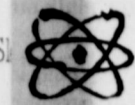

Panel Discusses Psychiatry At LVNA Meeting

Licensed Vocational Nurses Association, Division 64, recently conducted a meeting with President Gertrude Wallace presiding, and some 150 nurses attending.

Mrs. Laverne Allgood and Mrs. Lucille Broom, who attended the Psychiatric Nursing Workshop held recently in Tyler, gave the training theme for the workshop.

A panel discussion with psychiatrist instructors from Rusk State Hospital in charge. It was stated that the major form of treatment for the mentally ill is personal and group therapy and trying to understand the patient's problem and helping solve it.

Other treatments include physical therapy, such as electric and insulin shock and treatment with drugs.

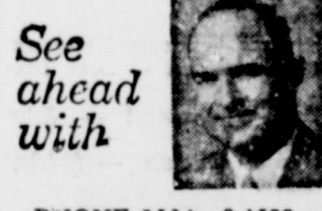

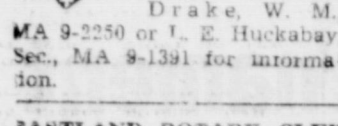

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AUSTIN—Sixty-four Texas school districts have received orders from the federal Office of Education warning of slow progress in faculty integration, reported Leon R. Graham, assistant state education commissioner. Graham said 33 other districts around the state were notified that they had violated federal law by failing to submit plans for integrating their schools.

The Office of Education expects districts to employ at least one negro teacher for each school which was previously all white and a white teacher for each school previously all Negro. Some flexibility, however, is allowed, he added.

Federal funds will be in schools which fail to comply with the regulations of the Office of Education, Graham noted, and the federal government wants full-time negro teachers, not part-timers or substitutes.

Governor's Council on Mental Retardation is studying proposal to extend services of State Welfare Department to families with mentally retarded children in 37 East Texas counties served by Denton State School.

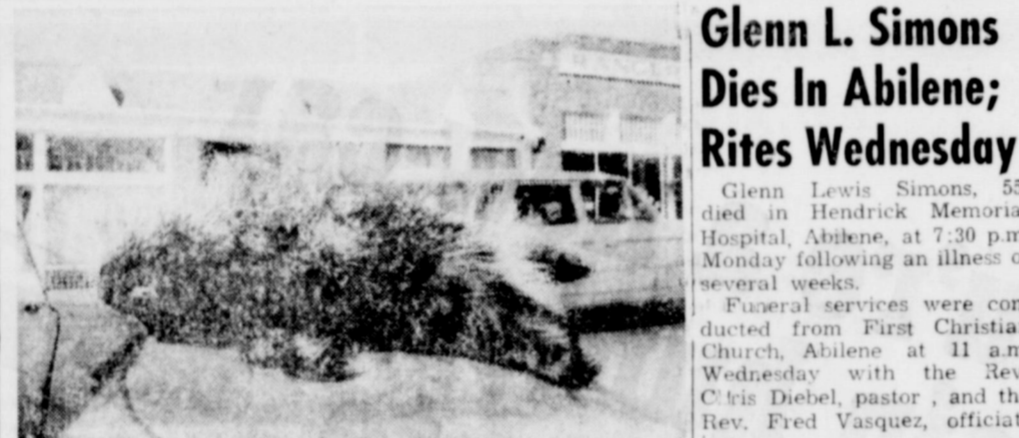

Letters TO THE EDITOR

Editor:

I know now why the jokes are about the doctor and the "couch", because as long as I am in the shop and busy I don't have time to worry, but the minute I lay down my mind goes to so many thoughts.

Lonnie Joe took his car back to base in California, had a good trip, phoned home that all was well except his sergeant talks only of going to Viet Nam. There are about 20 Marines at the camp already that have just returned from Viet Nam.

While in Viet Nam, Joe found a clipping that he tore from an Indiana paper and brought home. Tom Tiede a reporter for N.E.A. was in Viet Nam and wrote this article about a typical town, the village of Tan An Hoi:

"This is a dirty, dingy, deplorable place — crossroads to nowhere, center of nothing, a hamlet of illiterates deep in the bowels of war. Few Americans have heard of it. Yet every American is affected by it.

"It is a typical town in South Viet Nam. The destination for millions of tax dollars, mountains of munitions and thousands of forfeited lives. It is like a picture of purgatory. It is a garbage heap of social and economic woe surrounded by American troops on one side and Viet Cong guerrillas on three others.

"It is rusting rolls of barbed wire protecting nothing. It is foxholes outside of churches and sniper fire and screams in the night.

"It is the home of scorpions, pythons, large spiders with hungry eyes, rodents which attack children, ants which attack anybody, flies the size of dimes, mosquitoes with grappling hooks, featherless chickens, hairless dogs, lizards, armadillos, bats, bed bugs, cooties and some other things without names.

