#### RELIEF WORKERS ON A SELF-SUSTAINING BASIS

Speaking of the new program of relief to the needy the federal administration plans radical changes. To put the program into effect work relief divisions of existing state and local emergency unemployment administrations will be "modified." In other words the New Deal administration is to take over work relief. A conference will be held in the city of Washington on Nov. 14 to which governors, mayors, city engineers and others will be invited to hear and discuss the new program. This is the Washington viewpoint: Approximately 3,000,000 families are being cared for on public relief rolls now. The federal relief administration reckons four to a family and estimates that 8,000,000 persons, or two-thirds of the number receiving relief should be placed on a self-sustaining basis for the life of the civil works program.

There were many drouth sections of America during the hot summer months. Feedstuffs as well as pasture lands were destroyed. Now the administration has allowed 5,-500,000 bushels of wheat to be used for livestock food in Texas, Oklahoma, Colorado, New Mexico, Kansas, North Dakota, South Dakota and Wisconsin drouth areas. The grain is part of the 11,579,000 bushels purchased for the relief administration. It will be distributed through state work out. emergency relief administrations to farm families receiv-They are against violence. They are against picketing.

#### NEW YORK BARS THE OPEN SALOON

New York lawmakers bowing to the recommendation of Gov. Herbert H. Lehmann paved the way for the coming of repeal by the creation of an experimental liquor control plan-in other words a state commission. Now the commission has ruled out the old time saloon and its bar. After repeal New Yorkers may buy their stimulatnig beverages only in bona fide hotels, restaurants, clubs, dining cars and ships. The only restaurant permitted to sell drink are those who can prove that most of their receipts come from the sale of food.

"They cannot just sell salads and sandwiches and get away with it," is the ultimatum of the state commission. Nowhere except at tables may liquor be sold and poured for customers. Sale of bottled liquor for off premises consumption will be restricted to state licensed retail liquor stores-a modification of the Quebec plan. Neither groexceries nor any other kind of store can sell liquor or wine

Joseph L. Mulrooney is the chairman of the state commission. For 30 years he was a member of the police department of Greater New York. He walked a beat, and won promotion until he filled the office of superintendent of the police department. Mulrooney did not take orders. He was thrown out by former Mayor James J. Walker and his advisers. Gov. Lehmann knew his man. He picked the deposed commissioner as the head of the state control com-

Now it is said that when Mayor-Elect LaGuardia comes in early in January he will name Maj. Gen. John F. O'Ryan as superintendent of his police department. Gen. O'Ryan commanded a division in France. He is a thorough-going democrat-but not a Tiger democrat. He backed the La-Guardia candidacy to the limit. There are thousands of speakesies in the four boroughs of Greater New York. Will their doors be closed? Will the new state plna of control drive the speaks and their proprietors to the tall timber?

#### SENATOR SHEPPARD SAID IT WAS JUST A SHOWER

Senator Morris Sheppard will come up for re-election in 1936. He is the co-author of the dead amendment. 
