AN APPEAL ON OIL CONTROL TO THE CCURT OF LAST RESORT

Confronted by an adverse ruling by a federal district judge the federal government moved to take to the supreme court of the United States, if necessary, its fight to establish the constitutionality of the petroleum code under the national recovery act. A reminder that the federal grand jury for the eastern district of Texas returned five indictments charging violation of the code despite the fact that Judge Randolph Bryant held that penalties for violations of the code could not be assessed against concerns which had not signed the code and "dealt noly in intra-state commerce."

Charles I. Francis is special assistant to Atty. Gen. Homer Cummings. Speaking of the indictments returned by the federal grand jury Francis said: "The charges were filed on points held unconstitutional, but the jury "went ahead indicting them anyway."

"WALLED DOMAIN OF TEXAS CATTLE BARONS"

Chairman Wood and his fellow commissioners of the state highway department appear to be ready for the battle. Their commission agreed to pay one-fifth of the cost of constructing Hug-the-Coast highway 36 through Kenedy county, known as "the walled domain of Texas cattle "barons." Moreover, the remaining four-fifths of the construction costs is to be paid from the special federal appropriation according to the plan proposed by the highway commission. Moreover, again, "the state's share is not to be expended until the federal fund has been secured "and spent."

All of which is a reminder that for years motorists traveling this route from Canada to the Pacific Ocean have had to drive 100 miles around the cattle domain, "walled ir" to get 50 miles closer to the coast. Texas lawmakers have spoken. By resolution passed in the first special session last fall they directed the state highway department to speed its surveys of a proposed highway route through "Kenedy county. Enginers in charge have made the announcement that the surveys will be completed shortly and that then right-of-way will be obtained for the highway across the Kenedy county portion of the coastal plains. 




