Hog Prices Mount On Chicago Market

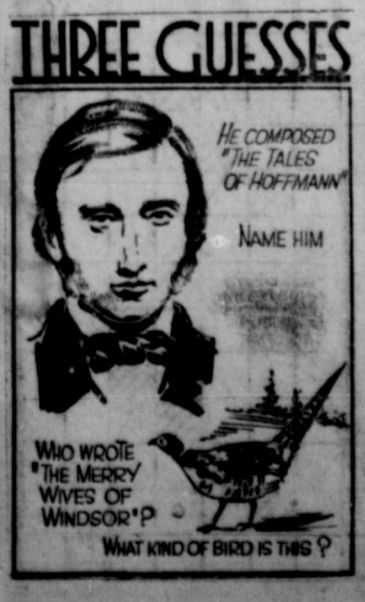
