Dr. Nicksick Resigns for Wharton JC; Dean Mince Is Acting RJC President

Dr. Theodore Nicksick, Jr., president of Ranger Junior College since 1959, has announced his resignation, effective June 1, to accept the position as president of Wharton County Junior College.

During the seven year presidency of Dr. Nicksick, the Ranger college has experienced a period of very substantial growth and development. Expansion of facilities includes the Science building, Academic building, Administration building, Gymnasium, football stadium, Track, a Girl's Dormitory, Boy's Dormitory, and the purchase of Paramount Hotel.

These added facilities have been a factor in the 48 percent increase in enrollment during these years.

The couple has two daughters, Jana, 10, student in Young School, and Suzanne, 7, student at Hodges Oak Park.

During a called meeting of the Board of Regents, Ranger Junior College, Dean E. W. Mince was appointed acting president of the College, to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Dr. Theodore Nicksick, Jr. This announcement comes from John Wylie, Secretary of the Board.

Mr. Mince assumed his duties as Dean of RJC on Sept. 1, 1965. Prior to this, he was associated with Henderson Junior College, Athens, from 1949 to 1956. He was assistant Dean of the College when he left Henderson to go to Cisco where he served as Dean and Registrar from August, 1956 to June 1, 1965.

The Mince's reside at 216 Lula St. Their daughters, Karen, 14, and Weta, 10, are students in Ranger Schools. They are active members of the First Baptist Church. Mr. Mince is a member of Ranger Rotary Club.

Open House Sunday, 1-5, At Wanda's Wonderland

Parents and other grown-ups will have an opportunity to visit the wonderful world of children at Wanda's Wonderland Sunday during an open house from 1 to 5 p. m. it has been announced.

The child-care center is located at 1001 W. Commerce St. and is owned and operated by Mrs. George (Wanda) Webb. Built and decorated "strictly" for the young folks, the center features many attractions which appeal to both youngsters and their parents. Air conditioning throughout, the center has a fenced play yard with a large assortment of entertaining devices.

Inside, the paneled room are inviting, and the entire facility is built to state-approved specifications and a state-licensed nursery facility.

Refreshments are to be served during the open house and visitors will be given an opportunity of examining the complete center. The building houses two bedrooms (with cot-type beds for up to 25 youngsters), a glassed-in kitchen (so the attendant can watch their charges constantly), two dining rooms (one for the little ones and another for older children, bathroom facilities and an isolation ward, to be used in case of emergency or sickness).

Supervisors are Mrs. Minnie Thurman, Mrs. Lula Mae Walker and the night attendant is Claudie Harris. The facility will operate in two shifts per day, from 7 a. m. to 3 p. m. and from 3 p. m. to 11 p. m.

The experienced personnel will provide child training. Meals and snacks will be provided each child while in the center.

Need for such a facility has been repeatedly expressed in Eastland in the past few years, as a much-needed service, particularly for working mothers, it is reported.

The building features acoustical ceilings, tile flooring throughout and ever-safety feature imaginable (no electrical outlets) built in.

The Webbs own and operate Webb's 7-11 Grocery on West Main St. and own and have under lease the drive-in restaurant next door known as the Texan on West Main St.

Citation of Merit Awarded To Eastland P.O. for Beauty

Eastland has been selected to receive a special "Citation of Merit" on May 31 for outstanding cooperation in President Johnson's Natural Beauty program by creating a more attractive setting for the Eastland Post Office, it was recently announced by Representative Omar Burleson.

Alan Dupre of Dallas, assistant regional director, will be here on May 31 and at noon a presentation of the award will be made to Eastland Post Office personnel. It will be a brief ceremony.

While interviewing Postmaster Mrs. Marene Johnson, she stated that these improvements are in their tenth year and that she has never requested any special funds for the improvements.

"The Eastland Post Office has attracted a tremendous number of travelers and has been an asset to the city," Mrs. Johnson stated.

