It required 4700 stamps to complete the

Franklin portrait. For the upper three sections over 11,217 complete stamps are visible. To show Mrs. Johnson's zeal, it is noted that all numerals and white areas are made from either selvage from stamp panes or from postal stationery.

In referring to Mrs. Johnson's working diagrams, we learned the details by panel sections. Sections one and No. three of the upper panel are laid out with a background of the Liberty series.

The roses are made of the Skymaster airs and the foliage of the Gardening, Forestry, Dental Health and Minnesota Statehood. The "pearls" surrounding the central portion of the combined three sections are cut from postal stationery and overlaid on an outline of 4 cent Lincolns.

The Franklin portrait itself is "engraved" from the following stamps: the Teachers, the frame line from 20 cents Special Deliveries, World Trade Railroad Engineers (his eyes), Lincoln three cents (his face).

In the center above the portrait is mounted a 13 cent value of the Presidentials surrounded by 13 stars. Directly below the portrait is the complete Presidential series with Chief Justice Hughes sitting above them and with Gen. Robert E. Lee below (Lee owned the grant of land, Arlington, where they are all buried).

As complete items making up the inner portion of the three sections are the health (for Food and Drug), Lamp of Learning (Education), First Land Grant College (Michigan), Gunston Hall (George Mason), Puerto Rico Election (Wheel and Ballot Box), American Bankers and many others.

Panel two has the United Nations as its center section having a background of the 4 cent Lincoln, symbolic of the UN Headquarters being in the United States.

At the top of this section is a complete set of the Over-run Countries set beneath our Freedom series. U.S. Flags are to the left and U.S. Military Forces are to the right

forming together the top ornamentation. Appropriate U.S. and foreign stamps form the circle and the streamers form the circle.

Outlined beneath the UN arrangement is a portion dedicated to the pioneers of Texas who established bastions in West Texas. This display combines a background map of the state made of the Alamo 9 cents with an order of 48 Texas Statehoods.

Inside this border and on this background are stamps of the confederacy, the Rayburn, the Whopping Crane, and the "Wagon Train Cachet" (the latter representative of the fact that Texas was on the Overland Express route).

To the left and to the right of the central UN panel section, are stamps and combinations reflecting special services of the Post Office — tax stamps such as snuff, cigarettes, automobile, internal revenue, migratory bird, thrift, newspaper, certified, special delivery, telegraph, official, postage dues and postal notes.

Then the theme turns toward government, communication and industry with the Atlantic Cable, Wright Brothers, Mercury, Automation, Geophysical, Rails, First Steamship and Arctic Exploration. The Lincoln postal card vignette is made of two cent Jeffersons.

No mere description will fully detail the brilliant work of this charming postmaster of Eastland, Texas. It has to be seen to be appreciated. The actual cost is not shown, but what records and invoices Mrs. Johnson did keep indicate an expenditure of approximately \$10,000 for the completion.

Especially interesting to viewers is the appearance of the autographs of so many highly placed persons, including those of President and Mrs. Lyndon Johnson, all of the living past Presidents and Vice Presidents, officers in the Bureau of Engraving, the Smithsonian, the General Services Administration and Post Office Department and of course those of foreign dignitaries as previously mentioned.

And, not only does the mural itself draw attention to postage stamps, but Mrs. Johnson also has been instrumental in furnishing "mural chacheted covers" with a special commemorative cancellation on each Flag Day.

A complete set for each year consists of two each, one cacheted with the top panel and one with the bottom panel of the mural. June 14 this year will bring the fourth year of this special cover set.

The Flag Day die hub also brings many more visitors to the Eastland Post Office on the lawn of which is a huge 20 by 40 foot Flag of the United States grown from red, white and blue petunias . . . an annual project also . . . of this remarkable and patriotic postmaster.

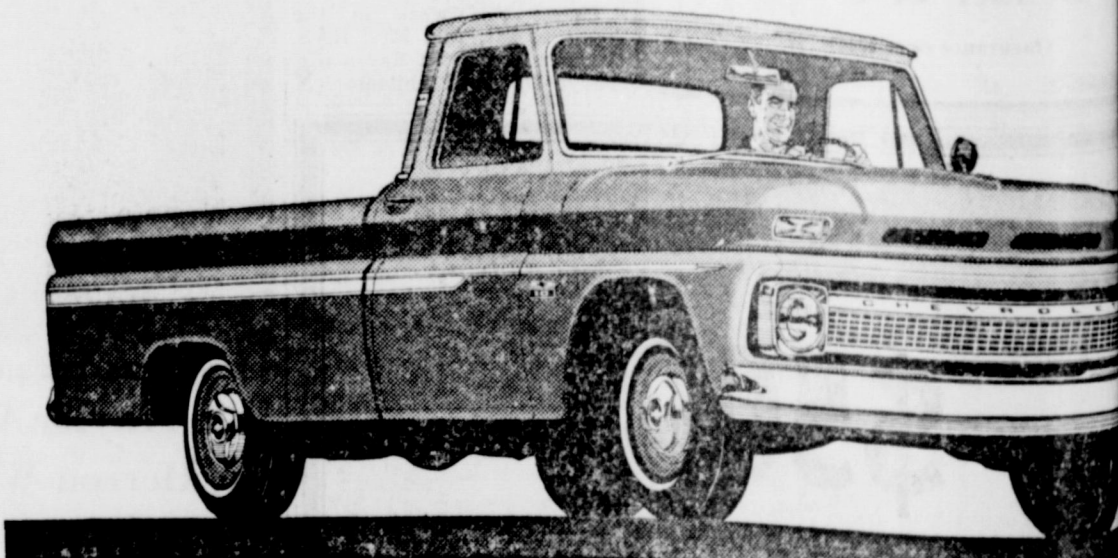

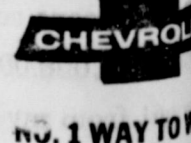
