Dinner to Honor 18 Company Officials

Eastland will salute the Hollywood - Maxwell Corset Co. Thursday at a dinner in honor of officials of the company and then Hollywood - Maxwell will salute Eastland and the Chamber of Commerce at an open house to be held at the new factory building.

The dinner will be held at 6:30 at the Connelley Hotel roof garden and the open house is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. Fred Brown will serve as master of ceremonies at both occasions.

Entertainment at the open house will include several numbers by the Eastland High School band, under the direction of Howard Hill; singing by the mixed choir of the Colored First Baptist Church and several specialty numbers to be presented by Al Lotzspeich, head of the music department at Ranger Junior College.

Pioneer conference grid teams, with victories in three of four tests against outside competition in season openers last week, face a full five-game slate this week.

Schreiner institute's Mountaineers will make their debut against a heavy, experienced Victoria junior college 11 at Victoria Thursday night. The Mountaineers will rely on a veteran line to offset Victoria's advantage in having already played a scheduled game.

Arlington state's Rebels will host the Del Mar Vikings, 1955 champions of the Longhorn conference, Thursday in one of the week's banner games. Halfback Calvin Lee led Rebel runners with three TD's—one on a 38-yard scamper—and added a point after for 19 points. Tarleton state will round out the Thursday slate against the Paris Dragons at Paris. The Stephenville crew scored an impressive 20-12 victory over Allen academy in their debut last week, with Quarterback Jerry Flemmons passing for 79 yards on four completions in six tries, including one touchdown.

Ducats for TCU Home Games Sell at Fast Clip

PORT WORTH — Tickets for TCU's four home football games this fall continue at a rapid pace according to Ticket Manager Martin Phillips this week.

"We've set a new all-time high in season tickets and the individual game sales are going real good," smiled Phillips. "But there are still plenty of good seats available for all four contests."

Phillips pointed out that some good seats still remain high in the new upper deck on the west side and in the east stands.

Sales indicate a possible crowd of 30,000 for the home opener with Arkansas at 2:30 p.m. Oct. 6. The Texas game has been the favorite among the buyers and school officials predict a new attendance mark will be set for the Nov. 17 conflict. The all-time home crowd record was set last year for the A & M game when 37,500 people attended.

Phillips also reminded that a tit option seats are still being sold to the public at \$100 per seat. The option enables the purchaser to obtain the same seat on a year-to-year basis for life. These seats, which have arms and back, are located inside the 40-yard lines in both the upper and lower decks on the west side of the stadium.

Turkey Growers To Hear Poultry Marketing Expert

Holland Reed of DeLeon reports one two and one-half pound channel cat and a one and one-half pound bass, all caught casting. E. N. Smith, A. L. Adams and W. L. Area Men are Commissioned

F. S. Beanblossom, poultry marketing specialist of the Texas A&M college extension service, will discuss and demonstrate "Utilizing More Turkey" at the regular monthly meeting of the Central Texas Turkey Growers association in the conference room of the First National bank in Cisco Thursday night, according to Bart Frasier, president of the group.

Aubrey Kincaid, Ranger, will furnish the turkey for the demonstration, Frasier said. The meeting is expected to get underway at 7:30 o'clock.

Beanblossom has been putting on the demonstration at various points over the state the past few weeks in cooperation with the Texas Turkey Federation. Frasier and County Agent J. M. Cooper who attended one of the meetings at Brownwood recently were impressed and invited Beanblossom to present the same demonstration and talk before growers in this area.

Not only growers but feed men, processors and locker plant men are invited to attend the meeting, Frasier said. One of the largest turkey crops on record is being grown this year with the first of them beginning to go on the market. The demonstration by the marketing specialist shows a very practical way to get some of the larger birds consumed in a practical manner it was said.

