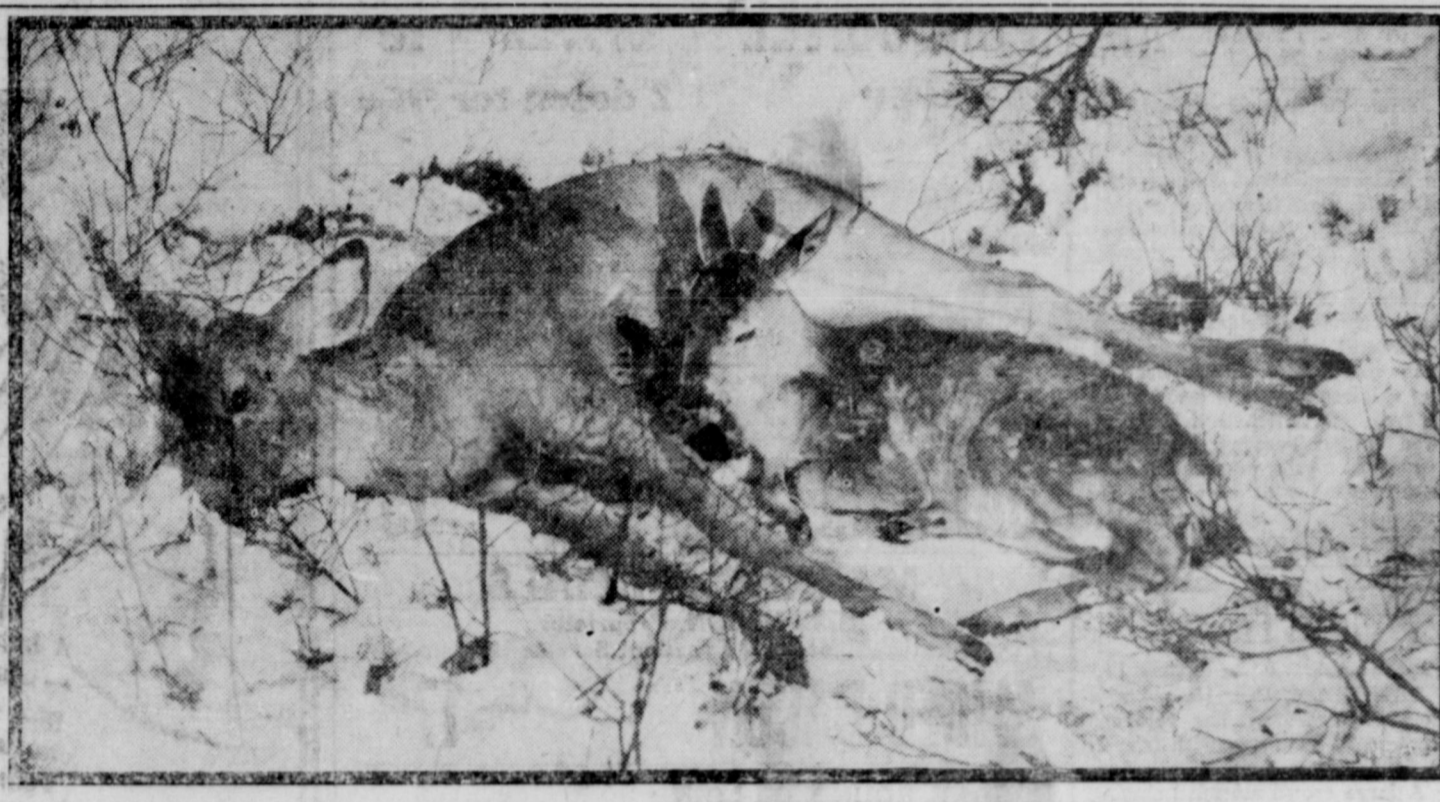

BECAUSE A DEER HUNTER FAILED TO LOOK FOR ANTLERS



A scene of wild life tragedy that tears at the heartstrings is this—a doe cold in death, her fawn starving beside her, victims of man's unthinking cruelty. A deer hunter, intent only on prey, ignored the rule of the woods, never to shoot before looking for antlers. He killed the doe and left the fawn, struck in one hind leg by a heavy slug, to starve or fall victim to a prowling beast. A conservation photographer came upon the scene, near West Branch, Mich., rescued the fawn, and it is being nursed back to health.

Marion B. Comer, County Pioneer, Dies At Happy

GORMAN, Dec. 14.—Marion B. Comer, 76, died Sunday, Dec. 10, at the home of his daughter, Mrs. J. L. Willis, in Happy, Texas. Mr. Comer was born in Batesville, Ark., Sept. 4, 1857. On Nov. 18, 1880, he was married to Miss Mary E. Bruce, to whom four children were born.

School Children March to Safety

BARRYTON, Mich., Dec. 15.—One hundred school children marched to safety here today a few seconds before the walls of a five-room addition of the Park Township agricultural school collapsed. Two children received minor burns from escaping steam. The children were in class when the walls began to shake and they marched out of the building in order.