"So infested with vermin is it, in fact, that the children make pets of the insects. Their favorite is the cockroach, a black beetle which youngsters keep in boxes to pet, kiss, examine, trade, or when ill or old, squash.

"It is the Dark Ages, this town. And ignorance begets poverty that begets ignorance.

"Its two streets run together in a cloud of dust that rises roof high before settling on the open food in the markets. Vendors blow French bread clean before selling or tap the loaves together like blackboard erasers. The principal thoroughfare is an ox-cart road lined for a half mile with dreary shops, noodle emporiums, houses of prostitution.

"Old women who spend their days picking fleas out of people's hair. The pickers dispose of the fleas simply. They eat them.

"The shops offer a variety of goods from A to B. Mostly ice."

I will finish this letter next week.

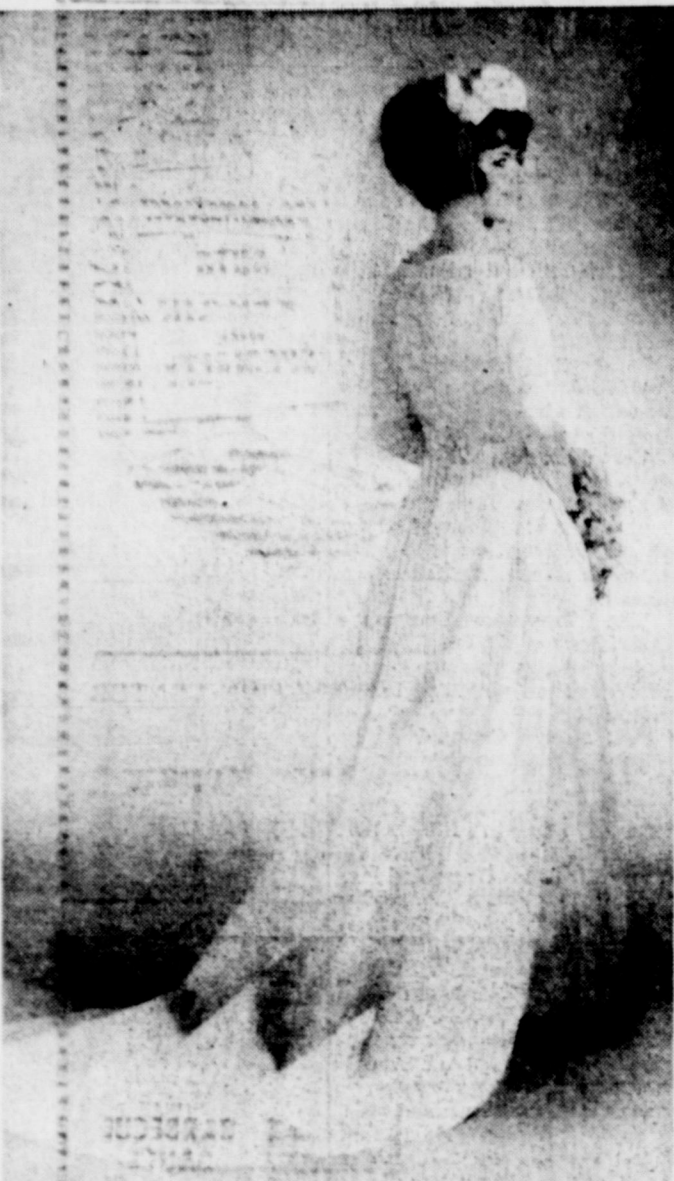

Beware Of Chain Letters

A news release was received recently at the Eastland National Bank from the United States Treasury Department, Savings Bonds Division, in which J. L. Adams, Savings Bonds director, is cautioning Texans about becoming involved in chain letters or similar schemes.

Such schemes are currently going on in Eastland County, according to Mike Collins, cashier at Eastland National Bank. Adams stated that the Treasury Department disapproves of the use of Savings Bonds and Savings Stamps as prizes or awards in lotteries or games of chance involving the element of personal profit. This has been a policy of long standing," he pointed out. The Treasury has no objection, however, to the use of Savings Bonds and Stamps in contests of knowledge or skill, such as quiz programs and athletic events.

What promoted Adams' words of caution were reports of a resurgence of chain letters involving the use of U. S. Savings Bonds. Wherever the plan has been started in a town, banks have reported a quick depletion of the \$25.00 and \$50.00 Savings Bonds being used.

Adams pointed out that the Treasury's objection is based upon consideration of public policy and in no way involves the legality or illegality of this or any device or method employed.

"The purchase and distribution of Savings Bonds through the so-called chain-letter arrangement, which has been brought to my attention by personal inquiries to the Treasury Department, is contrary to the policy of the Treasury's intended purpose for which such Savings Bonds are sold, by the government.

United States Savings Bonds are issued by the Treasury to permit our citizens to invest in securities of the Government and through their savings put aside regularly something for future use and benefit. It is my understanding that this present scheme serves no such purpose."