Added to the attractions is the annual Flag Day ceremony. This year will be an exceptional one, in that Dyess Air Force Base, Captain Watkins of public relations, is planning a full scale event, details to be announced later, according to Mrs. Johnson.

Congressman Burleson said that he was advised by the Postmaster General Lawrence J. O'Brien that the citation is awarded only to those communities in which an outstanding job has been done to enhance the exterior appearance of the post office.

Post offices receiving superior ratings, a pre-requisite for the award, must pass a rigorous inspection by regional postal officials before being considered.

"Mr. O'Brien has told me that many hours have been spent to upgrade the area around the Eastland Post Office," Congressman Burleson reported. "I commend the Postmaster, the postal employees and private citizens who assisted in this worthy effort. NUT CASE BEARER SPRAY TIME SET MAY 28 or 30

Pecan growers, at their annual spring meeting held in the Brown Jug Cafe in Gordon recently, heard Texas A&M horticulturists advise that with continued warm weather, May 28 or 30 would likely be the proper time to spray for the first generation of the nut case bearer, according to Eastland County Agent J. M. Cooper.

This is several days later than normal due to the continued cool weather, except for the past few days. The cool, damp weather of April retarded the growth of the larvae of this most destructive of all pecan insects, Cooper said.

The event, sponsored by the county pecan growers association, had three of the top horticulturists of the state on the all day program. They included Fred Brison and B. G. Hancock of Texas A&M as well as T. E. Denman of the Agricultural Experiment Station, Stephenville.

Included on the agenda was marketing, control of several of the insects and diseases that infect the nuts, systemic insecticides, banding and other related topics.

A. D. Ellington, Cisco, President of the organization said that besides local orchardists there were growers in attendance from Cooke, Stephens, Taylor, Earth, Colahan, Comanche, Fisher, Nolan, Coleman, and Parker.

Many of the large growers use 2 pounds of Sevin powder, 2 percent zinc sulphate, 100 gallons of water spray for the case of the rosette. The nutritional disease, to the County Agent. Seven powder is the safest of the varieties and has a long life.

