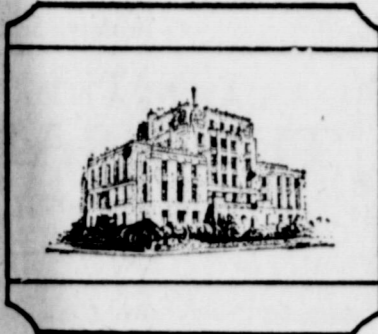

Truck Flips, Driver Is Freed By Volunteers

A certain tragedy was averted in Eastland early Tuesday morning as emergency crew workers carefully removed a truck driver from his overturned vehicle, which was pouring gasoline out profusely. The incident happened about 6 a. m. on West Main St. when the Fort Worth-based bob-tailed truck apparently hit a slick spot in the highway, and went out of control, clipping a newly-erected sign and overturning, pinning the driver inside the cab, as fuel from the truck's tanks poured out.

Wrecker operators, volunteer firemen, ambulance attendants and others worked feverishly to free the wedged man, keep spectators back and clear the area of danger. The driver walked away from the truck and was taken to Eastland Memorial for examination. The incident Tuesday was another in what Police Chief Ray Laney called a "rash of accidents."

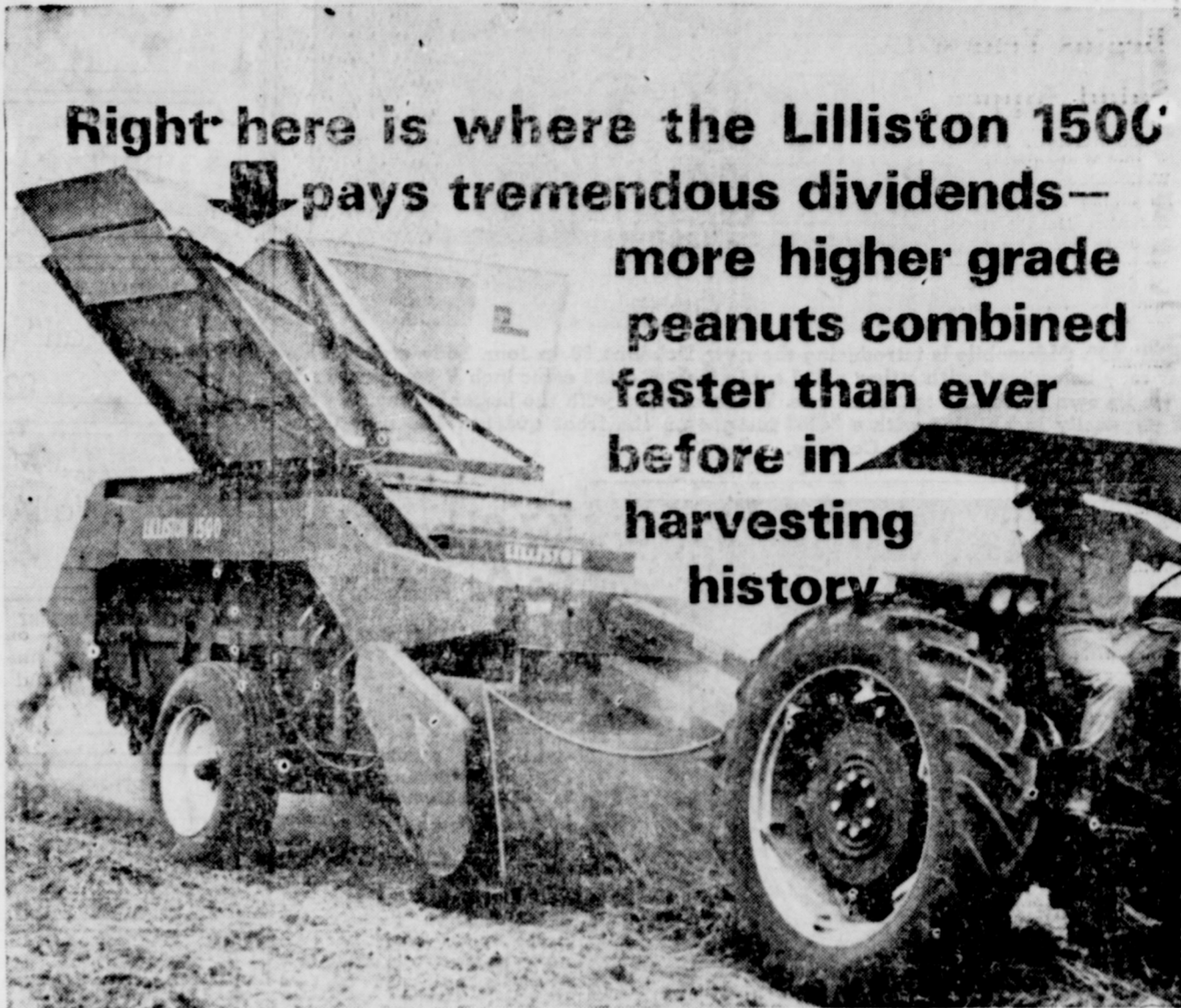

After moving to Ranger's 14, Cisco quarterback Robert Pearce sailed a touchdown pass to Murphy in the end zone two seconds before the third quarter's end. Pearce on a keeper failed to make the two extra

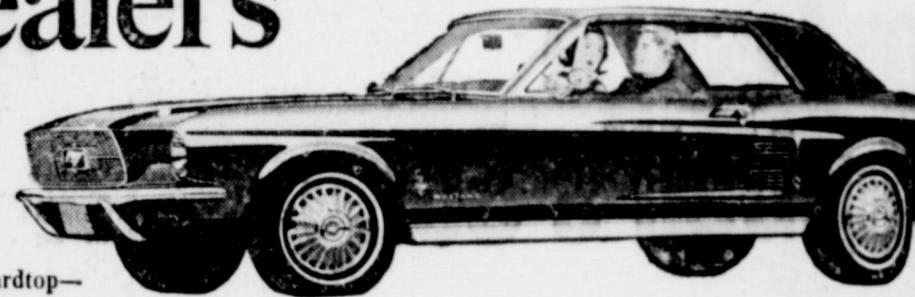

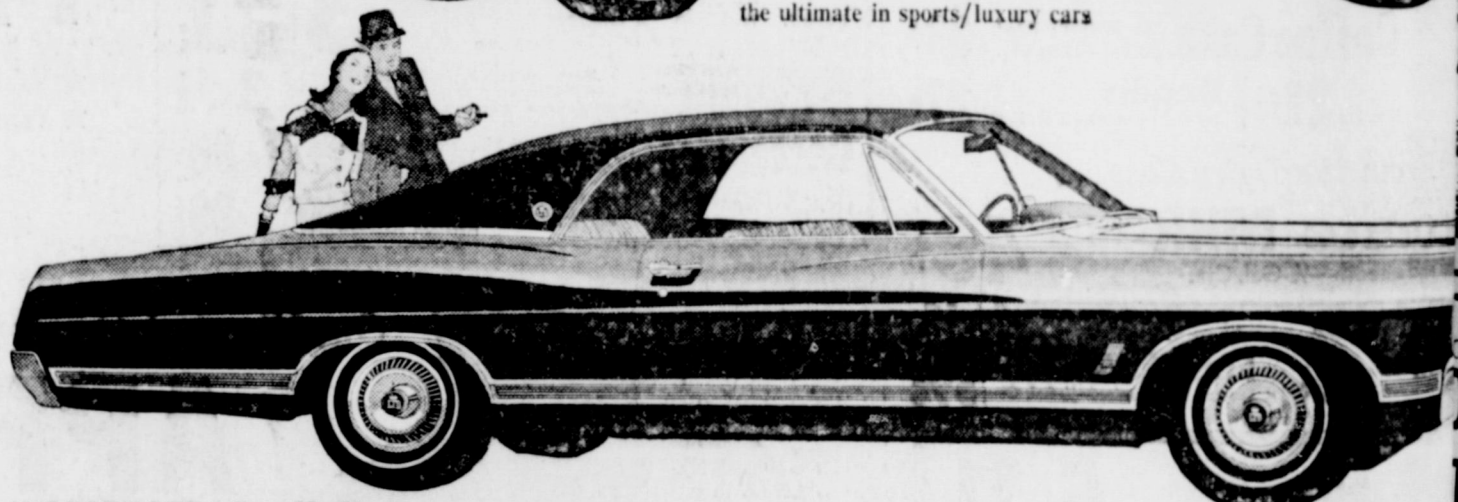

Texas Farmers Get Most Money At Their Banks

AUSTIN — Texas banks were serving farms and ranches with more credit and other financial services than any other lenders at the beginning of this year, according to Walter F. Johnson, president, Texas Bankers Association, and president, First National Bank of Abilene.

