Hospital Okayed for Medicare -- to Effect Friday

Memorial Hospital, which has been certified for Medicare, will begin accepting Medicare patients Friday, June 15, following a decision by the Medicare Administrative Review Board.

Leon Musgrove, director of the hospital, said the letter of certification was received from the Medicare Administrative Review Board on June 15, following a hearing held during the week of June 13.

There are approximately 6,000 people in Eastland County eligible for Medicare benefits, and the hospital expects to receive an average of 100 Medicare patients a month.

The hospital board recently purchased property across the street east of the hospital, which is now occupied by Truett Gregory, Borden Milk Distribution Office and Storage. The property was bought for future hospital expansion.

No expensive corrections of administrative and operational methods were required, and such as were required, have been met, Musgrove said.

At mid-week there were 23 patients in the hospital who are 65 years of age, he said. Patient census for the months of May and June has been below average, he added.

There has been speculation nationally that there will be a heavy influx of patients following the opening of the Medicare program.

The hospital board recently purchased property across the street east of the hospital, which is now occupied by Truett Gregory, Borden Milk Distribution Office and Storage. The property was bought for future hospital expansion.

Eastland Memorial Hospital, in operation about 14 years, has increased its patient capacity from about 26 to 80 in that time. Latest building project added a records room in anticipation of Medicare requirements.

Gorman Man Injured by Shotgun Blast at Lake Leon; Charge Filed

Charges of aggravated assault with a deadly weapon were filed Monday afternoon in Eastland against N. G. (Bill) Sharp, 64, of Lake Leon after the shooting of Hulan (Pete) Underwood, about 47, of Gorman at Lake Leon, according to Eastland County Sheriff L. E. Sublett. Mr. Short was released after posting \$1,000 bond.

The shooting occurred at 8:30 a. m. Monday at Sharp's cabin, it was reported. Underwood had gone to Sharp's cabin and had started pulling on the locked screen door. Sharp asked Underwood to leave, but he continued pulling at the door, it was stated. Sharp went into another room and returned with a 12 gauge shotgun and shot Underwood just above the left elbow.

Following the shooting, Underwood got into his car and drove to neighbor's cabin about a mile away. They called an ambulance and he

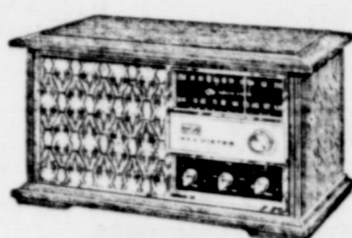

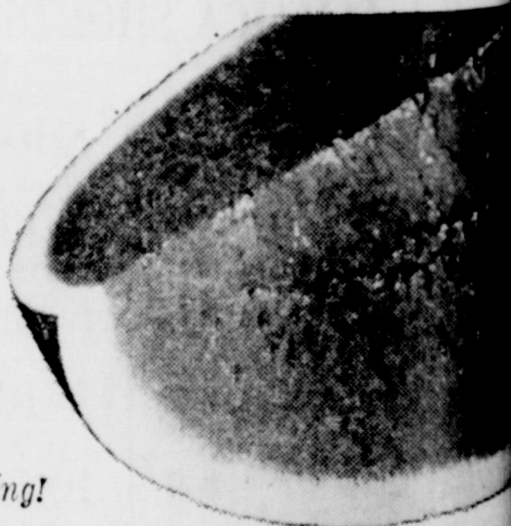