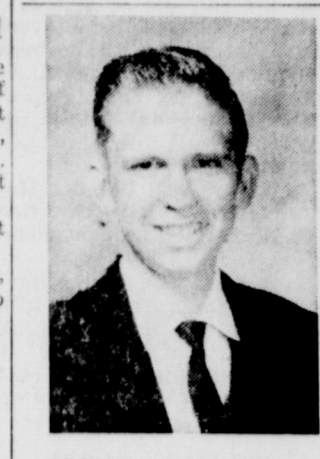

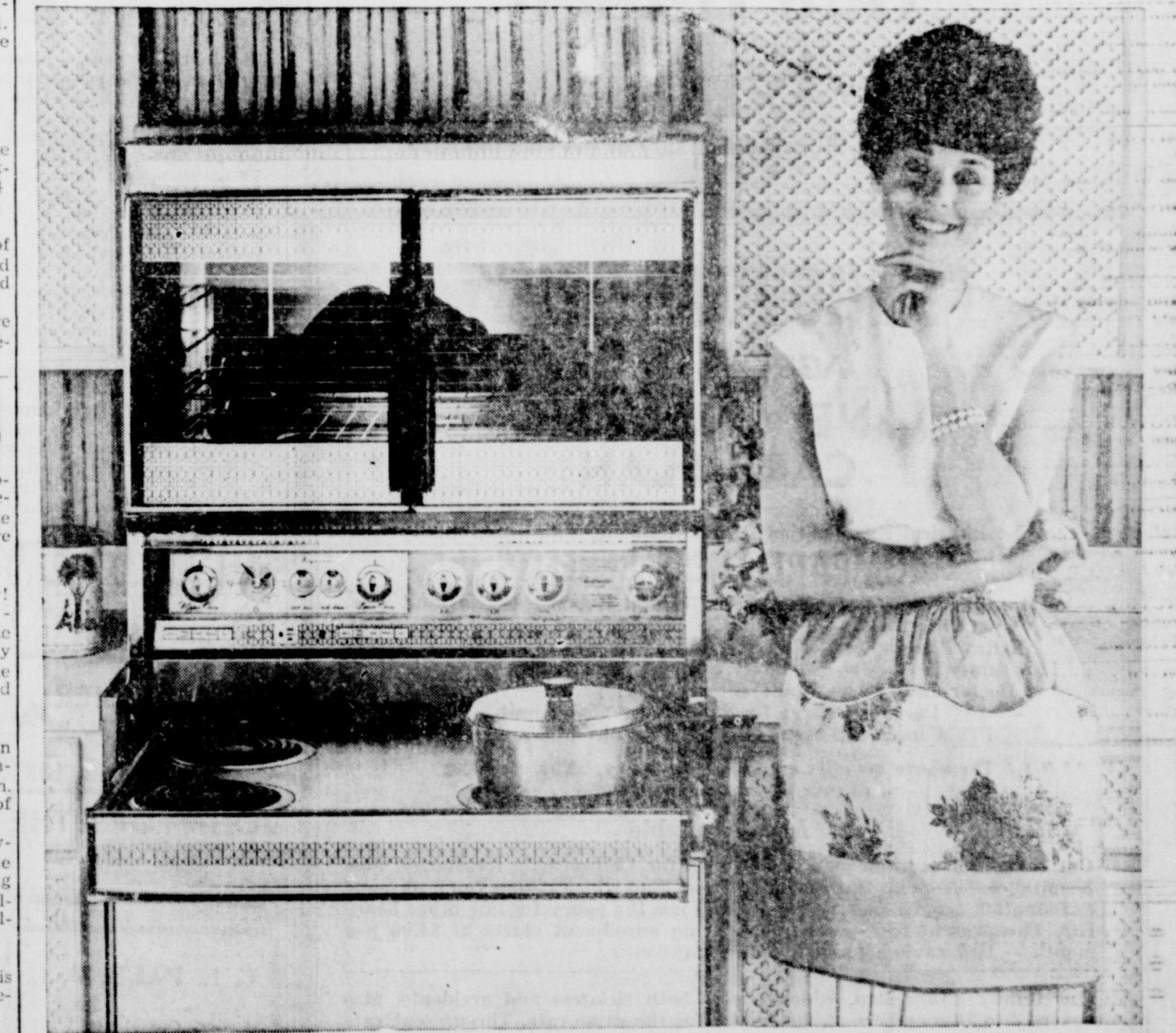

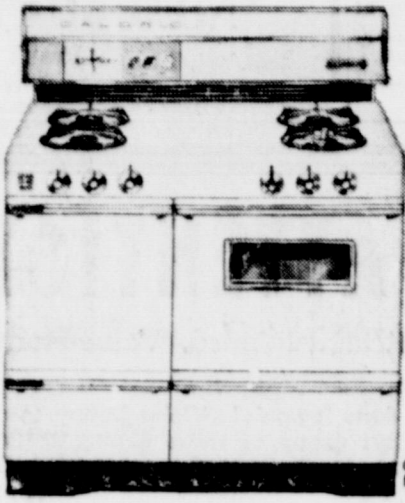

Start Now For Bluebonnets In Spring Of 1967

AUSTIN — Now is the time for the Texas Highway Department to come to the aid of all gardeners who long for their own private patch of bluebonnets — next year.

Every year about this time the Department, which plants the azure blossoms along the state's highways, is bombarded with letters from people who want to know how to plant and care for Texas' famed state flower.

The letters no doubt are prompted by the oceans of blue which begin to blossom about this time on countryside all over the state.

As a matter of fact, bluebonnets are already blooming along South Texas highways and should be appearing in the rest of the state soon.

