Mavericks Meet Granbury Friday

The Eastland Mavericks take on the District 7-AA Defending Champion Granbury Pirates in Maverick Stadium Friday evening with kickoff at 7:30 p. m.

Eastland's Black and Reds will be looking hard for a win after two unpleasant Fridays — with a 22-0 loss to Albany and a 38-0 loss to Hamilton last week.

The 1966 Band and Football Sweethearts will be presented in pre-game activities at Maverick Stadium Friday night beginning at 7 p. m., it has been announced.

Loudly touted in pre-season, the Pirates form a powerful foe for the Mavericks, but Coach Shirley Frazier reports his charges in good shape after good workouts this week. The Mavericks held the Hamilton Bulldogs to ten points (a touchdown and field goal) in the first half last Friday night, and forced the powerful District contenders to use their main force throughout the evening.

"We came out of the Hamilton game without any injuries", Coach Shirley Frazier reports, "and we're going to be ready for Granbury."

Only problem: Jay Daniels was in the hospital early in the week having some teeth removed and may not be able to suit out Friday unless he was released by Wednesday, the coach said.

Wade Thomas will be back and ready to go, after having been out since the Ranger game, the coach reported.

"We saw the best consistent team performance" ever against Hamilton Frazier said, and the team isn't down at all.

"They know Granbury is a powerful team ("no lower than fifth in the state on any poll"), but the entire team is looking forward to the opportunity of playing such a good organization, he said.

Eastland had the ball one time in the third quarter of the Hamilton game, which proves that we've got a fine defensive unit, he said, pointing out that the Hamilton crew wanted to score some more but were held by the scrappy Mavericks to a 38-0 final.

George H. Brownlee, former Eastland resident, died Monday, Oct. 10, at Doctors Hospital in Fort Worth.

Funeral was held Wednesday, Oct. 12, in the First Methodist Church of De Leon, with Rev. L. W. Chapman, pastor of the Assembly of God Church, officiating. Burial was in DeLeon Cemetery.

Born March 31, 1899, in Mount Pleasant, he was a retired farmer and a member of the Methodist Church. He married Ruth Galloway in 1919.

Survivors include his wife; his mother, Mrs. J. J. Brownlee of De Leon; four sons; eight daughters; two brothers; and seven sisters, including Mrs. Ida Breashear of Eastland; 17 grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

Jack E. Tackett Dies Saturday; Rites In Ranger

Jack Edward Tackett, 36, was dead on arrival at Nazareth Hospital, Mineral Wells at 6:15 a. m. Saturday. Death followed an apparent heart attack.

Funeral services were conducted at Killingsworth Funeral Chapel at 3 p. m. Monday with Rev. Jack L. Heath, pastor of Eastside Baptist Church, officiating. Burial was in Wayland Cemetery under the direction of Killingsworth Funeral Home.

He was a veteran of the Korean War and had lived in Ranger 10 years prior to moving to the Cool Community near Mineral Wells last March. He was a master mechanic with Southern Airways at Mineral Wells.

He is survived by his wife; two sons, Roy and Ernest, both of the home; a daughter, Florence Levenia of the home; his mother, Mrs. Ernest Tackett of Ranger; three brothers, W. W. City Votes to Join WestTex Council

The Eastland City Commission voted to join the East Texas Council of Governments, bought a new backhoe earth mover and negotiated a final contract with the Whitetop Softball Team during the regular meeting

at City Hall Monday evening. Thurman Maynard, representing the baseball team, appeared before the commission and an agreement which previously had been drafted with a "perpetual" flavor, was redrafted to lease the team the old city pound property on a five-year basis with yearly options thereafter.

City Votes to Join WestTex Council

With the bare quorum present, Commissioner James Reid proposed that the city join the now-organizing Council of Governments. Commissioner Curtis Koen seconded and they and Mayor Frank Deaton voted for the motion.

Purpose explained for joining the organization is that it will become necessary to be a part of a regional planning group in order to obtain federal funds for development. With the prospects of having to re-vamp or rebuild a sewer system in the future, the city will presumably be in a position to obtain the funds — which for sewer systems are reportedly "without strings."

The commission opened bids and agreed on a \$7,595 back-hoe to be used in city construction work. Purchase will be from Perkins Implement and delivery is expected to be in about 60 days for the commercial piece of equipment which is a Ford diesel tractor with a seven-eighths yard bucket.

The city has needed such a device for a long time, City Manager Lewis Tiner reports.

