THE 4TH OF July holiday weekend might not be a good time to think about it, but it appears that Eastland County auto owners' insurance will go up about \$4 or \$5 when the state rates are hiked Aug. 1. Although the insurance board cites usual reasons for increases ("Both the average cost and the frequency of accidents continue to rise in Texas adding dollars of costs to insurance premiums" and "Increases of insured losses result in increases of premiums under all types of rating laws," etc.) it appears that local auto owners will pay more (up some \$5 for the owner with no male driver under 25 who drives to and from work, but does not use it in his work) for complete comprehensive coverage. The same driver will have no increase for bodily injury, pay \$1 more for property damage, \$2 less for \$100 deductible collision, for an over-all increase for 10-20-5 liability, \$100 deductible collision full coverage.

Rates are pretty individualized but reports from the board show that Eastland County rates will go up like this for standard bodily injury (10,000-\$20,000) and property (10,000-\$20,000) and property (10,000-\$20,000) and property (10,000-\$20,000).

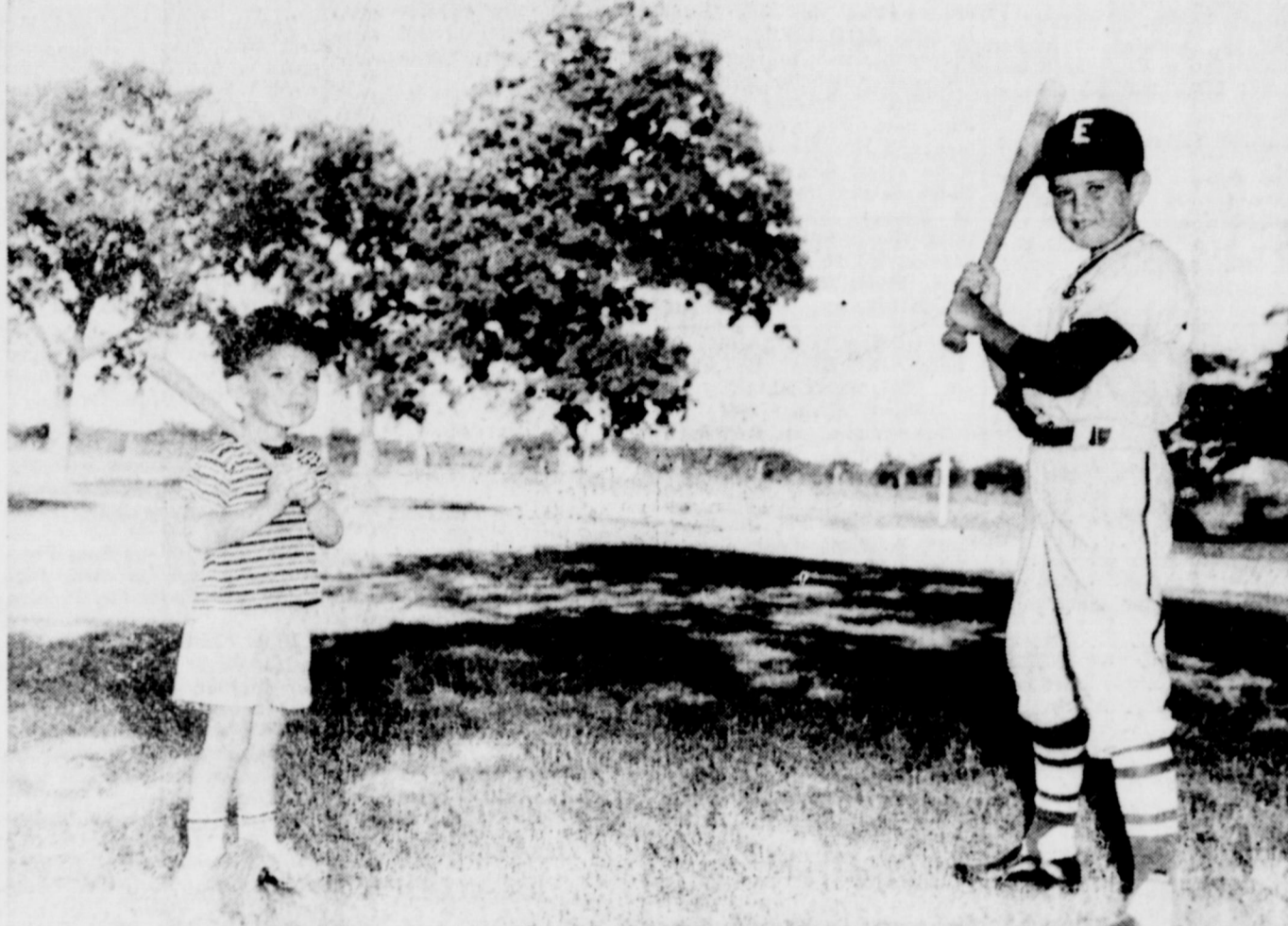
Car Accident On Main St. Early Friday

THIRD HISTORICAL MARKER WILL BE ERECTED THIS FALL

Eastland County's third official Texas Historical Marker is expected to be erected at Frank A. Gray Memorial Park in Gorman in early fall, according to Mike Collins, County Historical Committee.

The metal marker is now at the foundry, and upon its arrival, a dedication ceremony will be held, he said.

The following is what will be on the marker:

OLD SHINOAK SPRINGS

Named for dwarf oaks. Before fencing began in 1880's, springs attracted cattle, horses, deer. Settlers hauled water for home and stock use.