Adams would still like to see Savings bonds purchased by thousands of Texans in every bank; however, he wants them to be purchased for themselves and their loved ones as gifts today for a brighter tomorrow."



Bids Due To Be Called This Week

Announcement of federal approval of a grant and loan Friday for Cisco Junior College's proposed Fine Arts Building will permit the college to advertise for bids on the project this week, according to President Lloyd London of the board of regents.

The U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare announced approval of a \$156,738 grant and a \$146,000 loan — a total of \$302,738. This will go with \$101,731 in revenue bonds that the college is issuing to finance the project, which is expected to cost \$404,469.

Mr. London said that the architects were in town Thursday inspecting the two buildings under construction at College Hill and reported that approval was expected at any time on the fine arts building. They have plans and specifications ready for bidders as soon as the "go-ahead" is given them, Mr. London added.

The fine arts building is expected to be ready for the 1967-68 school year. It will house an auditorium plus space for teaching music, art and other subjects.

Mr. London said architects were pleased with the progress of the Men's Dormitory that will house 72 students. It is scheduled to be ready for the fall semester that begins Sept. 15. Most of the outside work has been completed. Painters are due to move in late this week.

The Student Union Building also under construction, is scheduled to be ready for use about Dec. 1. Work is near completion on the roof and brick layers are expected to begin sometime late this week. This structure will have a large lounge room, a bowling alley, a post office, a snack bar, book store, and other quarters.

Mr. London said that everything was progressing nicely for the coming school year. Pre-registration is due to start Aug. 15. Another record enrollment has been forecast.

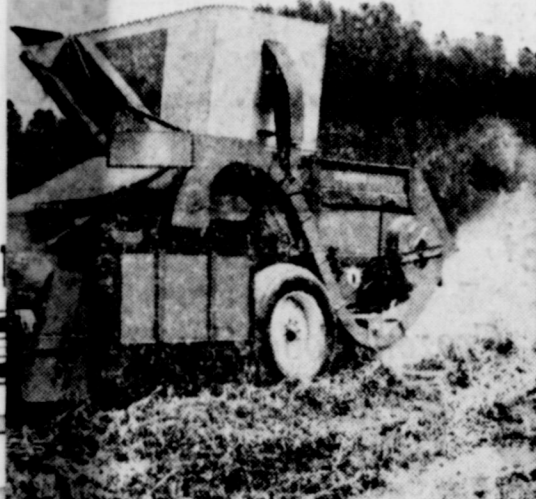

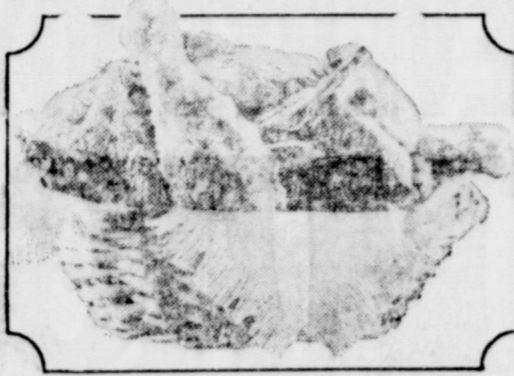

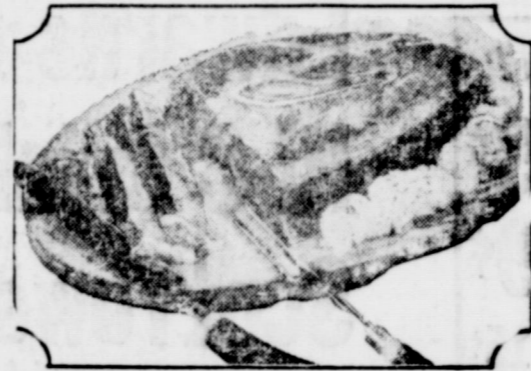

Appointment of Cowan Hutton, Route 4, Cisco, as a member of the Eastland County Farmers Home Administration Committee was announced this week by Darrell

Cooper, FHA county supervisor. Hutton succeeds Oscar L. Schaefer whose term expired on July 1. The new county committee man resides near the Sabanno community, where his farm holdings are located. He is farming approximately 230 acres of peanuts this year. Hutton is one of the first

persons to irrigate peanuts in Eastland County, and he has had success in this venture. He has a herd of commercial cattle in addition to his crop. Mr. Hutton joins Coda A. McDaniel and Truit Norris on the committee. The purpose of the county committee is to act on the eligibility of individual applications for all types of FHA loans in East-

land County. They also review borrower's progress, aid the county supervisor in adapting the agency's loan policies to local conditions, and offer technical agriculture advice. The Eastland County FHA office is now processing three Community Facility loan applications. They are for a rural water system at Morion

Valley, a recreation area at Cisco, and a peanut drying plant and storage facilities at Pioneer. Two Community Facility loans have already been closed. One for a water system at Olden, and one for a recreation area near Pioneer. The five projects involve loans amounting to approximately \$747,000.
