Helps Our Youth Through Y. M. C. A.

The YMCA is an organization which has done and will continue to do much for the youth of this community. Under the direction of James Wright, president, the YMCA is responsible for the Cellar, located in the bank building, which is open each Friday night for Junior High students; and which is available for special parties to any school group. Mr. and Mrs. O. L. Elrod are Junior High directors.
The YMCA assisted the school in purchasing the tennis training machine at the high school, and helped the city with its summer recreational program directed by Shirley Frazier, high school coach.
The organization has supervisory and financial direction of the YMCA Day Camp held each summer. This Camp

is open to all children from ages six to twelve and averages sixty-five daily attendance each summer. Besides the Camp Director, there are ten or twelve counselors who are of high school and college age (your leaders of tomorrow).
Activities of the camp include cheer-leading and twirling, archery, riflery, swimming, softball, hiking and crafts. Campers are adequately supervised and are given personal instruction in the variety of activities.
Although each camper pays a fee to enter the camp, this is not adequate to cover the cost of materials and staff salaries. The YMCA bears the financial burden of the camp. If it were not for your gift to YMCA, through the UNITED FUND, this community project would not be possible.

The Eastland Mavericks move into District 7-AA competition Friday night, carrying a 3-2 non-conference record, and facing the potent, much-touted Hamilton Bulldogs Eleven.
The action is set at Kook-en Field in Hamilton and kickoff time will be 7:30 p. m.
The Hamilton team will be

strangers to Eastland, in that they are one of two teams in the newly re-shuffled district that the locals haven't been playing in recent years. At the beginning of the season, Granbury, (the other new face) was picked to win the district, but Hamilton has made impressive strides during their non-conference play, and go into district competition with a 3-2 record.

The Bulldogs have beaten DeLeon, 46-0, Cross Plains, 50-0; and Ranger, 20-13; been defeated by Clifton, 14-6; and San Saba 29-14.
The Mavericks have won over Cross Plains, 6-0; Baird, 14-13; and DeLeon, 16-12; and lost to Ranger, 14-6; and Albany, 22-0. The Eastland lads have totaled 42 points to their non-conference opponents' 60.

Peace Essay Contest Announced by Lions

The youth of Eastland are being given a challenge to develop a plan for world peace by their local Lions Club — a challenge that could earn one of them \$25,000 educational and or career assistance grants.
The Eastland Lions Club, together with Lions Club throughout the world, is sponsoring an essay contest on Peace. The contest offers \$50,000 in total awards, including the \$25,000 first prize, eight semi-final world regional awards of \$1,000 each and travel expenses for the eight winners to Chicago, Ill., in July, 1967. At that time, the first prize winner will be chosen from the eight. More than 20,000 local, district and multiple district awards will be made.
President Ed Ethridge of the Eastland FFA Chapter announced that the contest is open to young people between 14 and 22 and the local club winner will advance to the Lions District 2-E1 competition. Essays are to be not more than 5,000 words and must be

in by Dec. 10. Judging will be in four categories: 75 per cent for content; ten per cent organization; ten per cent to style and five per cent to mechanics.
"The purpose of the contest is to develop a formula for world peace because we feel peace is attainable," President Ethridge said in announcing the contest.
Information and date will be made available through the local school system, he said.

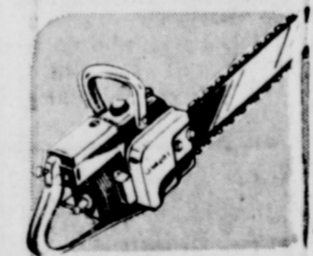

Grass Tour Displays Excellent Cover Crops

The annual pasture improvement and conservation tour jointly sponsored every year by the Soil Conservation Service, Farmers Home Administration, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, and the Extension Service was held Monday, the 10th of October. Farmers and ranchers from Ranger, Gorman, Desdemona, Eastland & Abilene were able to observe the



results of technical planning carried out by the landowners and their local soil and water conservation district. E. E. McAlister, work unit representative for the SWCD, served as guide for the tour. Places visited by the group were the Ed Harrison Ranch, J. M. Yancey farm, A. J. Rogers farm, and the Bernard Yancey farm. At the Harrison ranch the group observed some knee-high coastal bermuda grass that was sprigged in January of 1965. A group discussion on how the land was prepared, method of sprigging and rates of fertilizing was held. It was pointed out by McAlister that there were some bare spots last year but the whole field was "haired over" now. It was also pointed out by McAlister that Mr. Harrison had put coastal bermuda

on his land because it cost less to maintain and he could defer some of his native pastures during the summer months. At the J. M. Yancey farm, the group was able to see a very effective conservation cropping system of peanuts stripped with sudan. Producers use of coastal bermuda and its ability as a hay crop was discussed by the group. Mr. Yancey was assisted by the program in getting his grass established, his fences constructed, and the digging of a pond. The next stop on the tour was the A. J. Rogers farm. The group was able to observe the effects of liquid fertilizer and weed killer on coastal bermuda. Mr. Rogers applied 300 lbs. per acre of liquid nitrogen along with weed killer on his coastal bermuda early in the year.

