Allen was represented by Frank Sparks. He was charged with attacking a Cisco housewife.

Today Cow Owen Garrett will face charges resulting from a knife fight earlier this year in Eastland. Garrett is accused of knifeing Doyle Burns in a fight in north Eastland.

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### Good Line Credited With Backs' Showing

Everytime a member of the Eastland Maverick starting backfield picks up the ball, you can just about count on a six yard gain.

That's what figures compiled after the first three non-district tilts reveal, at any rate.

Quarterback Harvey Lewis, Fullback Saul Pullman and Halfbacks Jimmy Martin and Billy Upchurch have together eaten up 719 yards in 114 carries this year, for an average of 6.3 yards a try.

Martin is the leading ground gainer for the Mavs, and also has the best percentage record. The swift halfback has made 241 yards in just 34 tries, despite the fact that he got off to a bad start against Cisco, making just 27 yards in nine tries. His average for the three games is 7.1 yards. Against Dublin he made 89 yards in just five tries. He put a 43 yard sprint back-to-back in that game. Playing perhaps his best game of the year against DeLeon, the shifty Martin raced 125 yards while handling the ball 20 times. His longest run in that game was for 20 yards for a touchdown.

Upchurch has the next best percentage record. Bill has carried the ball just 20 times, but has averaged 6.6 yards a try. Against Cisco he made 49 yards in six carries, against Dublin 14 yards in five tries, and against DeLeon, 69 yards in nine attempts.

Pullman is next in line, percentage-wise. The hard charging Maverick back, who has been Eastland's most dependable yardage maker, has raced 159 yards in 27 attempts. He made 42 yards against Cisco, carrying the ball eight times. Against Dublin he toted the leather four times, but made 41 yards. Last Friday night, against DeLeon, he powered his way 76 yards in 15 attempts.

Lewis, doing something that is appreciated, but not expected of a quarterback, is actually the

Mavs' second largest ground gainer. Harvey has a 5.7 average, but has compiled a record of 187 yards in 33 carries.

Cisco was Harvey's biggest game. The Lobos couldn't stop the ball-hiding Mav, and he took advantage of the situation to race for 120 yards in 16 carries, on keeper plays and option plays. Against Dublin, a game that he saw just limited action in, Lewis carried the ball just twice, but he made 21 yards. The DeLeo game saw Lewis keep on 15 plays and run for 46 yards.

Martin Leading Scorer  
Martin is also the leading scorer. He has made 30 points with five touchdowns. Lewis has 19 points to his credit, with three touchdowns and one successful point after out of three tries.

Upchurch ranks fourth with one touchdown and five of seven extra point tries for 11 points. End Dale Slatton has scored three touchdowns on passes from Lewis for 15 points and third place. J. C. Jarrett has scored seven points, with one touchdown and one of four extra point tries. Johnny McMahon has six points to his credit, coming on a pass from Clint Humphreys.



Those figures look good, and if you ask any of those boys why they all have the same answer: "What a line, we've got up there."

## Hospital Meet Tonight; Reporter Gets Answers

Stockholders of the Eastland Memorial Hospital Corp. will hold their annual meeting here Thursday night in the conference room of the Texas Electric Service Co.

The meeting, which in the past has attracted little attention, this year will apparently be well attended. From letters to the editor, telephone calls and questions that have been flying thick and fast, the interest is plentiful.

In an attempt to correct some apparent misunderstandings and answer questions which have been asked, the Telegram has done a bit of research in the past few days concerning the hospital.

One of the chief misunderstandings concerning the hospital's ownership. Many believe that the institution is owned by the City of Eastland, and that every local citizen therefore should have a voice in its operations.

Actually Eastland Memorial Hospital is owned by a non-profit corporation. Three hundred and twenty-five shares, of that total, 767 are whole shares, 53 are half shares and 124 are fourth shares.

By-laws of the corporation explain how the shares were given out.

"There shall be a regular meeting of the contributors annually in the month of September to elect directors for the succeeding year and to transact such other business as may properly be brought before them," the by-laws read.

