## Hamilton Bests Mavericks, 38-0

Led by hard-running senior fullback, 183-pound Larry Newton the Hamilton Bulldogs, running from a single wing formation, goose-egged the Eastland Mavericks 38-0 in the first District 7-AA clash for both teams in Hamilton Friday night.

And the Mavericks looked as good in losing as did the Bulldogs in winning. Hamilton played their first team throughout the night, and even with 38-0 on the scoreboard, the hardnosed Mavericks stood pat and refused ground when the powerful Bulldogs marched to their

five-yard line in the final period. Holding a team like Hamilton in downs in such a hopeless situation must certainly prove that the Mavericks don't even know what the phrase "give up" means. Hamilton has never been hit harder than they were Friday night.

Newton single-handedly scored 28 points and gained about 200 yards rushing. Eastland received the opening kick on their own 35 yard line, picking up two first downs and moving to the Hamilton 27 yard line where they ran out of downs.

Quarterback Gene Wilson made a nice 14-yard run on the drive.

The first touchdown drive for the Bulldogs went 73 yards in 14 plays during the first quarter with Newton going over right tackle for three yards and the score, and then added the extra point.

On the first play of the second quarter, Eastland was caught trying to punt behind the goal line and Hamilton scored a safety making it 10-0 at half time.

In the third period Hamilton drove 60 hard-fought yards with Newton going over center for four yards and a touchdown.

He again fought a yard for the touchdown in the same period covering 47 yards.

In the fourth quarter, same song, second verse, with Newton again scoring on a one-yard plunge which capped a 50-yard drive in 17 plays. WB George Warlick added a conversion run for two points.

Late in the fourth quarter, with Newton intercepting a pass, Hamilton drove for the final touchdown of the night with Tailback Gramatizky hitting off tackle for the score.

## QB CLUB'S First Local Showing 'Minnie Belle' Due

When the curtain goes up on the "Second Evening of One-Acts" at Bell Hurst Playhouse, Saturday, Oct. 22, and for three succeeding performances, it will be the first opportunity that Eastland Counties will have had to see "The Reign of Minnie Belle" produced locally.

Written in the late 1930s by Eastland Civic Theater Director and County native Mrs. Virginia Russell, the play was sold in 1940 and has had many productions, but never locally.

Set in '33, "On the eve of the East Texas oil boom," the play was produced at Vicksburg, Miss., with a large cast, and recently (in January) in Town North in Dallas. (Mrs. Russell was busy with a local play then, and didn't even get to go down for the Dallas performance.)

It's been done in high schools for years, and is published by Greenberg of New York. It won the National Folk Drama Tournament in North Carolina in 1939, and when Mrs. Russell produced it in Mississippi, she used an all-girl cast—it was at a girls school.

Mrs. Juanita Langlitz is in charge of costumes for the comedy and a stage manager is to be named.

## Historical Marker Is Dedicated At Gorman

The Official Texas Historical Marker for OLD SHINOAK SPRINGS was erected last week at Frank A. Gray Memorial Park. Mike Collins, chairman of the Eastland County Historical Survey Committee announced.

The cast aluminum marker with Swedish steel effect for durability and appearance measures 18" X 28" inches and is sponsored by the Eastland County Historical Survey Committee.

This is the 4th Official Texas Historical Marker to be erected in Eastland County.

The inscription reads:  
**OLD SHINOAK SPRINGS**  
"Named for Dwarf Oaks. Before fencing began in 1880's Springs attracted cattle, horses, deer. Settlers hauled water for home and stock use. Town of Shinoak Springs thrived until M.K.&T. Railroad bypassed it in 1880. Schoolhouse of raw hide lumber was built in 1882. Had seats of split logs. Pupils numbered 55. School grounds drew crowds of 8,000 for political rallies and camp meetings.  
"A lake was formed in 1911 by a rock dam. Frank Gray Memorial Park, given to City of Gorman, is now recreation and reunion ground, at site of old springs."

# OLDEN NATIVE IS BUSY PHOTOGRAPHER AT A & M

COLLEGE STATION — "Busy as a bee" doesn't describe Ken Reese. Bees can't buzz that fast.

Reese serves as chairman of the Texas A&M Memorial Student Center's camera committee, works for a Bryan consulting engineer, averages 1.9 on A&M's 3.0 grade point system, and still finds time to "soup" 50 pictures a month.

"Ken does a fabulous job with the camera committee," declared MSC Director Wayne Stark. "He goes far beyond what is required in the line of duty."

The 29-year-old electrical engineering major is in his second year of committee chairmanship. Under Reese's direction, the 88-member club has its largest membership ever, with a 100-percent increase over 1964-65 enrollment.

The club is planning color darkroom facilities, doubled, the number of entries in its 1965. Intercollegiate Photo Salon and is seeking national participation this year. Committee members won half the Salon ribbons here last year.

Reese's photo work takes him away from his wife Sandra and five-year-old son Barry many nights, but the understanding wife doesn't mind.

"Ken's so interested in it, I try not to say anything," the Physical Plant Department secretary remarked. "Interest is the main ingredient of his success."

The Olden, Tex., native took up photography as a hobby six years ago. He stuck his fingers in a typewriter while serving with the Army in Germany and can't wash it off. Reese still hasn't

caught up printing negatives he shot in Germany, France, Austria, Belgium, Holland, Luxembourg, Ireland, and Newfoundland during 20,000 miles of Army traveling.

Reese may have the only free-world picture of a top Russian general, made during a secret review in West Germany. He shot color slides in Heidelberg's Corn Market, where "The Student Prince" was filmed.

Ken thinks his most unusual picture is a time exposure of lightning during Hurricane Carla. The bolt struck south of College Station but appears to be taking a chunk out of a student housing apartment roof. His favorite photo—of Sandra and Barry on a river bank—hung in the '65 Salon.

Two Agfa cameras he purchased in Germany comprise his photo inventory, since part-time employment doesn't allow large equipment budgets.

He looks forward to commencement next May. Sandra promised him a popular 35 mm camera for graduation.

Reese worked part-time for BW Construction of Byan in high school and college. The former carpenter now assists EE Department Head John S. Denison on REA System surveys, doing drafting and system voltage surveys.

Much of his darkroom time is spent making photos for various MSC activities. Reese credits committee success to student officers and faculty advisors C. M. Sykes (klub kop) and Roy Pledger.

"Mr. Sykes takes care of bookkeeping odd - and - ends, keeps darkrooms straight and gets us supplies on his trips to Houston," said the chairman, son of Mr. and Mrs. Travis Reese of Olden.

Ken in the most unique undergraduate chairman the committee has ever had, Stark commented. "That he can study, raise a family, make a living, and do such a remarkable job, too, fascinates me."
