### MUNICIPAL RELIEF LEGISLATION SAID TO BE ON THE WAY

This is a fast moving world. There are fastmoving lawmakers under the big dome on the banks of the potomac river. The judiciary committee of the United States senate, "by a surprise vote of 8 to 5," approved the municipal bankruptcy relief bill as passed by the house of representatives last session. There are drastic provisions to be found in the bill. The measure would permit cities and ther state taxing districts in default on their bonds to petition the federal courts for a scaling down or an extension of their debts, "providing creditors holding 30 per cent of the debt consented."

And now the rail brotherhoods of Oklahoma in convention assembled have asked the congress to a six-hour day without wage reduction for members of the four brotherhoods of rail employes. These rail heads of organized Habor passed on to Washington a seven-point program in which they urged congressional approval. This program includes a uniform retirement or pension plan and estab-Hishment of a national adjustment board as well as rules governing hours, minimum train crews and maximum ength trains. Well, the President has issued a new challenge to the industrial world. He has called upon business to increase employment and to do so without delay. He promises protection to the "little fellows, meaning small business." In other words, he insists that it is the immediate task of industry to re-employ more people at purchasing wages and to do it now. He calls for a revision of the codes. Indeed, he said "The essential provision of the codes should check or reverse competitive methods by which the small business man was or is being squeezed out," In addition to all this he made it plain that labor should be given the right to organize freely as provided for by the recovery unit in the general plan of the code. Is congress to remain in session until the fall months of the Eyear?

### TEXAS HARBORS AND CHANNELS VOTED MILLIONS

Rep. John J. Mansfield of Texas is chairman of the rivers and harbors committee of the house. An expenditure of more than \$2,000,000 for maintenance of Texas gulf coast harbors and channels during the fiscal year has en recommended in the war department appropriation bill. Not a Gulf port was overlooked-not even the New Orleans-Sabine river section of the Louisiana-Texas intercoastal waterway, the sum of \$235,000 on the Sabine river to Corpus Christi section having been recommended by the congressional powers that be. This is a democratic administration and for the first time in 60 years Texas and Texans have been given "proper recognition by a national

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


