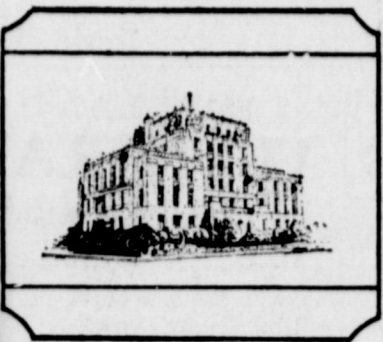

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Classic Wrangler-Ranger Contest Due To Be Peanut Bowl Spectacular

SATURDAY NIGHT AT 8

The traditional football clash between the two Eastland County Junior College giants will be highlight of the Seventh Annual Peanut Bowl Festival in Eastland Saturday.

And a rough and ready game it should be this year, as the Ranger Rangers and Cisco Wranglers toe in at an 8 p. m. kickoff in Maverick Stadium.

Sponsored by the Eastland Jaycees, the event annually attracts thousands to the county seat for a day of homage to the peanut industry, and a day of good times with twirling contests, a gigantic parade, and the climatic football game in the evening.

Coach Jim Puryear reported Wednesday that his Wranglers came through their Henderson County game in good condition and expected to be at top speed for the Peanut Bowl Team spirit is good, he added, and workouts this week have been satisfactory.

Probable starters for the Cisco JC team were listed as follows:

BOWL PARADE PROMISES TO BE 'BEST IN HISTORY'

Thousands of spectators are expected to be crowding the streets and square in Eastland Saturday as the Seventh Annual Peanut Bowl Parade winds its spectacular way.

Bands, floats, riding clubs and pretty girls will be among the many attractions.

Highlight of the event will be the presentation of Miss Peanut Bowl Queen, chosen Tuesday night, who will be atop the Jaycee Club float, accompanied by her court.

The parade will begin promptly at 3 p. m., and follow the usual route through town.

Invitations to over 100 special groups were sent out by the club, Parade Chairman Leo Thames reports, and response has been excellent, with many, many last-minute appearances expected.

Foremost among the stellar attractions will be the Fort Hood Band (same one that made such a hit here last year), and a 42 - member drill team, the Sweetwaterettes, who will be here for the parade and the football game special events.

Both Ranger Junior College and Cisco Junior College bands will be in the parade march, as will the CJC Wrangler Belles, and county and area high school and junior high school bands.

Among the many, many floats will be these: The J. H. Kendrick family is planning several to depict scenes from their popular Easter Pageant; the Civic League and Garden Club; the Co-Ed Club; and many others.

Another star will be the appearance of Miss Glenda Harbin, reigning queen of the De Leon Peach and Melon Festival.

Riding Clubs are expected from near and far, and there should be enough horses to please every horse-lover, young and old.

Spectators will also see lots and lots of new farm equipment, new automobiles and other attractions in the miles long parade, the Jaycees report.

The crack Fort Hood band will present a concert on the south steps of the courthouse immediately following the parade, it has been announced.

Mavericks vs. Baird Friday

Football returns to Maverick Stadium Friday evening as the Eastland Mavericks take on the Baird Bears, with kickoff time for the non-conference tilt at 8 p. m.

The Bears were bruised by a 27-0 skinning at the hands of Merkel last week, while the Mavericks were edged out by Ranger, 14-6. The Mavericks opened the season with a 6-0 win over Cross Plains.

"Our boys haven't let us down a bit," Coach Shirley Frazier says of his Mavericks. "We've asked only that they 'improve just a little every week,' and they're doing it. Now if we can just keep going."

The coaching staff was especially pleased with the defensive work done against Ranger. "We knew we were going to have trouble with our offensive drive, but it proved good; maybe not

quite good enough, but good," he said.

Only injury in the Maverick camp is to Quarterback Steve Lund who has a knee injury. Right now, (Tuesday), he couldn't play, the coach said, but maybe by Friday night he'll be ready. In the event he isn't, Gene Wilson will be moved in from his halfback position to call signals, and James Whitehead and James McKinzie will alternate at the halfback slot, the chief mentor said.

Last year may prompt the Bears to some spirited action, remembering the 44-6 wallop the Mavericks handed them.

Hospital Room Rates To Increase October 1
Effective Oct. 1, 1966, room rates at Eastland Memorial Hospital will be raised in keeping with increased other costs, Administrator Le on Musgrove has announced. Private rooms per day rates will increase to \$19, up from \$17, and semi-private rooms will be \$14.50, up from \$12, he said.
Increased cost of supplies and other necessary services forced the increase, Musgrove said, in order to continue the same type of service offered.
The national average hospital room cost is \$44.50 per day, he said, indicating that the Eastland hospital's cost will still be far below the national average, and are, in fact, below average of comparable hospitals in this area.
It will be the first increase in room rates in at least four years, he said.

'Fall' of Life More Beautiful Than Season Starting Now

The year of 1966 has weathered the winter storms, the beginning of spring and the heat of summer. It is the first day of fall.

This is the season William Cullen Bryant referred to when he said, "The melancholy days are come, the saddest of the year; of wailing winds, and naked woods and meadows brown and bare."

But not everyone feels this way about fall. Most people find it an enchanting season, with beautiful colors, cooler weather, renewed energy, and the benefits of harvest.

Fortunately, there are also many who find the fall season of life an enchanting time, with many benefits.

Mrs. Stella Roderick, who lives at 311 North Dixie, is one of these. She says, "Fall has always been my favorite time of year. We lived on a farm, you know, and fall meant harvest time and buying whatever we needed. I remember once we had three grown daughters living at home and just after harvest, Mr. Roderick gave them his pocketbook and sent them to town. When they got back, he said an elephant must have stepped on the pocketbook while they were gone."

