





# Oil Test Is Announced For County

The venture went to about 3,500 feet and plans call for the hole to be deepened to the Ellenburger lime at about 4,300 feet from the surface. The project is the Seldon Baker No. 1.

Elsewhere, Piedmont Oil Company of Denton has announced plans to re-enter the W. B. Hamilton et al No. 1 Mrs. J. F. Penn, drilled in 1952, and deepen it to 4,300 feet for a test of the Ellenburger. Location is two and a half miles west of Cisco. It was understood that a gas show was logged in the test that was abandoned. Location was given as 330 feet from the south and east lines of Section 11, Block E, BBB&C Survey.

O-K Exploration Co. of Abilene has announced a shallow test as their No. 1 Jeff Pippen, six and a half miles west of Cisco near Dothan. The hole will go to 600 feet to the Dothan Sand. Location is 1,290 feet from the south and 783 feet from the east lines of Section 3168, TE&L Survey.

A recent area failure was the Ben Hobbs No. 1 J. B. Harlow, deep test near the Joy Drive-in midway between Cisco and Eastland. The project sought Lake Sand gas or oil but failed to find it. It was abandoned, according to reports.

Moore Engineering Abilene has announced deepening the well drilled by Tex - Star Oil and Low Drilling at their No. 1 R. E. located near the East-Stephens County line eight miles northeast of Cisco.

# Medical Doctors Are On Increase In State Of Texas

AUSTIN—At the beginning of 1966, there were 11,218 physicians (doctors of medicine) in Texas and 292,088 in the United States. With the recent graduations from the nation's 88 medical schools, the physician population will reach a new medical milestone and go over the 300,000 mark. The number of physicians in the United States has been increasing faster than the general population for several years. The population of Texas is currently estimated to be 10,790,000. At the present time, Texas has a ratio of one physician for every 954 people. The physician population growth in Texas is expected to be even greater in the very near future with the opening of the new University of Texas Medical School in San Antonio. The admission of its first class this fall will give Texas four medical schools.

The demand for medical service, according to the Texas Medical Association, will, of course also continue to grow. In addition to the fact that Texas is one of the major "growth" states, new medical programs such as "Medicare" will put an increased load on the present physician population.

Individual physicians, through their county medical Association, and the American Medical Association, have done much to increase the physician population through extensive medical career promotion programs, developing medical school scholarship plans, supporting legislation to establish additional medical schools, and other activities designed to attract more young people into the practice of medicine.

According to the American Medical Association, there are more applicants to medical school, more students enrolled and more MDs being graduated than ever before. In the 1964-65 school year, the nation's 88 medical schools had a total enrollment of 32,428 students and graduated a record 7,409 new MDs.

# Hints Given To Improve Quality Of Peanut Crop

Suggestions on cultural practices for good quality in peanuts were offered this week by R. G. Burwell, peanut representative of Corn Products Company.

- Here are some points that will help, he said.
1. Cultivate to avoid throwing dirt to the plants. Use rotary hoe or other roary devices. This will help you keep down Southern blight.
  2. If you plan to irrigate; apply water after plants begin to bloom and when 50 per cent of the soil moisture has been used from the top 2 feet of soil. The critical moisture point of the peanut plant is during the blooming period; set these first blooms to make a good crop.
  3. Keep on the look-out for the lesser cornstalk borer. At first signs of infestation, spray or apply granular material in a 12-inch band mixed in the soil when plants begin the bloom. Repeat insecticide spray applications at 2 to 4 week intervals as needed for control. Apply spray with two cone nozzles per row at 60 pounds per square inch spraying pressure directed to cover the lower stems and a 6-inch band of soil on each side of the row. To do this job several insecticides are recommended such as 1 1/2 pound DDT technical material as spray or 2-pound technical material in granular form per acre (broadcast rate). Caution: Always use insecticides at recommended rates and apply as recommended. Always follow the directions on the label.

## Physicians, Nursing Homes; And Facts About Medicare

(Editors note: The following article is released by John M. Crawford, Jr., Austin, Executive Director, Texas Nursing Home Association.)  
 The full role of the nursing home under Medicare cannot be accurately known until after Jan. 1, 1967, the date when nursing home or extended care benefits start.  
 The role of the physician will and must continue to grow as nursing homes evolve into their rightful place as an integral part of the total health team. The physician is the key figure in determining utilization of health services. Under the new law, the physician must decide upon admission to a hospital and the subsequent transfer to the nursing home, order drugs and treatments, and determine the length of stay. Payment from the fiscal intermediary will be made only if the physician certifies the medical necessity of the services furnished.  
 For post-hospital extended care, a physician must certify that the care is required because the individual needs skilled nursing care on a continuing basis for a condition for which he was receiving hospital services prior to transfer to the nursing home.  
 The physician will assume a vital role in the utilization review committees required by the new law. Utilization review committees required home administrator and he will be calling on the physician for guidance. A change in the procedures and activities of nursing homes may evolve from this legislation. Medicare benefits are for short-term care for acute conditions, whereas current nursing home patients generally require long-term care for chronic conditions.  
 The average stay in a Texas nursing home is 18-21 months. Maximum Medicare benefits are for 100 days with only 20 of these being fully paid for by Medicare. For the remaining possible stay of 80 days, the patient must pay \$5 per day.  
 Unless a large number of registered nurses become immediately available, there will be approximately 225 participating Texas nursing homes because of the requirements that one RN must direct the nursing service and that her assistants around the clock must be licensed vocational nurses who are graduates of State-approved schools (thus eliminating the practical nurse whose examinations were waived when the Licensed Vocational Nurse Act went into effect).  
 The Medical Care Administration Services Section of the Texas State Department of Health will have the responsibility in Texas for certifying whether or not nursing homes can participate in the Medicare program.  
 In Texas, there are approximately 735 licensed nursing homes, with 36,618 patient beds, and another 140 custodial homes. During 1965, 74 new nursing homes and custodial homes were licensed. Currently there are 57 new homes, containing 2,543 beds under construction. There is not a shortage of nursing homes or nursing home beds in our state, but there is a severe shortage of professional help needed to meet the requirements of the law. The type of personnel needed to meet the requirements being discussed by the SSA and PHA are registered nurses; social workers; American Dietetic Association - qualified dieticians; licensed vocational nurses; and medical records librarians.  
 What is the future of the nursing home? Nursing homes will be recognized as an important part of the health care field, whether or not they participate in Medicare. Nursing home personnel will contribute to the strengthening of local and state public health regulations, not only to the upgrading of standards, but to the overall protection and promotion of good health in the community.  
 It will be the aim of the nursing-home profession to make available to the elderly the best of nursing care under the guidance of the patient's personal physician, or in keeping with the basic tenet of comprehensive patient care—the right patient in the right place at the right time—under professional direction and leadership.

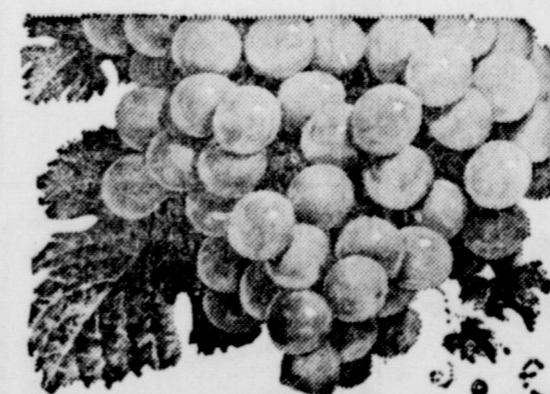
