## 371 Enroll Monday In Grades 1-6 for New Term

Registration for grades one through eight was held Monday, August 15, at the Eastland Elementary School. Incomplete figures released by R. O. Baze, Elementary School principal, show 371 pupils for grades 1 through 5.

The third grade, with 56 students, is a little larger than expected and the fifth grade's 63 students is somewhat smaller, according to Baze.

Other grades are: first, 65; second, 60; fourth, 55; and sixth, 72.

Students who failed to register Monday may register between now and September 1 at the elementary school office, between 9 and 12 a. m.

Students entering first grade must have a birth certificate and proof of smallpox vaccination.

## Safety Experts Urge 'Defensive Driving' In Cars

In the era of steadily increasing auto accidents with their consequence deaths and injuries, the safety experts have coined a new phrase to help us survive in traffic — "Defensive driving."

What is defensive driving? Basically, it is keeping full control of your car at all times so that you can avoid an accident no matter what the other fellow does.

Some of the fundamentals of defensive driving are outlined in TODAY'S HEALTH, the magazine of the American Medical Association.

Never "tailgate." This practice of following too closely the vehicle ahead has been found to be a common cause of accidents. Stay back one car length for each 10 miles of speed.

When you have a driver tailgating you, slow down and encourage him to pass. Expect the driver ahead of you to brake without warning. Watch especially for situations which will cause him to slow down or stop.

Stop smoothly and gradually when there is a vehicle behind you. Signal your intentions of stopping, slowing down, or turning.

Look to the left, look to the right when approaching an intersection. Never assume the other driver will yield the right-of-way, even if you have the green light.

When in doubt, never pass. Before you change lanes check your rearview mirror and glance to be sure your blind spot is clear. Use your turn signals when passing.

Make certain someone behind you is not trying to pass you at the same time. When passing, sound horn or flick your lights to let the driver ahead know. Accelerate and pass quickly. Get back quickly after you can clearly see the car in your rearview mirror.

The expert driver follows some basic common-sense rules, TODAY'S HEALTH says.

He keeps his eyes moving, thus avoiding eye-holding situations while his car moves blindly into an accident-producing situation.

The expert takes in the whole picture. He trains himself to scan the entire driving scene for a full city block or a half mile on rural roads.

The expert leaves an out for himself by maintaining a "space cushion" for maneuvering.

The expert signals others his intentions early while he still has time and space to avoid them if they do not respond.

### Veterans New Educational Benefits Listed

Approximately 28,000 veterans in the Waco Veterans Administration Regional Office Area are expected to apply for educational benefits under PL 89-358 during the first year, according to Jack Coker, Manager of the Waco Regional Office.

The first payments have now been issued to veterans enrolled in summer schools and these payments were for attendance during the month of June. Payments may be made only after the VA receives a certificate of attendance submitted by the veteran at the end of each month he is in attendance.

Coker cautioned that students reporting for school this fall should have sufficient funds in addition to enrollment costs to support themselves for at least two months, since it takes approximately that long before the first VA check may be issued. Students should be prepared also to supplement educational allowance payments, as normally these payments will not be sufficient to cover all of their educational expenses.

Veterans applying for benefits will receive a certificate of eligibility showing the school and the training objective they have selected.

These are presented to the schools which in turn will certify veterans' enrollments. Coker urged that veterans be sure that they meet entrance requirements and that they will be accepted by their chosen school before filing an application for educational benefits.

## Vets' Q&A

Q — I am a serviceman with more than two years of service, but have less than 180 days since January 31, 1965. Am I eligible for educational benefits under the new GI Bill?

A — Yes. Two years of active service, any part of which was after January 31, 1955, qualifies you. But, you are eligible — month for month — for only that time you have served since that date.