At 87, Mrs. Roderick has also weathered the storms. The first sorrow was a baby stillborn; years later, two daughters died suddenly; a son was killed in Italy during World War II. But the greatest sorrow, (greatest because it was the most

lonesome), was the death of her husband in March of 1958. "There's a difference," she explains softly, "when your husband bears grief with you."

There have also been the good times of beginning-again. Mrs. Roderick was born Stella Denson, on February 15, 1879 in Little Rock, Arkansas. Two years later, her family moved to Texas. She was married in Honey Grove on February 25, 1896. The ceremony was performed in the home of her parents and she wore a white basque with 33 buttons down the back of it with a long white skirt.

They moved to Pecan Gap and bought a farm. They had twelve children between 1897 and 1922. Biggest disadvantage of the age difference in the children? Older sons going to World War I and the younger sons going to World War II.

Even in later life, the breaking up of their home to move to Eastland where they would be near a daughter, was a challenge. "Sad?" she echoes. "No, not really. I knew we could be happy wherever we were."

This ability to adapt and be content is one of her greatest assets. She credits

her faith in God with giving her this ability. A Methodist for 67 years, she has attended the Bethel Baptist Church the nine years she's been in Eastland because her daughter and son-in-law belong there. ("Don't forget to tell them that Bethel has been good to me", she cautions).

The benefits of this autumn season of life? One is leisure and time to read. "There never was time to read when the children were growing up. Now I can read all I want to: the Bible, especially the first and the 23rd Psalms and Dr. Allen's books—he's pastor of the First Methodist Church in Houston and writes some marvelous books.

"And my family, of course." Mrs. Roderick has four daughters: Mrs. Tom (Celo) Clark of Eastland; Mrs. Kate Oates, Henderson; Mrs. Mary Margiotta, New York City; and Mrs. Billie Evans of Fairfield, California; and four sons, Emory of Greenville; Travis of Evant; Gene of Eastland; and Charles of Brownwood; 18 grandchildren and 19 great-grandchildren.

But, she points out, children are never pure joy with no worries. Asked what she considered to be the hardest part of rearing children, she answered, "Letting them make their own decisions—and it's just as hard now as it was when they first started doing it."

Mrs. Roderick listed her favorites as: television—sermons, especially Billy Graham's; travel—to Sunday School and church and riding

County Wool Growers Voting Market-Development Program

Wool growers may cast votes in the referendum on the wool and lamb market development program through Friday, Sept. 23, according to Robert G. Lyerla, chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee. Votes cast in person or by mail should reach the ASCS office in Eastland by closing time Friday in order to be counted. Growers eligible to vote are those who have owned sheep or lambs six months of age or older for at least 30 consecutive days since Jan. 1, 1966. The vote will determine whether or not deductions will continue to be made from payments to producers under the wool program. These deductions finance a program of advertising promotion, and related activities to enlarge or improve the market for wool and lamb. The promotion program is carried out under an agreement made between the Secretary of Agriculture and the American Sheep Producers Council, a producer organization, as authorized by the National Wool Act. A similar agreement has been in effect since the 1955 marketing year, following approval by growers voting in referendums. For the agreement to be extended through 1969, as authorized by law, the September referendum must show approval by at least two-thirds of the total number of producers voting or by producers having at least two-thirds of the volume of production represented by the total vote. If a new agreement is not approved by producers, no deductions will be withheld from payments on 1966 marketings, and ASPC programs will be continued only as long as the present reserve fund permits or until some other agreement may be approved by producers. By approving the proposed new agreement, producers would authorize deductions from payments of up to one and a half cents a pound on shorn wool and seven and a half cents a hundredweight on unshorn lambs, compared with one cent and five cents in the past. The higher deductions recommended by most of the state and regional member organizations of ASPC would finance moderately expanded promotion programs for both wool and lamb.

Mr. Barton is the director of public relations and manpower development for the Credit Bank in Houston and works closely with all PCA's throughout Texas. Barton is a native of Kaufman County, was graduated from Texas A & M, served in the armed services and was discharged in 1948 as a captain. He was employed with the Texas Extension Service for four years, while employed with the extension service, he was the first Texan to receive the American Motors Conservation Award. He is the author of many publications and popular features on soil and water conservation.

In addition to a door prize for each stockholder, there will be a drawing for \$200 in cash. General Manager W. M. Irwin will give a report on the financial condition of the Association to the stockholders. His report and the report from the board of directors by Director McCain will, for the most part, contain facts on the present high cost of money and what may be expected in the months ahead.

The annual attendance trophy will be awarded to the office with the highest percent attendance. Eastland County won the trophy at the 1965 meeting. A barbeque lunch will be served at the conclusion to all stockholders, their wives and other guests. Following the noon luncheon the organization board meeting will be held and officers and committees will be elected for the coming year.

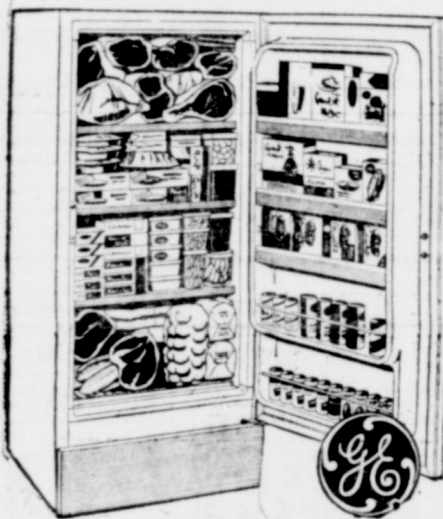
