





In support of its objective regarding the Flag, various activities are undertaken by local chapters of the DAR Society to help make Americans more Flag-conscious, which include: distribution of Flag Codes to thousands of school children each year; the presentation of flags to new citizens at naturalization courts and schools and youth organizations and similar groups.

There are more than 20 holidays on which Old Glory should be flown. It is a grand tradition of raising Our American Flag on these special days; a heritage that should be passed on from year to year and from generation to generation.

Let's all join in on the Flag crucade. Fly your Flag on June 14th - National Flag Day - and on July 4th.

Eastland's Famous Stamp Mural Home and Goods Featured in National Publication Up In Flames

Eastland, Texas, its post-master and their stamp mural are now well-known to every dedicated stamp collector in the United States.

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A major feature story about the famous stamp mural, its designer and executor, Mrs. Marene Johnson and the East land post office appeared this week in "Linn's Weekly Stamp News", a Sidney, Ohio, weekly publication that is distributed all over the country, and recognized as the "Bible" of the stamp collectors.

The article featured photos of Mrs. Johnson and the mural itself. It was being read by several Eastland subscriber-collectors Friday.

Text of the article is as fol-

Seven years of research and tedious preparation combined with 982 hours of cutting, fit ting and cementing some one half million stamps by Eastland, Texas Postmaster Ma rene Johnson-Johnson, result ed in the unveiling on June 14,-1963, of one of the most attractive "stamp windows" in the world.

This mural, 6 feet by 10 feet, fills a window in the lebby of the post office and has been viewed by at lea 12,000 who have signed th register since the presentati to the Post Office Departme by Mrs. Johnson. 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

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


