New Program Is Pioneering For School Dropouts

COLLEGE STATION — Preventing school dropouts is a major problem for many communities. The Galena Park School System, in Harris County, is pioneering a program to prevent school dropouts, according to Mrs. Patsy R. Yates, Extension family life education specialist at Texas A&M University. National recognition has been given to the program which includes all phases of pupil personnel services under one coordinator. F. E. McGahan is director of the Special Services Program. This program aims to prepare pupils to take their place in an ever-changing and complex society. The results have been dramatic. The dropout rate of 43.7 per cent in 1954 has been cut to 18 per cent and is expected to go still lower. This is compared to the national rate of 33 per cent. Selected groups of pupils have had their dropout rate cut to four per cent, says Mrs. Yates. A pre-school clinic begins the early detection program to help identify the child with difficulties. Children who are in school are placed in classes planned to correct or reduce difficulties. The key to the Galena Park program is emphasis on eliminating language deficiencies. Some 2,300 of the system's 12,000 students will be involved in a language program this coming year. A very sensitive instrument called "A Pre-school Prediction Inventory," which has been published, identifies children who can be expected to experience difficulty in the learning situation. The dropout prevention program is not an effort of one department or even school authorities, although they gauge the special services department enthusiastic support. Parents contribute much time and effort to the pre-school clinic. They form a part of the team of nurses, visiting teachers, counselors, a school psychologist, and special educational teachers who are closing the gap of education for the child who has traditionally failed in school, concludes Mrs. Yates.

3,000 Home Loan Applications Filled

Nearly 3,000 applications for home loans under the new GI Bill program have been received from Texas veterans, the Veterans Administration reported today. A VA study to determine what impact the Veterans Readjustment Act of 1966 (new GI Bill) has had on the nation's economy also showed 7,157 Texas veterans have applied for certificates of eligibility for loans, Jack Coker, manager of the VA Regional Office in Waco said. The number of applications for GI home loans is considered important because the lender usually makes the application, indicating the loan has gone through the initial, or interviewing stage, Coker said. Nearly 42,000 applications for home loans under the new GI Bill have been received nationally, the VA manager said. Throughout the country 135,000 veterans have applied for certificates of eligibility.

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Plans Announced For Observance Of Farm Safety Week July 24-30

Plans for the observance of Farm Safety Week in Eastland County July 24-30 were announced Friday by the county Farm Bureau. The event was the subject of a proclamation issued last week by County Judge Scott Bailey.

Jack Cozart, president of the Farm Bureau, reported that a different phase of safety would be emphasized each day during this week, as follows:

- Sunday — Reverence for life.
- Monday — Safety begins at home.
- Tuesday — Agricultural chemicals.
- Wednesday — Prevent falls.
- Thursday — Rural highway safety.
- Friday — Farm machinery.
- Saturday — Recreation Safety.

Mr. Cozart pointed out that "farming is one of the most hazardous occupations in America today, and too much emphasis cannot be placed on the need for good safety practices."

In his recent proclamation, Judge Bailey said, in part: "Farm and ranch accidents reap a grim harvest of approximately 150 fatalities and thousands more suffer painful disabling injuries each year in Texas, plus the great economic loss, causes profound physical and psychological damage suffered by members of farm families that are involved."

President Lyndon Johnson and Governor John Connally signed proclamations designating July 24-30 as Farm Safety Week throughout the state and nation.

The proclamations urge that all persons recognize and vigorously attack the hazards and unsafe practices that cause farm and rural accidents.

Farm Safety Week in Texas and the nation focuses attention on all farm hazards and places special emphasis on the prevention of highway accidents involving slow-moving farm vehicles. The campaign is sponsored jointly by the National Safety Council, the U. S. Department of Agriculture and the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council.

Accidents kill more than 8,000 farm residents each year and an additional 700,000 or more are victims of disabling injuries. Motor vehicle accidents are the leading cause.

Farm Safety Week comes at a time of the year when farm people are actively involved in all phases of farm work. It is an important and ideal time to check the safety of farm equipment and environment.

Garry told Lions about his country's customs, resources, products, problems, people and so forth. He said their biggest economic problem was the inability to export as much as they would like to import. Autos, he noted, carry a duty of 120 per cent of the total cost to import. He said there were only three Ford Mustangs in all of New Zealand.

New Zealand has a fully socialized medical program Garry reported. All medicines, hospital services, doctor's, ambulances, and so forth are free. The workers there pay an income tax of about eight per cent.

Garry described the public school program. He is a university graduate, majoring in agriculture. He is employed in New Zealand by a vaccine manufacturing company. He is a second lieutenant in the home armed forces similar to the U. S. Reserve program.

Sports in New Zealand include rugby football, basketball, surfing and so forth.

Garry's plans call for a visit of some three weeks in Cisco with sight-seeing excursions. He has visited a typical ranch, a peanut farm, an oil drilling rig and has gone water skiing. He has met up with a lot of new foods — okra, blackeye peas, cantaloupes, Mexican food, and so forth.

Garry is a brilliant conversationalist. He is well acquainted with world problems. He considers Viet Nam of more importance to his country and Australia than to the United States. He smiles when people ask if Australia is their near neighbor. It's 1,400 miles away by water.

Garry will go to Montgomery, Alabama, next month for a conference of some 30 young people from throughout the world who are guests of Lions Clubs in the United States. He will return then to Cisco for further visiting in this area, including appearances at service clubs.

Plans call for Garry to be away from New Zealand for about a year. He will return home via England, Europe, the Middle East, Japan and Australia.