The Commission agreed to permit Tiner to take a week vacation beginning Friday when he will accompany Bruce Pipkin and Charles Freyschlag to Colorado where they will join Jack Arrington and Dr. H. L. Bulger at a deer-hunting camp.

Commissioners M. A. Treadwell Jr., and Bill B. Hart were absent.

The county joined the Council of Governments last week. Dues are six cents per person per year.

UF Reaches 29 Per Cent With \$2,108. To Date

"Well on its way," is the way United Fund Drive Chairman Buddy Carter described the current campaign, which was launched Thursday.

Approximately 35 team captains, workers and UF officials turned out for a 7 a. m. Kick-Off Breakfast at the White Elephant and UF President Jack Arrington and Carter enthusiastically challenged the volunteers to "wrap up" the campaign in short order.

UF Treasurer James Reid reported at the initial meeting that the employees of Eastland National Bank, where he is a vice president, were already 100 per cent subscribed to the campaign.

Speaking in behalf of their various participating agencies at the breakfast were Frank Sayre, for the Boy Scouts; Wells Dalton, for the West Texas Rehabilitation Center; Mike Collins for the Salvation Army; and Grover Hallmark for the American Red Cross.

"All we have to do," Arrington said, "is to show the people in Eastland how many youngsters, and they number in the hundreds, are benefiting from UF giving, plus the servicemen and many others, and everyone will want to give generously."

Indications are that the current drive will have broad appeal to many individuals, which the UF officials feel should be the basis of the united drive. "The idea of such a consolidated effort is so that everyone can give as much as possible for many agencies, rather than having several individual drives," Carter said.

Campaign slogans presently seem to run: "Workers, make your calls," and "Citizens, give generously through United Fund."

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REPORT CARDS- 'Important'

"The Day of Reckoning" is exactly pronounced by both students. How did teachers determine the grades? Should parents become alarmed over grades? When? Just how important are grades anyway? School Superintendent Wendell Siebert says, "In the first place, a grade card is not designed to replace the teacher-parent conference. Problems of any kind cannot be written on a report card. This card simply shows how well a student has done for a given period of time."

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This period of time is six weeks in Eastland Schools. R. O. Baze, Elementary principal, explains that first-graders do not receive grade cards until mid-term. They are given progress reports at the end of six and twelve weeks of work. These letters of progress do not contain any grades as such.

Second semester first graders through seniors in high school receive report cards each six weeks of school. Siebert says, "Across the country, many various methods of expressing grades have been used and discarded. Most schools now use the method Eastland does: the traditional, plain talk, letters."

Grades are expressed: A, 90 or above; B, 80 to 89; C, 70 to 79; and F, below 70. The schools use no plus, no minus, and no figures except when recording grades in permanent grade books.

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Teachers determine grades by combining daily work averages with the six-week test grade in a percentage arrangement. Daily work grades include the scores for work done in class and on homework.

Baze explained, "Here we use the three-fourth, one-fourth percentage. For example, if the average daily work is 65, we multiply this figure by 3 (to get the three-fourths), add this to the six-week test grade, and divide by 4. This result is the grade which goes on the report card."

The percentage used in Junior High and High School is two-thirds and one-third. The method of figuring the grade is the same in all schools.

This way each grade reveals the net worth of each student's work. It does not show his standing in a class, percentage wise. It has nothing to do with what another has done.

J. W. Bailey, Junior High principal, said, "In any group, the grades will usually fall into a natural curve, with a certain percent of the group making A, and so on. But we do not grade to fit a curve."

High School Principal Charles Marshall explained it this way, "Assuming that all students in a class are of average ability, the grade curve will find most of them in the B and C group, with the smaller percentages making A or F."

"A class with 10% making A would be a high average. The plain truth is that everyone can't make A. Each one of us is talented in different ways and each one of us is different in our approach to any job, including that of being a student."

"An 'A' is given only for work which is above average; it represents superior work," Marshall stressed. "We don't want to be 'a hard school,' but we do want to impart to our students the knowledge that 'something for nothing' is part of a dream world. It has nothing to do with reality. Our classes are set up so that work outside the classroom is necessary."

How much outside work is required? Baze said, "The answer depends partly on who gives it. Some parents say we require too much; most students agree with that. But we cannot cover all the necessary material in class. Nor would it be a good idea to do so, if we could. Students need to study outside class."

Doesn't this sometimes tend to disrupt home life? "Shouldn't it determine home life?" Baze countered. "Parents expect to stay at home or stay up with a crying baby. They should also expect to curtail outside activity both for themselves and their children during the school year. School and its work should decide how much time is available for any other interest."