Of course, it is too late to plant bluebonnets for enjoyment during the current season, but the Highway Department answers each "green thumb" letter to help the writers include bluebonnets in their gardening plans.

First, gardeners, and sight-seers, too, should remember that the bluebonnet blooming date is influenced by the weather. After a severe winter, they bloom late. A mild one means early blossoms.

Generally, the first flowers open about the middle of March in the southern part of the state. But the first flowers may not show up before May 1 in the more northern sections. The length of the blooming season is about one month.

Those who want to either seed should keep in mind that the seed mature about six weeks after the last flowers fade. Seeds should be harvested before their pods explode and scatter the seeds.

Bluebonnet seed can be planted immediately after harvest or can be stored. Seeds should be planted before November 1, however, so they can germinate and grow through the winter months. It is during this period that a heavy root system and a healthy plant develops to produce an abundance of spring flowers.

The bluebonnet seed can be obtained from seed distributors if orders are placed well before the crop is ready for harvest. Although the Highway Department harvests seed from time to time, it does not save any for the ensuing season. The department mows the plants when the seeds are mature and immediately distributes them thinly over the area to be seeded.

Inoculation of bluebonnet seed prior to planting is extremely important. It is important because bluebonnets require the presence of certain bacteria for their root system to form the nodules on the roots and carry on the nitrogen fixation process.

The bacteria, called inoculants, can be purchased at commercial seed stores.

As for soil, bluebonnets grow best in well drained, sweet (contains lime) soil of moderate fertility.

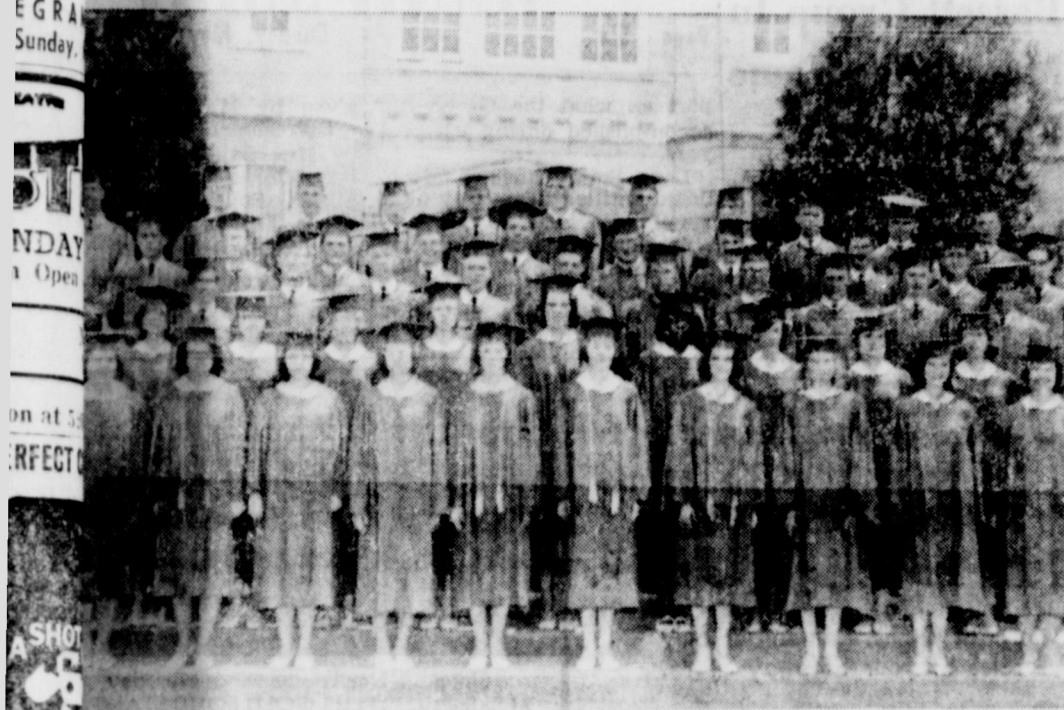