"The secretary shall at least 15 days prior to each such meeting give notice thereof, indicating the time and place by publishing such notice one time in a newspaper published and circulated in the city of Eastland that, at such meetings, each contributor of money, labor and or water assessment of \$50.01 to \$99.99, inclusive, shall have one-half vote. Each contributor of money, labor and or water assessment of \$100 or more shall have one vote for each \$100 and additional fraction thereof."

companies, own shares, 25 civic groups have voting stock, and the remainder is owned by individuals. A list of all stockholders is available to the public.

Were some voluntary workers overlooked when the stock was given out? Probably so, members of the Board freely admit. They point out, however, that records were kept by volunteers, and that many workers failed to report.

Thursday night, three new members will be elected to three year terms. Outgoing members are Frank Sayre, Frank Crowell and T. M. Fullen. Fullen has served as president this past year. All three say they will not accept new terms.

Holdover members of the Board are Tom Wilson, Bill Hoffman and Billy Frost, all who have two more years to serve, and Horace Horton, Hood King and Mrs. Samuel Butler, who have one more year to serve.

Names to be offered to stockholders as candidates for the three year terms, will be submitted by a committee appointed by the Board, a procedure outlined in the by-laws. Floor nominations can be made, however.

Fullen explained one question which was asked by a Telegram reader concerning money made from the Riders Club show. He said that he understood that the show was actually sponsored by the Civic League and Garden Club. That organization worked up the show, he said, and received the stock that was issued.

Concerning the Ford grant, Fullen said the hospital has actually just received \$5000 so far. "We are to receive another \$5000 next year," he explained. "Our plans are to build a 38 by 56 addition to the hospital, but it will take more than \$10,000 to do it."

The Board president said an attempt has been made to get surplus government equipment so that the addition can be built for the \$10,000.

## Fifty Attend First Annual Pecan Tour

"How many pounds of pecans would you say is on this tree? At 150, well how much money would that be at 40 cents a pound?"

Speaking was County Agent J. M. Cooper. His audience was a group of Eastland county citizens who are interested in the pecan industry in this county. Cooper was busy making them realize that pecans make a profitable crop, even during the serious drought that the county is now in.

The occasion was the first annual Eastland County Pecan tour which was held Tuesday. Growers, civic and agricultural leaders numbering about 50 took part in the affair.

The group met Tuesday morning at the swimming pool at Ranger and from there visited the Ellis Cooper orchard. From there they went to B. B. Freeman's orchard in Cheaney and then to B. M. Bennett's place at Gorman. There they enjoyed lunch.

Tuesday afternoon the group went to three other Gorman orchards. They visited the C. D. Simmons, D. J. Jobe and Mrs. A. G. Underwood farms.

All except one of the orchards were set or planted. All but two were in deep sandy soil, which Cooper said was some of the best pecan land in the world.

L. G. Romberg, a pecan expert from the Brownwood Experiment Station, also made the tour. At the Freeman orchard the group saw a number of experiment trees provided Freeman by the Experiment Station for testing. Some of them were described as "excellent."

Cooper said he hoped to make the tour an annual affair. "Pecans are, although we haven't realized it much before, a fairly good drought resistant crop. In Eastland county we have some of the best soil in the world for raising pecans. Although the crop is now considered a minor one, it could prove to be a lifesaver in the years to come."

## Unemployment In County Drops 40 Percent In '56

The total number of unemployment insurance claims filed by residents of Eastland county during the first eight months of 1956 was 40 percent less than during the same period in 1955.

According to E. E. McCrary, manager of the Brownwood office of the Texas Employment Commission, 4374 claims were filed from January through August, 1955, whereas only 2603 were filed during the same period of the current year. These figures include the initial, or first, claim filed by an individual as well as any weekly, or continued, claims. While the totals have been consistently lower each month this year, a major part of the reduction was due to the fact that no major industrial lay-offs have occurred in the Eastland area.

Representatives from the TEC office in Brownwood visit every other Thursday from 9:30 a.m. to 2 p.m. for the purpose of accepting applications for work and unemployment insurance.

