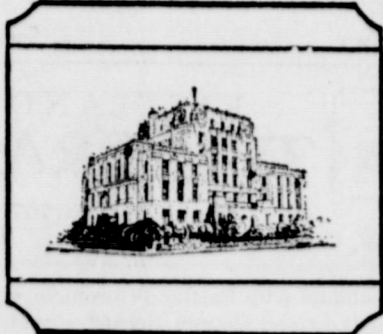

EASTLAND WOMAN'S LOVE FOR THIS TOWN SUBJECT 'GRIT' PIECE

Mrs. A. E. Cushman, librarian at Eastland Public Library, has an article entitled "I'm Proud of My Town!" in the current issue of Grit, a tabloid weekly newspaper published in Williamsport, Pa.

The article follows: "With a do-it-yourself philosophy, my home town of Eastland, Tex. built a new community hospital without government aid, borrowing, or bond issues. What is more, the hospital is paying its own way, and patients can get good rooms for \$10 a day.

"Business and professional men, laborers, technicians, housewives, and ranchers in Eastland and the surrounding area donated time and money. Building materials were obtained at reduced prices, or in some instances were donated. Equipment was purchased from a hospital that had closed, and the town council provided a site for the institution.

"Work went surprisingly fast in light of the fact that most of the work was done at night after the workers had finished their own days.

"The first wing, with 22 beds, was occupied immediately. Since then other wings have been added until the hospital now has a capacity of 60 patients and for an average of 50 persons a day."

Eastland National Bank Deposits Near \$6 Million

Deposits at Eastland National Bank were approaching the \$6 million figure at mid-year, according to a statement of condition at the close of business June 30.

The report issued by the bank shows \$5,996,943.37 on deposit and \$2,723,579.78 on loan as of that date. Total resources are listed at \$6,483,782.95.

Deposits, loans and total resources are up from the first quarter report issued April 5, when \$5,928,947.71 was on deposit, \$2,654,027.44 on loan, with \$6,403,769.22 in total resources.

Eastland National shows the greatest increase in deposits over a year ago, when \$5,129,402.59 was recorded for the mid-1965 deposit level. At that time, \$2,533,214.91 was on loan and total resources was \$5,583,192.76.

The June report in 1964 listed \$4,853,257.91 on deposit; \$2,126,923.97 on loan; and total resources \$5,077,376.53.

What lies ahead for the "vacation" months? Anybody's guess, but a check of last year's reports for June and then three months later on the first day of October, are optimistic. Deposits and total resources rose between June and October of '65, with loans dropping very slightly. Deposits in October, 1965, were \$5,318,775.63, up from \$5,129,402.59 in June. Loans were down from 2,533,214.91 in June to \$2,530,428.09 in October. Total resources climbed from \$5,583,192.76 in June to \$5,789,469.82 in October.

Murder Suspects Face New Charges in Breck

The trio of Eastland County men being held in San Antonio on charges of murder, robbery and kidnapping in Stephens County have also been charged with nighttime burglary in Breckenridge and investigations continue in connection with a similar robbery and killing in Breckenridge.

The three, Claude Dean Edwards, 24, of Ranger; Ronald Wilhelm, 23 of San Antonio and formerly of this county; and Gene McCain 21 of Eastland were being sought by Stephens County authorities even before the series of incidents in San Antonio which resulted in their arrests it is reported here.

Eastland and Stephens Counties sheriffs department officials were in Graham after the Breck slaying but before the San Antonio incident tracking down leads on "Buck Snot" Edwards. A \$250 saddle stolen in Brownwood was turned up in Graham and the person who had it produced a receipt showing that they had paid Edwards \$25 for the saddle.

The three men have also been charged in justice of the peace court in Breckenridge Friday with nighttime burglary in connection with the theft of guns from the home of Keith McDonald who lives in the south part of Stephens County just across the Eastland County line.

The three men are being held without bond and a sheriff's officer has reported that no charges have been filed in San Antonio yet.

It is being surmised that if charges are not perfected in Bexar County the group will be brought back to Breckenridge to answer to charges there.

