By United Press WASHINGTON, Feb. 3. Means to check the rapid return flow of capital to the United States because of its threat to the successful operation of the American nonetary program, were studied

by the administration today. So great is the confidence inspired in the outlook by the return to a modified form of a gold standard, the huge flow of investment funds to this country has disrupted world financial markets and interfered with the efforts to peg the dollar in foreign markets at 59.06 per cent of its former gold value.

Several billions of dollars worth of capital, which sought in London last summer from the decline in the dollar, has begun to return to the United States. It is being attracted by the assurance of at least temporary stability of the dollar and the new field for investment with the gradual improvement in business conditions.

SENATOR REED ON THE RACK

Sen. David A. Reed of Pennsylvania is one of the polished products of the Quaker State school of law and politics and finance. He is a republican. His enemies call him "the king of stand-patters." His followers call him "the leader of the stalwarts." Newspaper correspondents classify him as the senate voice of the ancient reactionaries whose whose laws and tariff and tax enactments made the mighty happy and the many lean in pocket. Well, Reed has been turned in by A. J. Ball, general freight agent of the Pennsylvania railway.

Ball told senate investigators that he had an agreement with Walter F. Brown, former postmaster general, that his company, the Philadelphia Mail Steamship company, would be given an ocean mail contract provided a senate filibuster prevented action on a resolution to hold up the proposed contracts. Witness Ball identified correspondence in which it was asserted that Brown wanted his connection with the contract kept confidential. Brown's contract was for carrying mail to the United Kingdom and would have amounted to \$1,-000,000 a year if 52 voyages had been made. All this happened during the Hoover administration. PASSING OF WILLIAM R. SINCLAIR

William R. Sinclair is dead at his home in the Alamo City. He was 80 when he died. He had been connected with the press of Texas for 60 years. He was a Canadian by birth; he was educated in Edinburgh, Scotland, the native land of his parents. He came to Texas when he was Jess than 20. He was a practical printer as well as a writer. His first employment was at Weatherford, Parker county, then on the Texas frontier. He journeyed from Weatherford to Houston. He was given employment on the staff of the Houston Post by Col. R. M. Johnston, one of the pioneer publishers and editors of Texas. He was a member of the staff of the Post for 20 years. In his time he had been the Texas correspondent of the St. Louis Globe-Democrat, later he worked for the Houston Chronicle, the Beaumont Enterprise, the New Orleans World, the Corpus Christi Caller, the Dallas News, the Dallas Times-Herald, and then as a member of the staff of the San Antonio Express where he closed his career after having served in every editorial capacity of a newspaper. He never deserted the newspaper firing line. He never was without a job. He died in harness. Peace to his ashes. He was a credit at all times to the Fourth Estate and its sons and daughters.