During 1965, Texas banks maintained their leadership in agricultural credit services. Based on the 25th annual farm and ranch lending summary of the agricultural committee of the American Bankers Association, Mr. Johnson reported that at the beginning of 1966, Texas banks were helping farmers and ranchers with \$708 million in loans, 7 per cent more than a year previous. This total included \$591 million in production loans and \$117 million in farm and ranch mortgages. At the same time, \$521 million in farm and ranch loans was held by life insurance companies; \$375 million by the Federal Land Bank; \$159 million by Production Credit Associations; and \$88 million in non-real estate loans, plus \$56 million in real estate loans by the Farmers Home Administration. About 71 per cent of the production credit extended by lending institutions to Texas farmers banks.

Mr. Johnson said that "bankers in Texas are conscious of the large capital investments required in agriculture today and are making a concerted effort through improved lending programs to meet these changing credit demands of the state's farmers and ranchers.

The increased use of credit by farmers and ranchers, according to Mr. Johnson,

has been accompanied by a substantial gain in the total assets of farm and ranch families. Therefore, in the aggregate, the equity position of farmers and ranchers contrary to public opinion, is being maintained at a satisfactory level. Nationally, farm and ranch families have \$212 billion of their own funds invested in agriculture. This represents 84 per cent of the total capital requirements of farmers and ranchers.

Mr. Johnson stressed the importance of farmers, ranchers and bankers working closely together to improve farm and ranch financial arrangements. He reported that nearly 89 per cent of the banks in Texas were extending credit to farm people.

AR Observes Constitution Week First Meeting of Chapter Year

Luncheon and Constitution program at the Victor Hotel Sept. 19 were part of the observance of Constitution Week by the Charles Crawford Chapter, Daughters of American Revolution. Mrs. E. Harrell was hostess for meeting, the first of the 67 chapter year. The highlight of the program and meeting was an address titled "Our Constitution" by Scott J. Bailey, County Judge of Eastland County. The speaker's opening remarks, he praised the Daughters of the American Revolution for its objectives and in fact had this to say: "The meeting such as this — Constitution Week meets — affords an excellent opportunity in this community commemorating the hissing of our Constitution, recalling the high devotion to liberty of men who framed it; and giving the many blessings

of the sacred document enjoyed by our Nation today. It is, the speaker reminded the group, the embodiment of the American dream of freedom and democracy. It has stood the test of times and weathered many attacks that would weaken and destroy it.

The speaker explained the interesting and unusual story of the making of the Constitution — calling it an epochal achievement. It was largely an evolutionary product, he said, taking shape in one of the most remarkable conventions of modern times. One of the moving thinkers of the inception of the Constitution was Benjamin Franklin. The present Constitution was adopted on Sept. 17, 1787, and is patterned after a proposed Plan of Union advanced by Dr. Franklin in 1754. It was rejected at this time, but presented again as the Albany Plan. Although rejected, a revised Albany Plan became the

Mrs. Jewel Reaves, secretary of the Stephens-Eastland selective service board, has announced that the board will forward 58 men to the Abilene Induction Center Thursday, Oct. 6. Thirteen have been ordered to report for induction and 45 have been notified of examination dates.

Mrs. Reaves also stated that bulletins of information about an upcoming draft test for students, plus the application blanks for taking it, may be secured at the selective service office in the Petroleum Building in Eastland.

The application blanks to take the test must be mailed to Selective Service Examining Section, Educational Testing Service, P.O. Box 988, Princeton, N.J., 08540, before Friday, Oct. 21. A pre-addressed envelope will be furnished with each bulletin of information. The test will be given Nov. 18 and 19 on some 25 Texas college and university campuses. These are located in Abilene, Alpine, Amarillo, Austin, Beaumont, Brownsville, Corpus Christi, Dallas, Denton, El Paso, Ft. Worth, Houston, Huntsville, Laredo, Lubbock, Nacogdoches, Odessa, San Angelo, San Antonio, Texarkana, Tyler, Uvalde, Victoria, Waco, and Wichita Falls.

was helpless and powerless, and the tide turned toward the possibility of a better Union and a stronger government. In 1786, Judge Bailey continued, at a convention of the States in Annapolis, Maryland, called by the State of Virginia to discuss trade negotiations and navigational disputes between the states, far-sighted men as Washington, Hamilton and Madison secured the passage of a resolution suggesting a convention, authorized by Congress and approved by the states, for the purpose of improving the form of government. Congress invited all the states to send delegates to a convention to be held in Philadelphia on May 14, 1787. Thus was born the Convention which wrote the Constitution of the United States.

