## Beef Killing and Canning Is Discussed

HOUSTON, Tex.—Five hundred men are hard at work getting Epsom Downs, Texas' newest racing plant, ready for its first 30-day meet, which will open Thanksgiving Day.

Epsom Downs, costing \$400,000, is being built by Lou Smith, Montreal turfman, who built and made a success of the Rockingham Park track at Salem, N. H. The Houston plant is a replica of Rockingham and was named after a famous English track.

The plant will be completed about November 25. The stables will be ready for occupancy about November 15.

Epsom Downs is located six miles from here on the Humble road.

E. V. Whitney and Mrs. Harry Payne Whitney, owners of the famous Green Tree stables, have wired for reservations for 16 horses during the opening meet. Reservations have been requested by other horse owners in all parts of the country.

Daily purses totaling \$135,000 will be offered during the inaugural meet. The feature will be the six-surlong Thanksgiving Day Handicap, with \$2,500 added, for two-year-olds and upward.

The track will be operated by the Texas Breeders and Racing Association. Officers are Ed J. Hussion, president; Mel S. Ingelright, vice president, and Lou Smith, manager.

Jim Milton, famous starter at eastern tracks, will officiate in that capacity at Epsom Downs. Jockeys who will appear at the inaugural meet include Johnny Gilbert, Hank Mills, Earl Porter, Jack Westrope, Sylvia Coucci, Eddie Yowell and Johnny Hughes.

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## Would Provide 6,000,000 Pounds of Meat For Texas Needy.

COLLEGE STATION, Nov. 10. Details of a plan for buying, killing and canning six million or more pounds of beef in Texas for relief of the needy in Texas, thru the Federal Emergency Relief administration and in cooperation with the Texas Relief Commission and the Extension Service of Texas A. & M. College, were explained here to county farm and home demonstration agents assembled in annual meeting. Principal features of the plan were agreed upon in a conference of extension officials with C. Z. Crane of the Federal Surplus Relief corporation, Austin.

Texas is the first and only state thus far to try out this plan of supplying its own needy by purchases made wholly within the state, Mr. Crane said. If it succeeds the same plan may be used in the purchase of butter and eggs and possibly other food stuffs, he added.

Federal relief authorities have allocated about \$500,000 to Texas for purchases of beef this winter above the regular requisitions, and this money less a relatively small administrative expense will be paid Texas farmers for 20,000 or more cutter cows, Mr. Crane explained. The plan, which is expected to be put in operation very soon, contemplates the assembly of the beeves purchased in 15 to 20 Texas points for slaughter and canning. The location of the processing plants has not been definitely decided, but in general they will be located in the centers of areas where the need for relief is greatest.

Purchases will be allocated to counties, and experienced buyers employed by the relief commission will do the buying. Regular market price will be paid but there will be a saving to farmers in freight and commission due to the fact that the animals will be slaughtered within the area where they are purchased.

All slaughtering is to be done by commercial killers at points where there are slaughtering and refrigeration facilities, and where there are R. F. C. canneries. At some places new canneries will probably be established to save costly transportation.

The unemployed are to be given jobs in these canneries under supervision of persons selected by the Extension Service and directed by home demonstration agents.

The grade of cattle to be bought will be primarily fat cows. Sorry cattle are not wanted in these purchases which are to be widely distributed over the Texas and between as many farmers as possible. The cutting of the carcasses is to be done by butchers the "A. & M. Way" to facilitate canning, this process to be demonstrated by Roy W. Snyder, extension specialist. The best meat will be canned as roasts with the other parts going into cans of stew, hamburgers, chili, and hash.

Much credit is due Lawrence Westbrook of the Texas Relief Commission for getting this "bought in Texas, used in Texas", plan in operation, Mr. Crane said.
