**HOW DID L. E. "Compound" Clark of Desdemona get his nickname?** An Eastland man is responsible. Mr. Clark, who'll be 67 on the 10th day of November, and who, with Mrs. Clark will celebrate a 50th wedding anniversary Sunday, is known far and wide at Mr. Vote Counter (because of his efficient handling of elections and his EARLY returns), and as an authority on interpretation of the Texas Election Code; particularly on "Who's eligible to vote." Born in Comanche County in '09, Mr. C. came with his parents to this county at 11, living on a farm south of Carbon. They moved to Desdemona June 21, 1920 in a wagon ("And it was so muddy, we stuck and broke the tongue out of the wagon on that move.") He set up his smith shop there and during some 25 years in that business, hired a young man by the name of J. P. Warren. That "youngster," who is known better in Eastland today as "Pete" is the one who christened Mr. C. with the nickname of "Compound." Why? Mr. C. doesn't remember; wonder if Pete remembers?

## Meet Mary... The Story of a 19-Year-Old Eastland Girl

July 12, 1960 to September 1, 1966; six years and 50 days. More than a dozen operations, none of them successful in restoring health. Twenty-four hours a day, every day, unable to move alone, lonely; lacking mental stimulation. This has been the story of Mary Gutierrez. Born in Eastland on Dec. 31, 1946, Mary attended school here through May 1960. That summer she accompanied her father and step-mother to he harvest fields in West Texas. On July 12, she was injured in a car accident in Muleshoe.

Mary has not walked since. Hospitalized first in Lubbock, Mary was later transferred to Santa Rosa Hospital in San Antonio. There she received the operations. Still she has control only of her fingers; part control of one arm. She has a sensation of touch only in her hands, arms and face.

There is no chance that Mary will walk again, those who know say. The hospital gave her a full-length brace which holds her upright, and wheel chair. She can use neither without help. But the hospital also gave Mary training; she can sew on an electric sewing machine with a hand control and she can type, although she cannot write with a pencil for more than a moment.

There is no more hospitalization or training available for Mary—they have done what they could. She is home now—home in Eastland, six blocks from the courthouse where she has no sewing machine or typewriter.

Mary and her parents have asked for nothing. A friend, who recognized Mary's ability to just a few things, asked for her.

The story spread rapidly, and, as usual, Eastland residents moved rapidly to help one of Eastland's own. (As one volunteer put it, "Anyone living in this town is a part of this town.")

There's a working television set across the room from Mary's bed, thanks to B. W. Robertson of Robertson TV. But, Mr. Robertson points out, Mary's home is some twenty feet lower than the downtown area, and the family must have an antenna which is better and higher than the present one.

are arranging to visit Mary and to accept donations which will provide help for her. Dick Dixon, manager of the Majestic Theater, has offered free admission to Mary when she can be brought to the theater in her wheel chair.

The Eastland Telegram has sent Mary what she blushing admitted she'd like: a framed picture of herself. (Her friends at the hospital had pictures of themselves; she did not.) A former teacher said, "Mary has a quick, intelligent mind which needs stimulating."

**'Welcome to Eastland' -- Here's a Little Bit About Us**

Thank you for stopping in Eastland! We'd like for you to know something about our town. Now we don't brag about Eastland. Not that we aren't proud. We have a great deal of pride and a "now - lucky - we - are - to - live - here" feeling. It's just that bragging is so unnecessary around here. Our town speaks for itself we believe.

The official 1960 census lists 3,292 residents for Eastland. But we've been watching things and suspect that we've gained quite a few since then. The town's changed a lot, too. There's a new elementary school over in the just-opened addition and a new gym for junior high and high school. The courthouse and the post office have both had remodeling.

And of course, the post office has the stamp mural now. You'll have to stop by sometime and see it — many thousand folks already have. Be sure to look at the United States Flag on the lawn. You may not believe it at first, but the entire flag is made of live flowers. Or maybe you've seen it on TV? They always show it during Flag Day Services.