Town of Shinoak Springs thrived until M. K. & T. Railroad bypassed it in 1880. Schoolhouse of rawhide lumber was built in 1882. Had seats of split logs. Pupils numbered 55. School grounds drew crowds of 8,000 for political rallies and camp meetings.

A lake was formed 1911 by a rock dam. "Frank Gray Memorial Park," given to City of Gorman, is now recreation and reunion ground, at site of old springs.

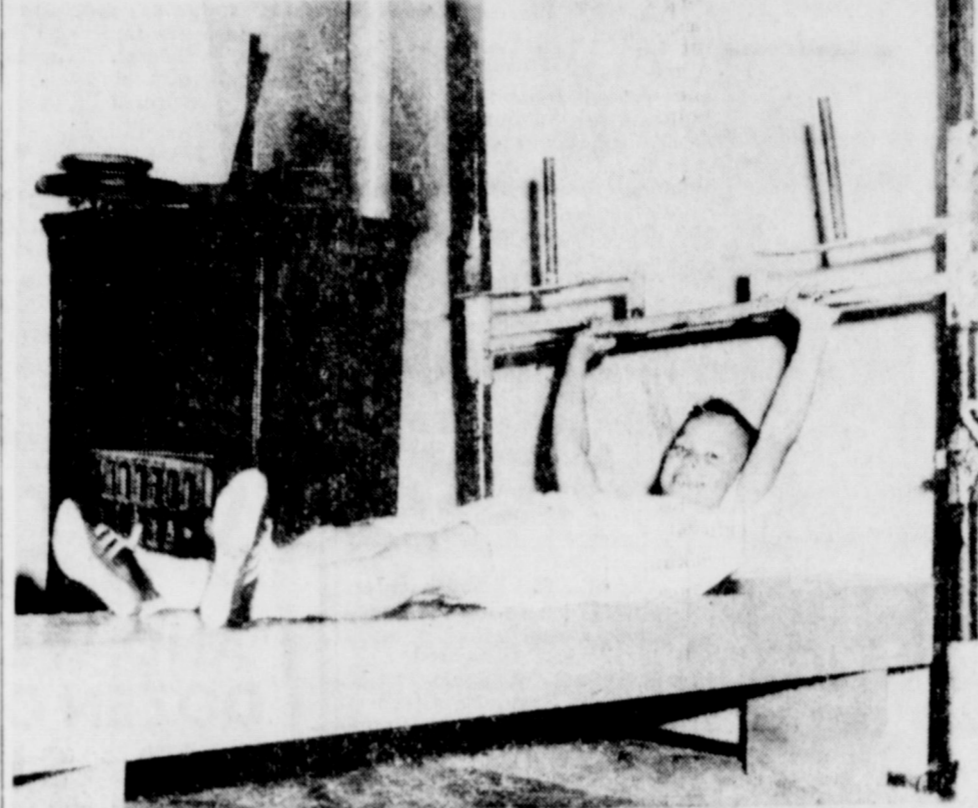

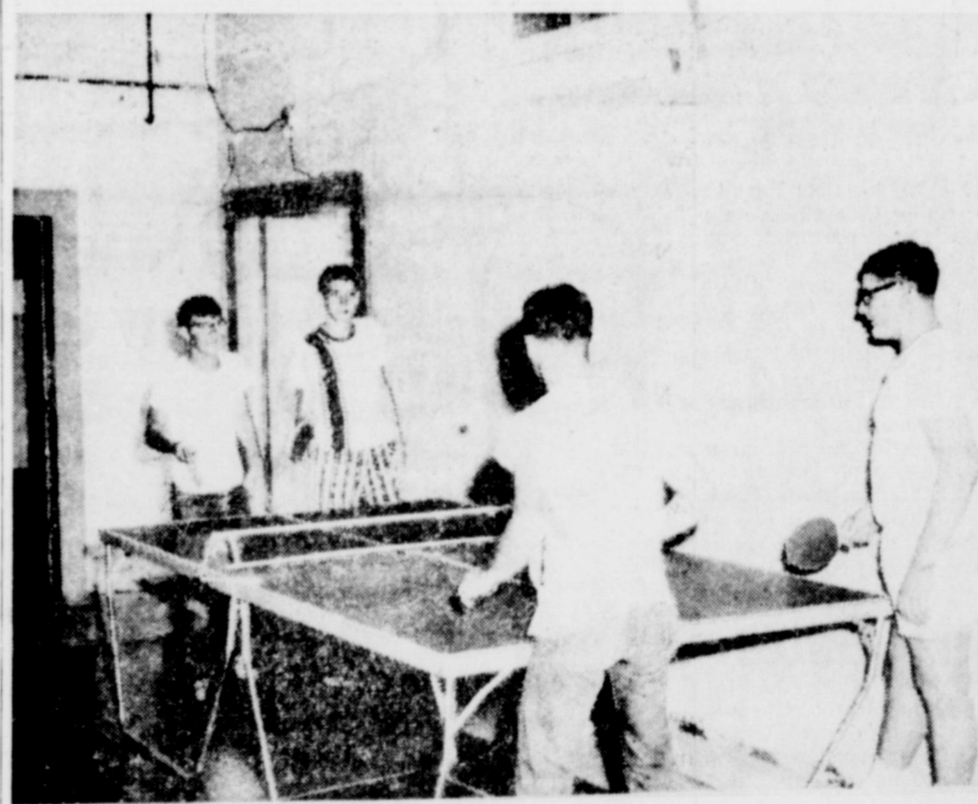