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 13 proposing an Amendment to Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 2 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, effective February 1, 1968, by deleting the following language:

"and provided further, that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said tax before offering to vote at any election in this State and hold a receipt showing that said poll tax was paid before the first day of February next preceding such election. Or if said voter shall have lost or misplaced said tax receipt, he or she, as the case may be, shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths that such tax receipt has been lost. Such affidavit shall be in writing and left with the judge of the election. The husband may pay the poll tax of his wife and receive the receipt therefor. In like manner, the wife may pay the poll tax of her husband and receive the receipt therefor.

provided, however, that before offering to vote at an election a voter shall have registered annually, but such requirement for registration shall not be considered a qualification of an elector within the meaning of the term 'qualified elector' as used in any other Article of this Constitution in respect to any matter except qualification and eligibility to vote at an election. Any legislation enacted in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment shall not be invalid because of its anticipatory nature. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting. And this provision of the Constitution shall be self-enacting without the necessity of further legislation. Any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or component branches thereof; or in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of entering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces."

Section 2. That Section 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by changing the word "may" to "shall" in the last clause thereof and by deleting the words "in all cities containing a population of ten thousand inhabitants or more."

The text of this Section, as so amended, is shown below, with the deleted language marked through by a broken line and with the new language underscored:

"Section 4. In all elections by the people, the vote shall be by ballot, and the Legislature shall provide for the numbering of tickets and make such other regulations as may be necessary to detect and punish fraud and preserve the purity of the ballot box; and the Legislature may shall provide by law for the registration of all voters in all cities containing a population of ten thousand inhabitants or more."

Section 3. If any other Amendment to Sections 2 or 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, being for a different purpose, is adopted at an earlier election or at the same election, the adoption of this Amendment shall not be construed as nullifying any change made by such other Amendment.

Section 4. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR repealing the poll tax as a requirement for voting."

"AGAINST repealing the poll tax as a requirement for voting."

Section 5. If the foregoing Amendment is adopted, the proclamation of the Governor declaring the adoption of the Amendment shall set forth the full text of the amended Sections, as amended herein and as amended by any other proposed Amendment which is submitted by the 59th Legislature and which has been duly adopted prior to such proclamation.

Section 6. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 65 proposing an Amendment to Section 3-b of Article VII of the Constitution of Texas providing that school taxes heretofore voted in any independent school district shall not be abrogated, cancelled or invalidated by a change in boundaries nor shall bonds voted, but unissued, at the time of such change, be invalidated by such change; authorizing the levy of taxes after such change without further election in the district as changed; providing an exception in the case of the annexation or consolidation of whole districts; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 3-b of Article VII of the Constitution of Texas be amended to be and read as follows:

"Section 3-b. No tax for the maintenance of public free schools voted in any independent school district and no tax for the maintenance of a junior college voted by a junior college district, nor any bonds unissued, shall be abrogated, cancelled or invalidated by change of any kind in the boundaries thereof. After any change in boundaries, the governing body of any such district, without the necessity of an additional election, shall have the power to assess, levy and collect ad valorem taxes on all taxable property in the district as changed, for the payment of principal of and interest on such bonds in the manner permitted by the laws under which such bonds were voted. In those instances where the boundaries of any such independent school district are changed by the annexation of, or consolidation with, one or more whole school districts, the taxes to be levied for the purposes hereinabove authorized may be in the amount or at not to exceed the rate theretofore voted in the district having at the time of such change the greatest scholastic population according to the latest scholastic census and only the unissued bonds of such district voted prior to such change, may be

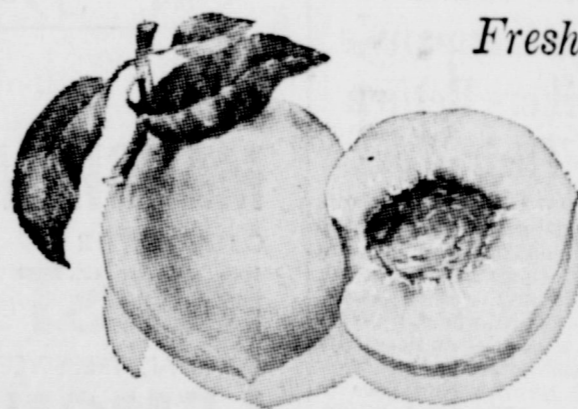