They may be contacted in the county courtroom, their next visits being scheduled for Sept. 27 and Oct. 11.

Most of the job openings received by the Brownwood office are in that city with the exception of farm and ranch jobs which are located in Eastland and Comanche counties also. Usually these orders, especially ranch hands, specify single men although some of the employers have housing and other facilities for families, McCrary said.

### Eastland Must Stop Buff Comeback Try

Eastland's impressive Mavericks face what could be a crucial test Friday night when they take on the once beaten Buffaloes in a battle which will for all practical purposes eliminate one of the two teams as a serious Class A contender.

Cross Plains, badly beaten last week by the powerful Coleman

Bluecats, will without doubt throw all they have against the locals in a comeback attempt. The Buffaloes were trounced by Coleman 40-13, after opening the season with a 20-0 win over Baird.

The Buffaloes were rated as the tenth best Class A eleven in Texas before the Coleman game. They fell out of the first 10 after losing to the double-A Cats, and will put their hopes on the line Friday night.

Eastland, of course, owns a 39-0 win over Dublin and a 26-7 win over DeLeon. They lost their opener 26-27 to Cisco. Cross Plains will be the first non-AA team Coach Carroll Shelton's charges will have met this year.

The Maverick line, which has had a weight advantage in every game so far in 1956, will find themselves giving away seven pounds to the man against Cross Plains. Eastland backs, however, will outweigh their opponents. The Mav backfield will average 159 pounds a man, and Cross Plains' just 146. The Buffalo team enjoys a line which averages 172 pounds a man. The light Cross Plains backfield will give Eastland an overall weight advantage, however. Eastland's starting eleven will average 166 pounds a man and their opponents' will average 163.

Eastland downed Cross Plains 27-23 last year in a spirited contest. The locals piled up 15 first downs to Cross Plains 11 in that affair, gaining 183 yards on the ground to the Buff's 115. In the air Eastland got 117 yards and Cross Plains 32.

Coach Alexander will bring a 24 man traveling squad to Eastland for the game.

### Extension of U. S. Roughage Program Made

The volume of approved applications for assistance under the Texas Emergency Roughage program has exceeded the estimates of demand when this program was negotiated so it is necessary to reappraise the actual cash requirements, Homer Cole, county director, said today.

The agreement between Secretary Ezra Taft Benson and Governor Allan Shivers provides for an allocation of one million dollars federal funds for the roughage program. Funds available to the U.S. Department of Agriculture to finance roughage programs must be allocated among all disaster designated states where such program is needed.

Walter T. McKay, Texas state director of Farmers Home Administration, has been instructed by K. L. Scott, director of credit services, U. S. Department of Agriculture, to immediately instruct all FHA County offices in the designated areas to withhold further approvals of roughage purchase certificates. The county offices are authorized to continue to accept and hold on file applications for assistance under this roughage program, but are instructed to take no action on these applications and to make a daily report on the tonnage requirements covered by such applications to McKay's office.

McKay has been asked to solicit the assistance of the Texas USDA Drought Committee and the Office of the Governor in making a careful reappraisal of the demand for assistance under this Emergency Roughage program including financial requirements.

Scott stated that in keeping with the policies and the desires of Secretary Benson, the department will continue to work closely with Governor Shivers and leaders in the state and give all assistance possible within the authority and funds available to the department in providing assistance to drought stricken farmers and ranchers in Texas.

On the agenda will be plans for decorations, program, food, finance, housing, parade and golf tournament. Photographs of the group will be made which will be used in publicizing the Homecoming in newspapers.

A large attendance is expected at this meeting. Mr. and Mrs. Gene Harrison of Dallas, Chock Brock of Denton, Miss Maec Coleman, Mrs. Maxine Flynn and Mr. and Mrs. Terrell Coleman of Waco will be among those attending from out of town.

One thousand, five hundred and sixteen names and addresses of former students have been collected. Exes from ten states and one foreign country have already indicated they will attend the Homecoming.

### County Youth On TCPT Scholarship

For the past seven years the Texas congress of parents and teachers has been granting scholarships of \$200 each to young people planning to enter the teaching profession. The project was started in the fall of 1949, and a sum of some \$14,000 has been expended in this way.