Mr. Rogers stated that he had killed out a heavy infestation of cocklebur and ragweeds with the weed killer and that the liquid fertilizer had really given his grass the needed boost. Rogers also stated that he could not have had what he has now "if it were not for the technical and financial help of the GC and FHA." The last stop on the tour was at the Bernard Yancey farm. The group was able to see the effective use of coastal bermuda in rotation with weeping lovegrass. Mr. McAlister led a group discussion on the importance of balancing the amount of forage one has with the amount of livestock an individual is running. It was also pointed out that a farmer or rancher can have year-around grazing if he can have an equal amount of coastal bermuda in rotation with weeping lovegrass. A final discussion and summary by each of the sponsors was held and the tour was ended. Those in attendance were: J. H. Reynolds, Ellis Cooper, Guy Cooper, Vernon Warren, John Love, Jerry McAfee, H. McAlister, John Simpson, Johnnie Aaron, Eddie Simms, Guy Horton and Lewis Knapke of the Soil Conservation Service, and D. Gordan, county agent.

Viet Veterans Are Now Eligible for Legion

American Legion Membership ranks have been opened to the current generation of Veterans in what must have been one of the fastest legislative procedures in the history of the Congress and the office of the Chief Executive of the United States, according to Walter E. Other periods of service for American Legion membership are: April 6, 1917, to Nov. 11, 1918 (World War I); Dec. 7, 1941, to Sept. 2, 1945 (World War II); and June 25, 1950, to July 27, 1953 (Korean War).

State Capital NEWS

AUSTIN — Texas Research League unveiled its tentative recommendations for heading off "disaster" in growing urban counties following a statewide study ordered by Gov. John Connally.

Plan contains sweeping and controversial proposals to overhaul local government in 24 major and middle sized counties. It proposes four statutory changes and two constitutional amendments. Test public hearing has been held in Austin and Dallas - Fort Worth and more discussion meetings will be set over the state.

Basically, the recommendations aim to encourage regional planning and cooperation among units of government in solving common problems and performing services on an area-wide basis and to permit big counties to adopt a modern governmental structure best suited to their needs. State aid to carry out these recommendations would be available under League suggestions.

A cabinet-type agency — The Texas Local Government Agency — is proposed to advise metropolitan areas and to police new municipal incorporations. Probably the most controversial recommendation is a constitutional amendment to permit — on popular vote — the reorganization of governments in 24 counties, making it optional whether most are to be appointed or remain elective.

Counties directly concerned are Bexar, Bell, Cameron, Dallas, Ector, El Paso, Galveston, Gregg, Harris, Hidalgo, Jefferson, Lubbock, McLennan, Midland, Nueces, Orange, Potter, Smith, Tarrant, Taylor, Tom Green, Travis, Webb and Wichita.

Texas State Teachers Association has served notice it will push for a pay raise in 1967, regardless of views of the Governor's Committee on Public School Education.

TSTA blamed a 5,500-teacher shortage mainly on pay scales and renewed its plea for a "national average" wage with built-in escalator clause.

Texas Association of School Administrators joined teach-

ers in urging an interim committee report on the need for better teaching salaries.

Stage may be set for one of the next Legislature's biggest money controversies.

The University of Texas, together with a team of physicists and electrical engineers to work on conversion of thermonuclear fusion directly into electricity, has won a \$700,000 research contract from the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation. Previously, the contract had been held by a California firm.

Texas is in the midst of its worst screwworm infestation since the statewide eradication program was initiated in February, 1964.

Two weeks ago, there were 33 confirmed cases. But last week (just through Thursday) 106 cases were confirmed.

Federal, state and private funds are being used to fight the infestation through dropping sterile flies from airplanes and treating infested animals. "But things don't look too good," said Dr. S. B. Walker, executive director for the Texas Animal Health Commission.