Edwards was scheduled to have been tried in 91st District Court about two weeks ago for attempted rape but the case was postponed in favor of two bootlegging cases a county official said Friday.

He married Mrs. Irene Ellen Gray in Baird on Oct. 10, 1942.

Survivors are his wife, three sons, George Jr. of Dallas, O. D. of Eastland, A. G. of Florida; three daughters, Mrs. J. L. Riggan, Mrs. W. P. Crabtree and Mrs. D. D. Allen, all of Eastland; one brother, Will of Eastland; one sister Mrs. Guy Dunaway of Ranger; 12 grandchildren; eight great-grandchildren and several nieces and nephews.

Eastland County men arrested by authorities in connection with the slaying last of a Breckenridge station attendant and a crime in San Antonio. Authorities were also for another Eastland resident on the same men, Donald Edward 23, Arthur Eugene 20 and Claude Dean 22, all white males, were being held on bond. A. D. Arvel Stuart, 29 year old male from Cisco, was sought for questioning cases.

They were also being questioned in connection with an identical slaying which was in San Antonio early in the year.

Stuart and McCain were in San Antonio. Wilbur was in the state prison after being convicted in 1962 in Eastland for burglary.

\$750,000 Suit Names Mr. Allen

Patsy Riedel, widow of the late Dr. Albert F. Riedel, of Dallas has filed suit in 91st District Court asking damages in the amount of \$751,780.70 of Ivan J. Allen of Eastland County.

Mr. Allen was acquitted by a jury in the same court Jan. 24, 1966, in the murder of his nephew, Dr. Riedel on the Allen ranch near Ranger, Nov. 7, 1965.

Filed by a Dallas law firm, the suit lists Mrs. Riedel and children, Dana Scott, 16; Allen Harrison, 14; Rebecca Sue, 11; and Allison Lynn Riedel, 6, as plaintiffs.

Five points of alleged negligence are listed in the suit. Mr. Allen is some 80 years old.

ASCS COMMUNITY COMMITTEE ELECTIONS SET IN SEPTEMBER

The 1967 Community Committee elections will be held by mail on Sept. 7, according to Jesse Meredith, office manager of the Eastland County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office. Newly elected committeemen will take office on Oct. 1.

Community boundaries are designated as A through F and are the same as for 1966, he said. Petitions signed by at least six eligible voters may nominate eligible candidates. Nominations by petition must be received in the county office not later than Aug. 5, Mr. Meredith said. Committeemen should be currently engaged in the operation of a farm and should be representative of the various sections of agriculture in the community.

The county and community committee will be responsible for completing the slate of nominees.

Mr. Meredith said persons who were prevented from planting cotton or feed grains because of drought or flood may file for an application for adjustment in acreage at the ASCS office. If the adjustment request is approved the acreage may be considered as planted for program payment purposes, he added. The land where the crop was to have been planted must be designated and identified. This land may be used for crops which quotas are not in effect and for crops which volunteer programs are not in effect. Mr. Meredith said for additional information contact his office.

Unemployment Is At Low Mark In Texas For Year

AUSTIN — State insured unemployment dipped to 23,737 claimants at mid-May to reach its lowest level since September of 1957, the Texas Employment Commission's monthly Texas Labor Market Report revealed this week.

Representing 1.1 per cent of the approximately 2.1 million Texas workers now covered by unemployment insurance program, it is the lowest rate since October of 1956 when it was also 1.1 per cent of an insured labor force of 1.7 million.

In May of 1965, the number of insured unemployed stood at 38,799, or 39 per cent higher than the corresponding 1966 mid-May total. A statewide total of \$2.5 million in unemployment insurance benefits was paid out in May compared to \$4 million in May of 1965.

At mid-May, claimants filing claims for 15 weeks or more represented 17 per cent of all claimants compared to 19 per cent at mid-May of 1965, while 39 per cent fell in the less than 5 week group compared to 35 per cent at mid-May of 1965. This indicates that claimants are finding work earlier than they were able to find it last year.

The book concerns deep South politics.
