Comanche Indians Scalp EHS Mavericks, 33-8

The Eastland Mavericks put together a scoring combination in the second quarter, but it was too little to overcome the Comanche Indians, who won their first district game, 33-8, over the Mavericks in Indian Stadium Friday night.

The Eastland score came on a pass from Quarterback Gene Wilson to End Gary Spradling who galloped for the six points. Another aerial to End Jim Herridge accounted for the extra points and the last of the local scoring.

The Indians tallied three touchdowns in the second stanza to take a commanding lead with Fullback Bobby Reeves plunging over the goal line from one yard out for the first Comanche score. A 35-yard pass play from Ronnie Colcleasure to Richard Arthur set up the score.

Halfback Jack McDonald hit left tackle and scampered 45 yards for another Indian tally.

The Indians took to the airways again to score on a 20-yard pass from halfback Ronny Stanley to end T. J. Cottrell. Bobby Reeves booted the extra point and Comanche held a 19-8 lead at the half.

Another Comanche tally in the third stanza added to the victory margin, when Ronny Stanley grabbed an Eastland aerial and ran 60 yards to touchdown territory. Reeves kicked the extra point.

Comanche quarterback Jack McDonald carried on a left end sweep in the final stanza for four yards and a final Indian touchdown, set up by a pass interference call against Eastland on the four. Tommy Humphrey kicked the extra point.

Funeral arrangements have been pending since the parents were notified of their son's death by military telegram. The telegram informed them that the seaman, who had completed three years of a four-year enlistment, had been aphyxiated.

Young Gray was born in McAllen and had lived in Lubbock and in Happy, Tex. His family moved to Carbon about two years ago. He is survived by his parents; three brothers, Ray, 19, also in the Navy stationed in San Francisco aboard the USS Delta; Blaine, 27, of Gorman, and Wayne, 30, pastor of a church at Aztec, New Mexico.

Arrested in the latter city, reportedly with more than \$26,000 in counterfeit money in their possession, two suspects were indicted on July 29th before a U. S. District Court for possession of counterfeit notes and were jailed, with sentencing deferred.

The Official Detective report, titled, "The Motel Counterfeit Money Caper," gives high praise to police who participated in the investigation.

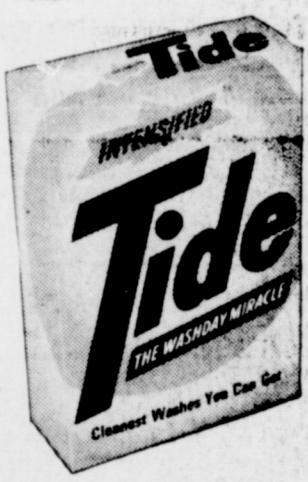