Qualifications are that the student be of college junior or senior rank; a resident of Texas, with high moral and social standards, a good scholastic record, an aptitude for teaching, a pleasing personality, and good health.

Among scholarship students is Ben Marlin Nix, Gorman, North Texas state college.

## Movie Goes To Participate In Political Poll

Movie theatre patrons in Eastland, representing a vast cross section of the county's citizens, will participate in a Presidential Poll, beginning today, according to Aubrey VanHoy, manager of the Majestic theatre in Eastland. The poll will cover a six-week period, closing Nov. 1 so that the result can be published prior to the presidential election on Nov. 6. It will be statewide.

Interstate Theatres' first presidential poll in 1952 accurately forecast Texas' swing to the Republican ticket and the ultimate election of President Dwight D. Eisenhower. The record shows that the poll's result, percentage-wise, almost matched the actual margin of victory in the national election.

"Taking that initial straw vote as a criterion, this new poll should determine in advance of the forthcoming election the vote-garnering strength in Texas of the incumbent, President Eisenhower, Republican, and Democratic Candidate Adlai Stevenson," declared VanHoy.

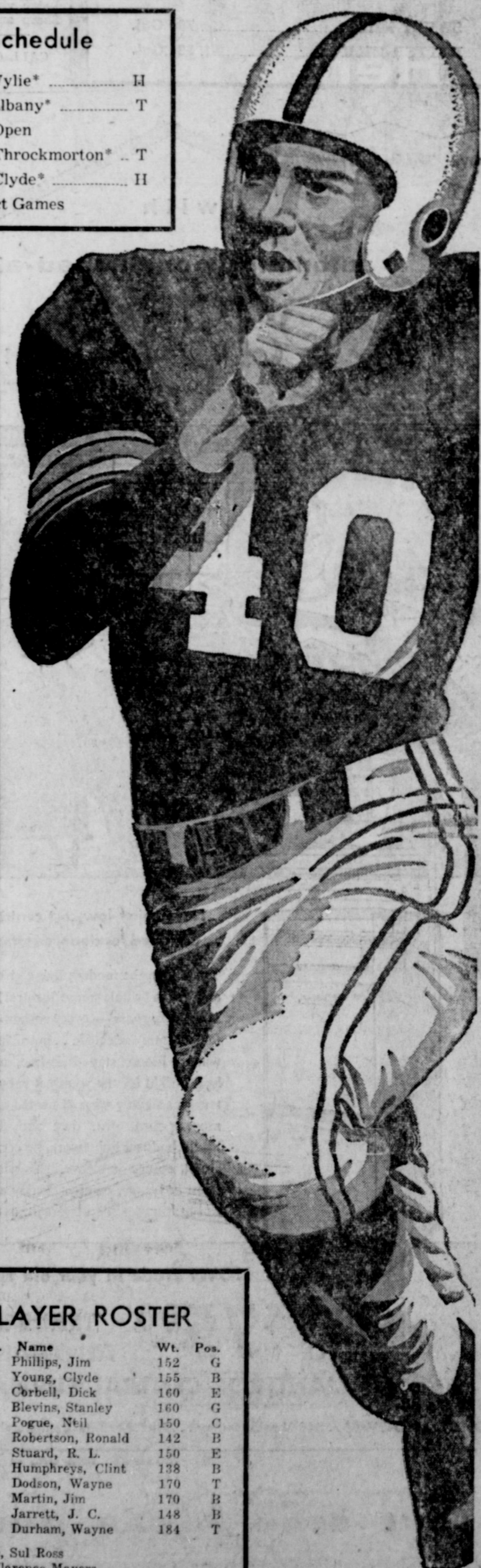

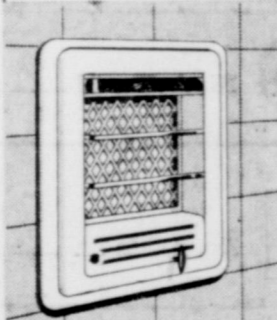
