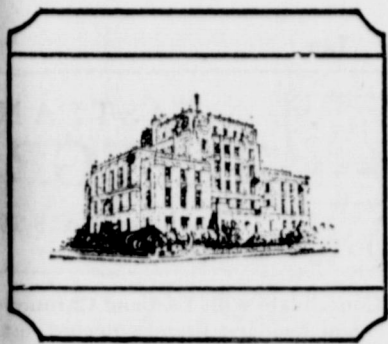

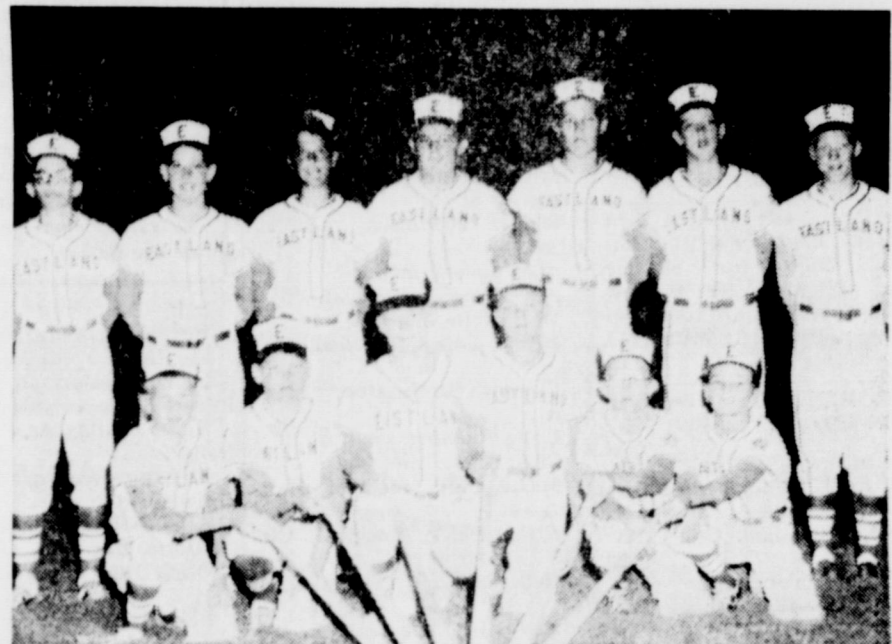

Eastland Little League Champions



Eastland Stars Win District, Advance to Sectional Play

A five-run, big third inning sparked by Pitcher Craig Lund's homer won the Eastland Little League All-Stars a 5-3 ballgame over Weatherford to claim the District 28 L.L. championship crown in

Weatherford Friday night. The Eastlanders had downed Coleman 4-2 Thursday night in the district tournament. Next step for the victors will be the Sectional Tournament in Levelland, League Presi-

dent Bill Kendrick reports. The 18-member team with Manager Warren McFall and Coach Ben Hernandez will go to Levelland Wednesday, and the first game for Eastland is scheduled Thursday at 4 p.m.

A fund has been started to underwrite costs of feeding and housing the local team, and donations may be made to James Reid at Eastland National Bank, or to any of the League officials. Cost of the trip is expected to be about \$550, Kendrick said. The team will stay at the Holiday House Motel in Levelland. Collection boxes will be placed at cash registers around town.

The State L.L. Tournament will follow a week later in Lubbock. Friday nights clincher was a "sweater" all the way—with Eastland's five runs coming with two outs showing on the scoreboard. Losing Weatherford loaded the bases twice more before the final frame. The Thursday night win was credited to Rodney Reynolds who took over mound duty and put two homers on the books. Coleman scored two runs in their half of the first, then Eastland came back for three in their portion of the first frame. Reynolds added another with his second homer later in the game for the first-round win.

Coleman downed Clyde 6-0 for the District consolation. Eastland busted lose for five runs in the third to whip Weatherford 5-3 for the District 28 Little League championship here Friday night.

National Guard Will Arrive Home Sunday

NORTH FORT HOOD — Trucks of the 49th Armored Division will travel more than 10 million miles this weekend on their way home.

The figure—10,370,000 miles—comes from Maj. Stanley Freese of Dallas, the division transportation officer. He has been in the 49th for 19 years and has been planning its summertime moves for 10 years. "I arrived at the figure by multiplying the 1,700 truck in the division by 6,100 miles, the total length of the 29 convoys' travel," said Maj. Freese.

He continued, "About 10 percent of the division's 8,000 men were authorized to bring their personal cars to camp. We will still need 25 commercial buses, carrying about 35 passengers each, to supplement the cars and trucks."

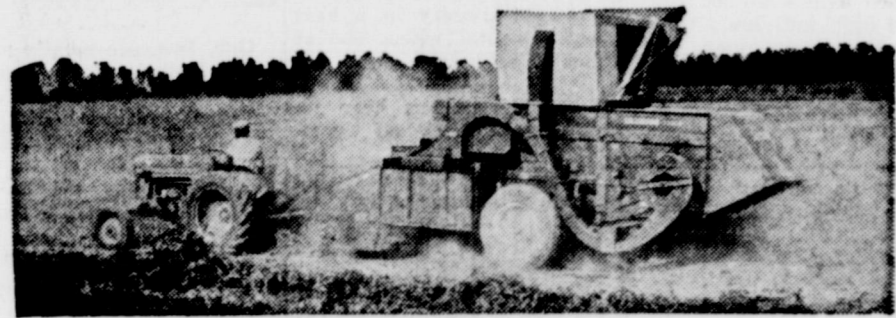

91st Disposes of 432 -- 2nd to Stephen's 716

Eastland County's 91st District Court disposed of 432 cases last year — fewer than Stephen County's 716, but considerably more than two other neighboring counties. Comanche processed 305 cases and Callahan County 180 during 1965.

The cases disposed of in Eastland and the 90th District Court in Stephens County included 139 dismissals in Eastland and 306 in Stephens, according to a Texas Civil Judicial Council year-end report, just released.

Stephens lead in divorce cases — 162. Eastland had 69 in 1965 but handled 98 in 1964, when the total cases disposed of amounted to 281.

Presiding Judge J. Frank Spark's 91st Court lead the three neighbor courts in annulments last year, with 2, while Comanche and Callahan each had one, with Stephens turning in a zero in that division.

Comanche County processed a whopping 209 tax suits, followed by Stephens' 27; Eastland's 19; Callahan's 13; and Eastland had two in '64.

Eastland lead in "other civil" suits last year with 141; Callahan had 125; Stephens, 83; and Comanche 36. Eastland had 134 in 1964.

Far and away the greatest number of criminal cases were handled in Stephens County last year with 491, although 306 were dismissals,
