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





'A UNITED STATES NAVY UP TO THE LIMIT'

Congress has spoken on the naval bill for a construction program to bring the United States navy up to treaty limits. It provides for a naval construction program of 102 worships and 1140 airplanes estimated to cost about \$580,000,000. It is the biggest navy program since the World War. It is designed to build the navy up to the London treaty limitations by 1939. A limit of 10 per cent profit on construction contracts of \$10,000 and above is provided.

Mrs. Becker is not a pacifist. She addressed the Texas daughters of heroes of the revolution in the shadows of the Alamo. While other nations are arming we cannot agree with those who advocate total disarmament for the United States and who be-