We've got one new nursing home and another one in the building stage. (We had one already, back in '60). Eastland Memorial Hospital has bought more land for future expansion, but that's old news to us. That hospital is always building, improving, and staying one of the most modern in Texas.

Oh, yes, and the City Hall. The old one was torn down after the city offices moved to that new building on South

## School Bells Ring Thursday, 8 a.m.

The summer holiday season closes at 8 a. m. Thursday for Eastland Public School students. Classes begin at that hour for all grades, and the first day is scheduled to be a "full schedule" day, Supt. Wendell Siebert says. High school and junior high will

dismiss at 3:15 p. m., as will all elementary school grades except the first grade classes, which are excused at 2:30 p. m.

Three bus routes will be in operation this year operating over the same routes as during previous terms. The price of lunches will be increased five cents in all schools this year with the price fixed at 30 cents per day at the elementary school and 35 cents at the high school and junior high. Students who elect to purchase extra milk at the recess period or with their meal may do so at the rate of four cents per half pint. (This is the first price adjustment in some 15 years.)

A total of 785 students attended school on the first day last year, and approximately the same number is anticipated this year. Registration has been completed in all buildings.

The addition of Mrs. W. D. R. Owen as high school librarian and Nancy Mahon as teacher in the language arts field, completed the faculty for the new year. Two other new faculty members had already been employed with the placement of Mrs. Ailene Raymond as a Spanish-English teacher and Douglas Dallas as an assistant coach and history teacher.

Monday's Labor Day will be the first holiday for the public school youngsters.

## Options Out On Several Tickets

There are still some Maverick Stadium season tickets yet to be claimed, School Secretary Mrs. Ina Ruth Taylor reported.

Previous holders are given the option of reclaiming their same seats, but since the first game isn't until Friday, Sept. 9, many apparently are waiting until the last minute.

Mr. Sittler said that winter leagues are now organizing and league play will begin Monday, Sept. 12.

# BROWSING with BEV.....

The many household bleaches on the market today often confuse the homemaker. There are two main types of bleaches. The chlorine type comes in liquid or dry form, and the oxygen type is a dry form labeled potassium monopersulfate or sodium perborate compound.

Read the labels carefully to tell the difference between chlorine and dry oxygen bleaches. Oxygen bleach is safe for all fabrics. Water softeners, fabric brighteners and detergents can be added to dry bleaches. This is not possible with a liquid bleach. After reading the directions on the bleach package, measure the amount you need accurately, using a standard measuring cup. Chlorine bleach should be diluted before it is added to the wash. If there is any doubt about its colorfastness, don't pour dry bleach directly on clothes. Liquid bleach can be added to a wash water in two ways. Pour the measured bleach into the water while the tub is still filling, before the clothes are added, or, dilute the measured bleach in a quart of water first, and add it to the wash load after agitation has started. If the bleach is poured directly on the fabric

without being diluted fabric damage will result. This damage may or may not show up immediately afterward. Many washer manufacturers have simplified the process of adding bleach by providing automatic bleach dispensers. Some allow the bleach to be added at the proper time during the washing process and in correct amounts. The bleaches which come in packet or tablet form enable you to add the correct amount of bleach without having to measure. Directions should be followed carefully since all packets or tablets are not the same. Chlorine bleaches get rid of hard-to-remove soil on collars, cuffs, underware, and pillowcases. They whiten clothes and serve as an effective disinfectant. Dry oxygen bleaches which can be used on fine fabrics are more effective in keeping things white if they are used regularly and in the hottest water the fabric can stand. The potassium monopersulfate bleaches perform well in warm water, so they can be used on silk and wool that should be washed in cool water. Use hot water for whitening nylons and for bleaching wash-and-wear and resin-treated cottons.