All three men stressed the fact that parents are usually not concerned enough about grades. Any drop in grade averages needs to be examined. Most students are consistent in grade averages, regardless of grade level, time of year, or subject matter.

"Although the first 6 weeks grades are ordinarily a little low," Bailey added. "Students sometimes have difficulty adapting to a new school year and it takes a little time for them to settle down to the routine."

Usually, however, a drop means a problem of some kind. There's no easy solution to any problem and parents should not expect to find one just by contacting a teacher. But when a parent and a teacher search together for causes of incomplete or unacceptable work, they can generally find them and attempt to change the trend.

National figures show that 42% of students entering school in the first grade will drop out before reaching the ninth grade (high school freshman class, in Eastland). This alone should prompt parents to see exactly what role they are expected to play in the education of their children.

Scouts to a ball team recognizes the value of maintaining grades. No group expects to take time which should be given to study.

5. Contact the teacher whenever it's necessary: any time a student is not passing, not doing what he is capable of doing, or tells you he has no homework. (Everyone at the school system agreed that students have homework, if not daily, then several times each week.)

6. Please call the schools & make an appointment - high school, call Mr. Marshall at MAIn 9-2685; Junior High, call Mr. Bailey at MAIn 9-1422; and Elementary, call Mr. Eaze at MAIn 9-2377. All will arrange the conference with the teacher involved.

7. Please do not ask to meet with any teacher during her regular classes. Calling a teacher from her classroom is unfair, not only to other students, but to the student you need to discuss.

8. Never bring the student to the conference. If he is small, ask someone to keep him for you. Things need to be said both by the teacher and by you which the student need not hear and perhaps misunderstand. Come alone (or with your husband or wife); do not come with children or students.

9. Stress to the child that you understand what the school requires and why and that you are willing to help him meet these requirements. (If you aren't sure of yourself on these grounds, call the school and ask.)

Are grades important? They are very important. Marshall said, "We have too many students making F and the main cause of failure is lack of effort. The student simply isn't willing to pay the price required to pass."

This alone should indicate concern. "Any student is able to pass here if he puts forth the effort. Any student graduated from Eastland High School can maintain the same grades in college, provided he puts forth the same effort there. Our students who transfer to other schools do about as well there as they did here; those coming into our system do the same, or fall slightly."

Siebert summed up, "This school system has as fine a faculty as anyone could wish for us. We set standards which are difficult, but which can be mastered the way one masters anything in life: by diligent work."

The principals suggested the following steps:

1. Be interested in your child's work. Each afternoon, ask what homework he has, see that he does it, and gets back to school with it. Many times pupils fail to bring assignments, and getting the work to school is as vital as doing it.
2. Ask to see homework which has been returned by the teacher.
3. Make sure the student studies for his tests, and completes any special project, (including posters, booklets, etc.)
4. Let the child understand that his school work comes first, before play, ball games, Scouts, television, or anything. All organizations from

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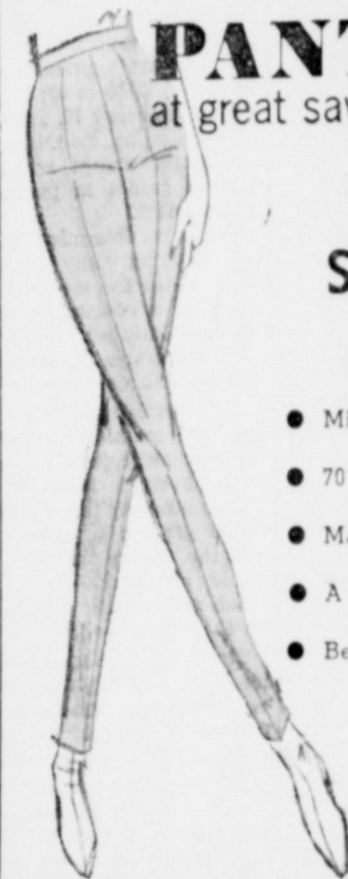