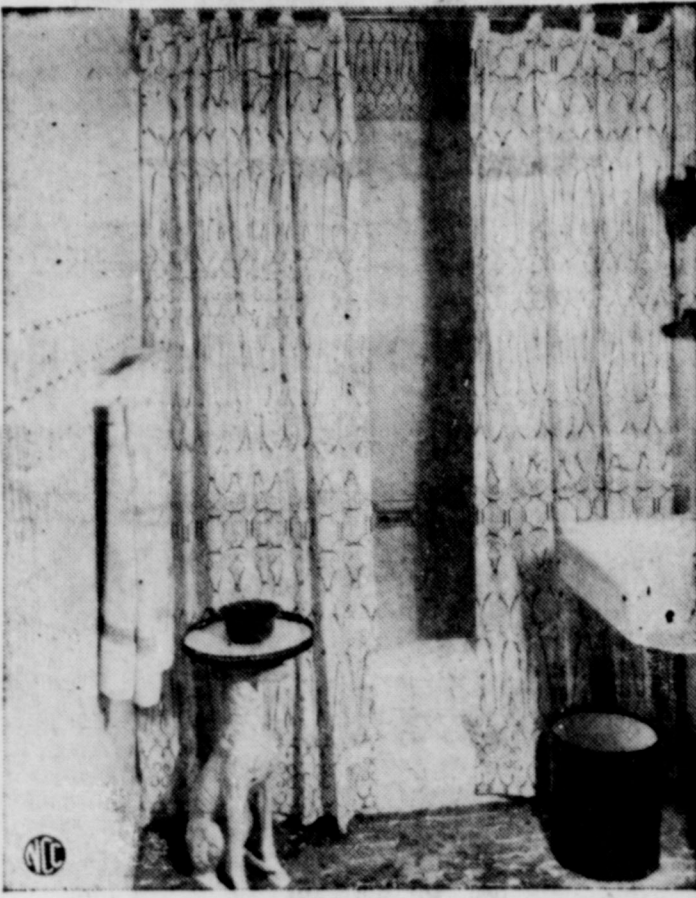

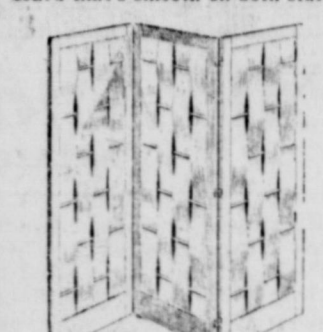

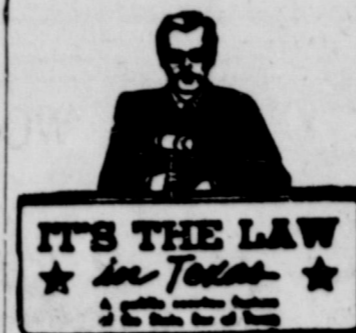

One Champion Repeats in Boat Races

With half of the 16 national in-board class champions already decided for 1956, only Forest E. Johnson, Miami, Fla., boat builder, in his F service runabout "Junior Prowler" has repeated his 1955 class win. New titleholders have captured American Power Boat association plaques signifying national class honors in the other seven events.

A newcomer to competition, William T. Waggoner, Jr., Vernon, Tex., cattle and oil man, gained the American championship in the Seafair hydroplane class when his Shanty I was driven to victory in the Seafair Trophy race at Seattle, Wash. UNORDERED MERCHANDISE

Suppose the mailman delivers to you a package containing a necktie—or a book, key-ring tags or a phonograph record—that you didn't order. Either with it, or by later mail, is a bill or request to remit the price.

What are your obligations, assuming you don't want the merchandise? Must you return it? Can you use it and not pay for it? Must you keep it, or can you throw it away?

Generally speaking, recipients of unordered merchandise are under no obligation (a) to return it; (b) to acknowledge its receipt; (c) to pay for it unless used; (d) to give it particular care; or (e) to keep it beyond a reasonable time.

You are obligated to surrender the merchandise if called for in person by the shipper or his agent within a reasonable time. But you can demand storage charges before surrendering the item. If you mail it back at your own expense, you very likely will stay on the sender's mailing list and will receive other shipments in the future.

There are no postal regulations governing unordered merchandise, except where fraud is involved.

Congress is trying to draft some legislation that will cover the situation. However, if you know what is in the envelope or package, you can write "refused" across the face of the piece of mail and hand it back unopened to the mailman. No further explanation is required. You don't have to accept any class of mail. Further, your refusal probably will result in the sender having to pay return postage.

A ruling by the federal-trade act for a sender of unordered merchandise to claim that "the receiver is under obligation . . . to pay for or return the merchandise." Hence, if you don't use the merchandise, you are within your rights to refusing to pay for it.

In summary, unless you want to use the item, in which case you should pay for it, you should keep it for awhile and then may throw it away.

If another person's mail is improperly delivered to you, do not open it, as such action might make you liable to severe legal penalties. Such mail should promptly be re-deposited in a postal box with an appropriate notation thereon, such as the proper address or "not 14 South Brown Street", showing the address to which the mail had been delivered.

Sixth Better Breakfast Month Stresses Importance of Breakfast



Educators are alarmed about the lack of good nutrition habits among teen-age girls. Many studies have indicated that teen-agers do not receive enough food, as far as the necessary nutrients and the amount of food they eat. The Children's Bureau, in its recently revised pamphlet "The Adolescent in Your Family," recommends that breakfast should provide about one-third of the adolescent's daily requirements of protein. To take care of one third of an adolescent's needed protein for the day calls for a substantial breakfast—for example, a serving of fruit, a bowl of cereal, an egg, a glass of milk to drink in addition to what is on the cereal and 2 or more slices of buttered toast.

Research at the State University of Iowa demonstrated that teen-age boys who ate a good breakfast felt and performed better, especially in the late morning hours. It was the consensus of the school authorities that the omission of breakfast exerted a significant detrimental effect both on the attitude and scholastic attainment of the teen-agers who followed this practice during the time they were in school. This study further demonstrated that the good breakfast habit is a sound nutritional principle that applies to teen-age boys and girls and the young and old alike.

MOTHERS—Are you doing your part to improve the breakfast habits of your teen-agers? If not, start now! Take special care to serve an attractive, adequate breakfast each day. A basic breakfast pattern, recommended by doctors and dietitians, of fruit, cereal, milk, bread and butter, with eggs and breakfast meats for variety, will ensure that your teen-agers are being served a breakfast nutritionally adequate for them.

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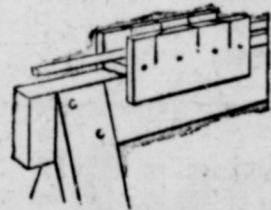


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Handy Jim's FIX-UP TIPS For the Home

Thus there is support at a comfortable height and the location of the unit can be changed to meet convenience. Another worthwhile suggestion from this magazine is to use sheet-metal screws to seal holes that were punched into a can so that part of the contents could be poured out. The screws prevent evaporation, eliminate pollution and look neat.

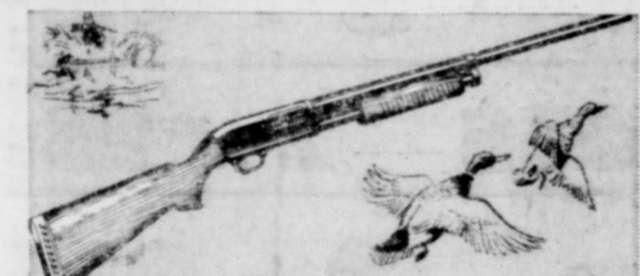