## Vets' Q&A

Q — I was on active duty from August 19, 1957 to Sept. 20, 1960. Am I eligible for hospital treatment?  
A — Yes. All veterans discharged from military service, under conditions other than dishonorable, after Jan. 31, 1955, will be eligible for admission to VA hospitals with the same general admission priorities as wartime veterans.

Q — May I take flight training?  
A — No. A course in flying may be approved only if part of an over-all course leading to a degree.  
Q — Children of a deceased veteran may have some pension rights—do they forfeit marital rights?  
A — Eligible children of a deceased veteran retain their pension rights after their parents become 18, or 23 if they are going to school.  
Q — Under the terms of the GI loan benefit, can a veteran mortgage his present home to obtain money for other expenses?

Q — Only for home improvement. GI loans are not available to pay doctor bills, buy furniture, etc.  
Q — Is a member of the Reserves injured while on for disability compensation through the VA?  
A — Yes. The law provides incurred in line of duty by reservists during a drill or other period of authorized inactive duty training. Application should be filed with the nearest VA Regional Office, and should be accompanied by an official statement from the unit Commander showing the date, circumstances, nature and line of duty status of the injury.

Q — am service-connected for a disability, but am being treated in a VA Hospital for a non service-connected ailment. Will by compensation be increased to 100 per cent during hospitalization?  
Q — My sol income is retirement annuities totaling \$3,103 per year. My wife has no income other than her salary. I am 72 years of age and have retired for disability. Am I eligible for VA pension based on my World War I service?  
A — Your income would not be a bar to receiving pension from the VA, since it would amount to less than \$3,000 after making the 10 per cent Social Security and other retirement annuities. None of your wife's income would be considered for VA pension purposes since \$1200 or her total earnings, whichever is total income by the VA in computing the amount available to the veteran.

Q — I receive disability compensation from the VA as a received an extra payment for my son until his 18th birthday. He is now 19 years old but is entering school to further his education. Am I entitled to increased compensation for him.  
A — You are entitled to increased compensation provided our son is unmarried and in school. So long as he remains in school and unmarried, you will be entitled to benefits until his 23rd birthday.