The principles of the Constitution were explained by the speaker. First, the government should be representative in form; that is, the people should elect the representatives. We are therefore a Democracy within a Republic. Second: That the National Government should have sufficient powers to protect all citizens, but not infringe upon the sovereignty of the states. Third: That the people have certain unalienable rights — which must be recognized. Fourth: That the powers of the government be divided into three Coordinate Divisions — the Legislative Branch; the Executive Branch and the Judicial Branch. Each Branch to have specified powers. In this connection the speaker explained our system of checks and balance of powers, and the kind of powers delegated to each branch.

Judge Bailey continued, "When the Pilgrim fathers set foot on the rock-bound New England shores, there was no government ready to give them aid, comfort or support. They did however, have a deep and abiding faith to sustain them. Our ancestors always relied upon Divine Faith, which they fortified with faith in themselves, faith in their fellowman, and faith in the freedom they were seeking. It is upon such faith as the Pilgrims exhibited that rests the foundation and strength and security of our Nation today.

In conclusion, the speaker said, "Our forefathers believed that freedom was a God-given right, not a state-granted privilege, and they believed it so deeply that made freedom an accomplished fact. It is our children's birthright, ours to hand on to them and to their children. To do this we must have faith in God, faith in ourselves and in our work, faith in our fellowman, faith in freedom, always remembering that we are protected and sheltered in these faiths by our Constitution of these United States.

The defense of our Constitution and Declaration of Independence is the business of all of us, as descendants of free men who were so willing to dedicate their lives, their fortunes, and their sacred honor to the cause of establishing a government designed to give every individual an opportunity to provide for himself, and to this end, the government is the servant, not the master of the people.

After the luncheon and program, Mrs. Joe Clements, the regent of the Charles Crawford Chapter, presided over a short business session. Mrs. Clements announced the meeting of Divisions I and VII in Sweetwater Saturday, Sept. 24 at the Holiday Motel Center. Besides the members, five guests were present to hear Judge Bailey. Rev. Frank Alverton, pastor of the Presbyterian Church, who gave the invocation, Loyd London, who sang two solos, "This Is Your Land" and "I Believe," accompanied at the piano by Mrs. Pen Krauskopf, and Mr. and Mrs. Scott J. Bailey.

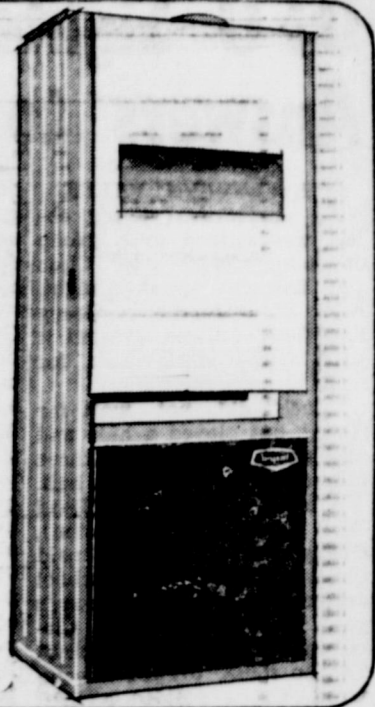

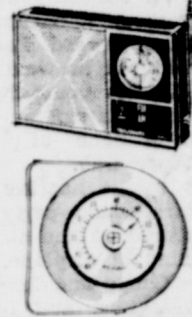

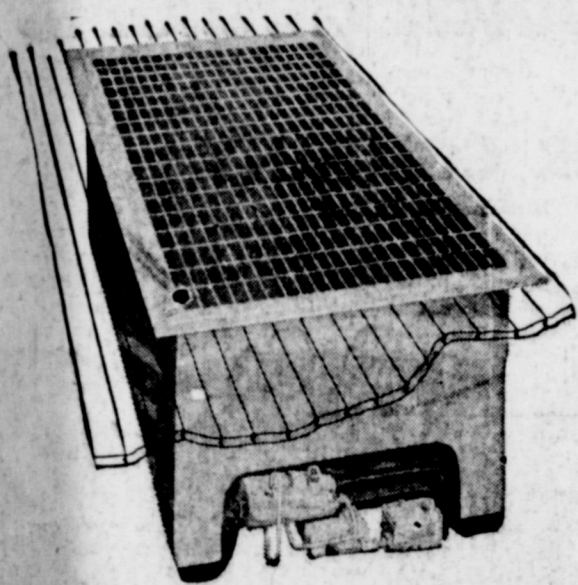

UFO Sighted In Cisco Monday; Answers to Name of "Mack"