Two Admit Part In Counterfeiting Ring

NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 15.—O. R. Miller, former sheriff of Denison, Texas, and Louis Genard, New Orleans, pleaded guilty today in federal court to participation in a counterfeiting ring whose operations extended over a large part of the United States. Sentence was reversed until Jan. 5.

Sunday School Lesson
Paul in Rome

Text: Acts 28:11-22, 30, 31
The International Uniform Sunday School Lesson for Dec. 17.

The ambition to visit Rome had long been present, but never fulfilled, in the mind of the much-traveled Paul.
Rome in a sense was the city of his dreams. It was the center of power and imperialism, and though Paul had pledged his life and interest to a higher kingdom and the empire of his dreams was the Empire of Christ, nevertheless there was something that challenged his interest and imagination in this city that had brought the whole world beneath its sway.

Moreover, he was a Roman citizen in an era when to be a citizen meant to occupy a position of prestige and privilege. He had looked forward to visiting Rome some day and in glowing words had told of his willingness to preach the Gospel in this city of imperial splendor and power.
For he was unashamed of the Gospel, as yet little known and recognized. To him it was the power of God unto salvation, greater even than the power of Rome itself.

And now Paul was journeying to Rome late in life and a prisoner. Unable to secure justice in Palestine, he had made his appeal to Caesar, and the Roman governor, who apparently was well disposed, but who was dilatory about acting, had been irked by Paul's plea. "You have appealed unto Caesar," he said. "Unto Caesar you shall go."
The journey to Rome was not without peril, for the shipwreck, so graphically described in Chapter 27 of the Acts, had meant the loss of the ship and the bare escape of sailors, soldiers, and passengers with their lives.

The company had been compelled to winter in the island of Melita, and now, in the spring, a ship of Alexandria, which also had wintered at the island, conveyed them safely to Rome.

It is an interesting circumstance, considering the harsh and brutal treatment that often is accorded prisoners in modern states, and even here in democratic America, that Paul should have had unusual liberty in Rome while he was awaiting trial.

The process of Roman justice proved to be slow, but Paul was permitted to live in his own house,

although there was a soldier guarding him, and for two whole years, we are told, he lived thus, receiving all who called upon him.
One can understand the unusual opportunity for preaching the Gospel that was accorded Paul under these circumstances. Instead of this period of enforced settlement being a limited period of his life, it was in some respects the time of his greatest and most significant activities.

It was a time, at least, when the depth of his religious experience and faith found meaning and in the so-called "Epistles of the Imprisonment," the letters that Paul wrote from Rome to the Philippians, the Ephesians and others, we have the very highest development of Paul's conception of the Gospel, of the Church, and of the eternal mission of Christ and his followers in the redemption of the world.

Thus we see how, as Paul himself pointed out, apparent misfortunes, even bonds and imprisonment, may become the means of emphasizing God's grace and work.

"New Deal Rhythm," written by Harburg and Gorney and sung by James Dunn, June Knight, Lillian Roth, Lillian Bond, Lona Andre and Edwards and danced by the chorus of 50.

"It's Only a Paper Moon," written by Harburg and Harold Arlen, the latter the composer of the famous "Stormy Weather" number.

In addition, Laurence Schwab is writing new lyrics for "Eadie Was a Lady," the smash hit from the stage version of "Take a Chance," which was written by Buddy DeSylva, and will be sung in the film by Lillian Roth.

And finally June Knight will sing "Should I Be Sweet," another DeSylva song from the Broadway production in which she created

a Manhattan sensation several months ago.
"Take a Chance" is the story of four side-show carnival entertainers who come to New York and win fame and fortune on Broadway after many hectic adventures which carry them back-stage, into a crooked gambling hall, and finally to the homes of Long Island's socially elite.

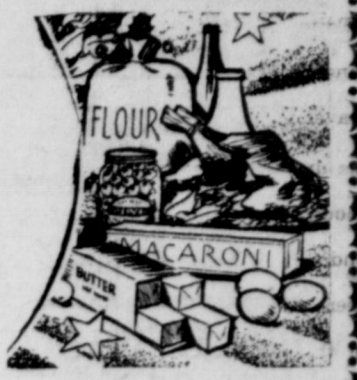

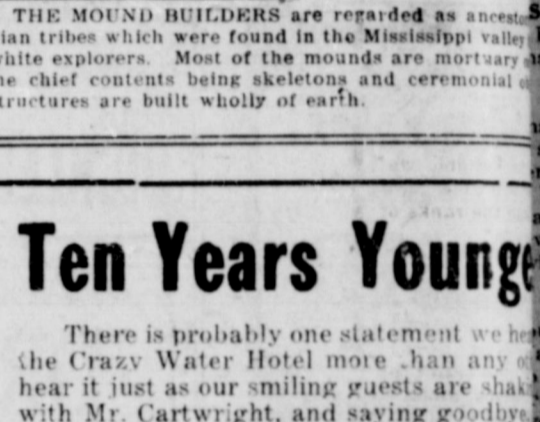