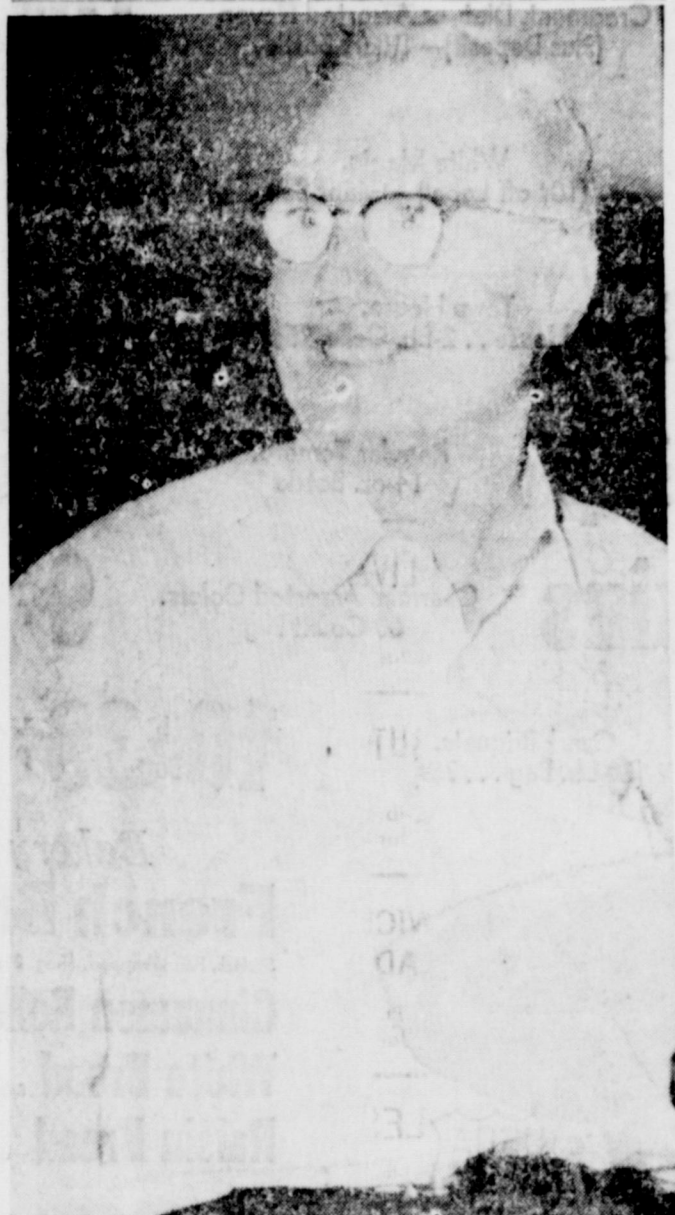

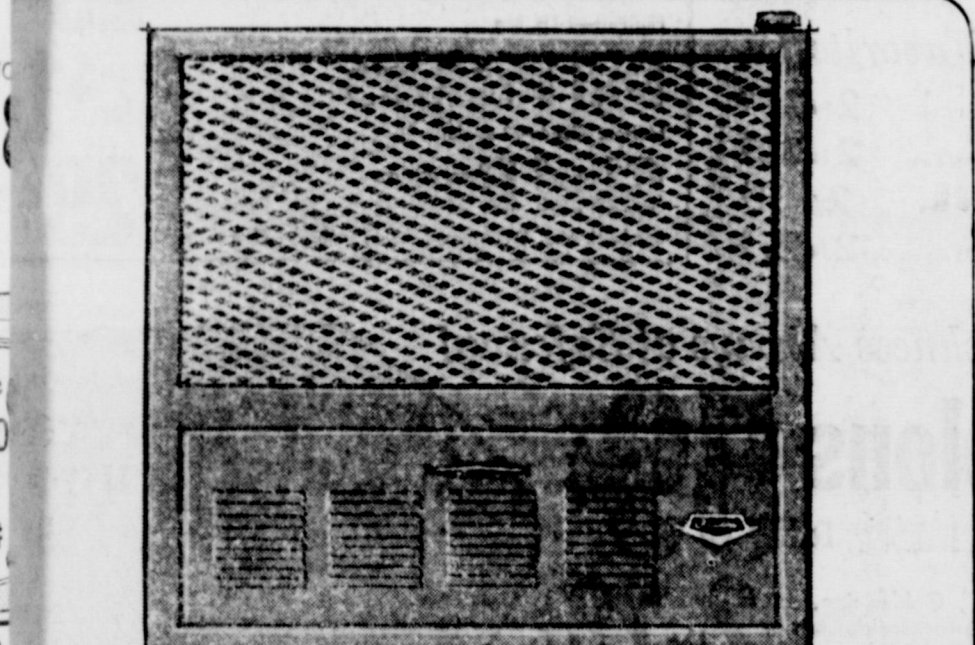

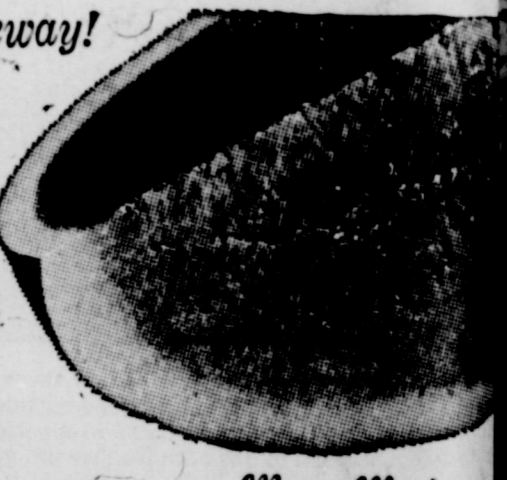