An unidentified flying object was sighted by a group of young people over Cisco and Eastland Monday night. And one of them, Gregg Langford of Cisco, greeted it with "Hey, Mack, wait for me."
"Mack" did not wait for Gregg, but played a hide and seek chase with him and three others for an hour and a half.
Around 8:30 p. m. (Road West was on television), Gregg and his friend, Ronald Caraway, both high school seniors, drove into Gregg's yard at 1602 Avenue E, Cisco, in Caraway's 1956 Chevy. To the south, toward Brownwood, Gregg noticed a light moving toward Cisco. Then, swoosh, it was over the house with a speed faster than a jet, Gregg recalled. "A spaceship!" he screamed.
Though traveling at an indescribable speed, "Mack"

made a sharp turn (a 90 degree angle, the observer said) and, zoom, it was off toward Abilene. No sound was heard by the listeners below.
A few seconds later, as Gregg, his mother, Mrs. Willie Langford, Ronald and two other high school senior friends, Guy Custer and Ray Marino, stood on the north side of the house, they saw the ship hovering over a mesquite pasture about a block away. Approximately 100 feet above the ground, the observers said, the ship, which was flat on the bottom and rounded on top, tilted forward and turned on a bright white light, directed toward the pasture. It seemed to be "looking for something," the Caraway youth said.
The white light encompassed a large portion of ground, and "we stood at the east rim of the circle of light."
As suddenly as it had appeared, it zoomed off, this time toward Eastland. The white light went off and the listeners could hear a sound that was similar to the motor of a light airplane, like a Piper Cub.
Upon hearing the sound, Gregg and party temporarily dismissed the object as some kind of airplane.
Gregg and Ronald and Mrs. Langford and her grandson, Buddy Duckworth, 3, then went to Eastland to visit friends. They never visited the friends.
As the Chevy rolled through Eastland, its occupants sighted "Mack" again; this time he was hovering over the Texas Highway Department's buildings on the east outskirts of Eastland.

The Ciscoans immediately stopped on Highway 80, and Gregg frantically started trying to wave down other cars. No one would stop, he related. Addressing a truck driver, he shouted, "Mack, look over there." But the truck driver honked and buzzed on by.
"Mack," the UFO, was then off toward Olden and the Ciscoans gave chase. Or, perhaps it was "Mack" doing the chasing, as he stayed to the left side of the roadway and behind the car. The ship flew over the Olden drive-in theater and then to a pasture where it hovered. Again, Gregg and party halted in the middle of the road and waved and hollered at "Mack." This time both Gregg and Ronald got out of the car. Mrs. Langford and sleeping grandson did not get out.
The two boys came within approximately 50 feet of the ship, which was tree-top high. Then they stopped running and waving and did not say anything, because the white bright light spotlighted them. "Under the light," Gregg said, "I felt funny. I didn't want to say anything."
Ronald said, "It gave me goose bumps on my neck and made me want to get back in the car."
Gregg described the light as emitting from a source some two feet in diameter and oval shaped. The light was like no other he knows of. He could look directly into it without squinting, and there were no dark spots in front of the eyes when he turned away. The light encompassed a large area, maybe an acre.

"We could see dust particles in the air, such as you see in a flashlight beam in a dark room," Ronald said.
"Mack" then swooshed off in a direction toward Albany, and the observers returned to Cisco, where Gregg notified Dyess Air Force Base in Abilene. His conversation was taped.
Tuesday morning, Major Phillip Pierce from Dyess interviewed Mrs. Langford, Gregg and Ronald. He told a reporter from this newspaper that he had no idea what the object could have been.
The observers could not estimate the size of the ship. "It was larger than a car," the Caraway youth said. A red light was in back. Gregg said blue and green lights blinked now and then on the sides of the craft. There were no propellers or wings or other visible means of motion power. No windows could be seen.
Gregg did not get scared until he went to bed Monday night. Then "I became nervous. Every time I rolled over, I saw the street light through the window and I thought of that other light."

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1967 Buicks Are On Display At Muirhead Motor

Buick unveiled its 1967 automobiles today, placing the emphasis on major styling changes, 2 new power plants and a host of product improvements.
The new models are on display at Muirhead Motor Co., in Eastland.
A new series, the GS 400, was introduced to give Buick a total of 37 different models in nine series. The various series are Special, Special Deluxe, Skylark, and GS 400, and the Sportswagon, and LeSabre, Wildcat, Electra 225, and Riviera.
Robert L. Kessler, Buick's general manager and vice president of General Motors, noted that product improvements were a major consideration in designing the new models.
"In addition to the full complement of General Motors product improvements, we have provided a number of advancements of our own, particularly in the area of brakes," he said.
Buick's general manager pointed out that brake systems were more closely tailored to the weight and power of the car, which varies from series to series and according to power plant options. In addition, front wheel disc brakes are offered as optional equipment on most models.