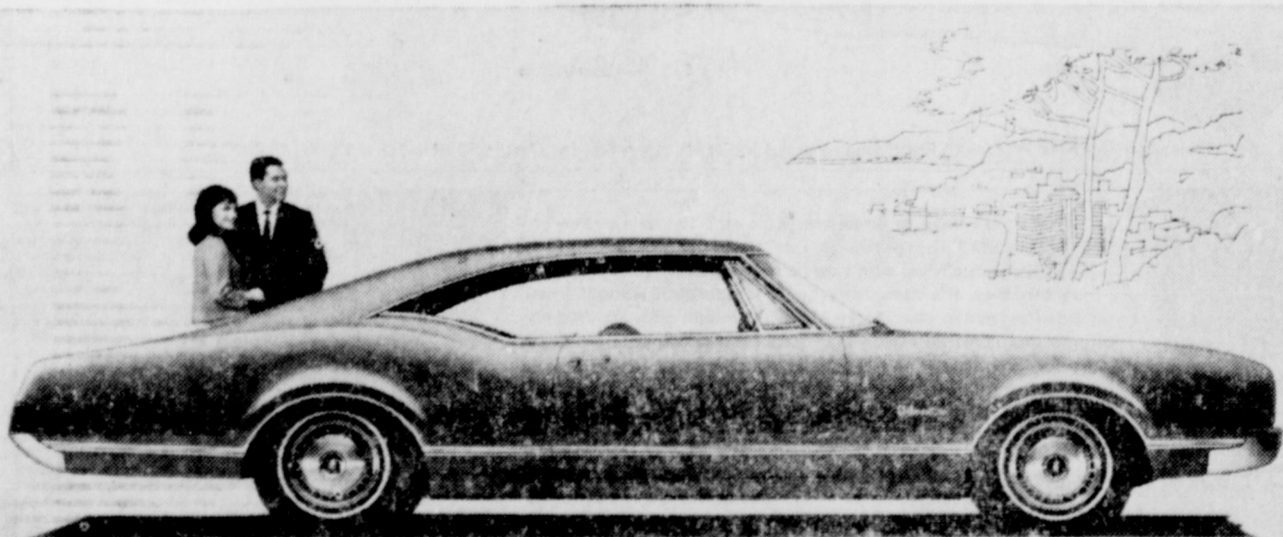

Cattle Price Is Due to be Good For Coming Year

COLLEGE STATION. — Texas cattle prices will remain favorable for the remainder of 1966 and into 1967, especially for the efficient producer, a Texas A&M University agricultural economist predicted today.

John G. McHaney, Extension economist, said continued strength in the general economy would insure an increasing price trend for beef cattle beginning very late in 1966. All of 1967, he added, should be favorable if our economy continues to grow and range conditions remain good.

McHaney said feed lot operators at the present were more reluctant than usual to bid up feeder cattle prices. Their feed costs are rising and will be higher in the months ahead than in the first half of 1966 and fed cattle prices have declined to narrow their margins, he said. But, taking all factors into consideration, feeder prices are expected to remain near current levels which are much better than for the same period a year ago.

As for fed cattle prices, he said they should hold during the October-December period to average near the year-ago levels. Marketings of fed cattle are expected to continue large but the increase over a year ago probably will be less than that which took place in the summer of 1966.

Downward price pressure can develop if range conditions over the nation deteriorate; thus, forcing large movements of grass cattle to slaughter at a time when fed cattle marketings are already heavy. Too, feeding to heavier weights could put continued pressure on fed cattle prices during the rest of the year.

TEXAS TRAVEL HANDBOOK IS PUBLISHED BY STATE

AUSTIN — Two years of detailed research were culminated today with the re-lease of a comprehensive, 176-page "Texas Travel Handbook," published by the Travel and Information Division of the Texas Highway Department.

The glove-compartment sized book contains more than 1,500 items of interest ranging from Alibates Flint Quarries to General Zaragoza's birthplace. In the family of materials now published by the Highway Department, the Handbook fills a need by providing specific information on points of interest and where they are located.

As State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer pointed out, "We have in the past attracted visitors with a colorful array of brochures, maps, motion pictures and posters — all broad in scope. But once within our borders, there was no single volume to introduce specific sites of interest.

"This new publication," Greer said "will lead our visitors to attractions in every corner of the state."

In addition to guiding the individual visitor, the new "Texas Travel Handbook" will serve as a reference tool for national travel writers, whose interest is increasingly focused upon Texas.

"Through Highway Department distribution channels," Greer said, "the new travel handbook will be placed in the hands of travel writers, editors and publishers throughout the United States — and in fact, in many countries over the world. However," Greer said, "the Handbook will not be available in bulk quantities for re-

distribution. Rather, it will be provided on a select and individual basis to the actual traveler."

The publication represents the first attempt by an agency to compile a comprehensive visitor's guide to Texas.

"We realize," Greer said "in a volume of this depth and detail, some omissions are inevitable at the first printing. As new sites and attractions develop, and our information is updated, subsequent printings will include those new items."
