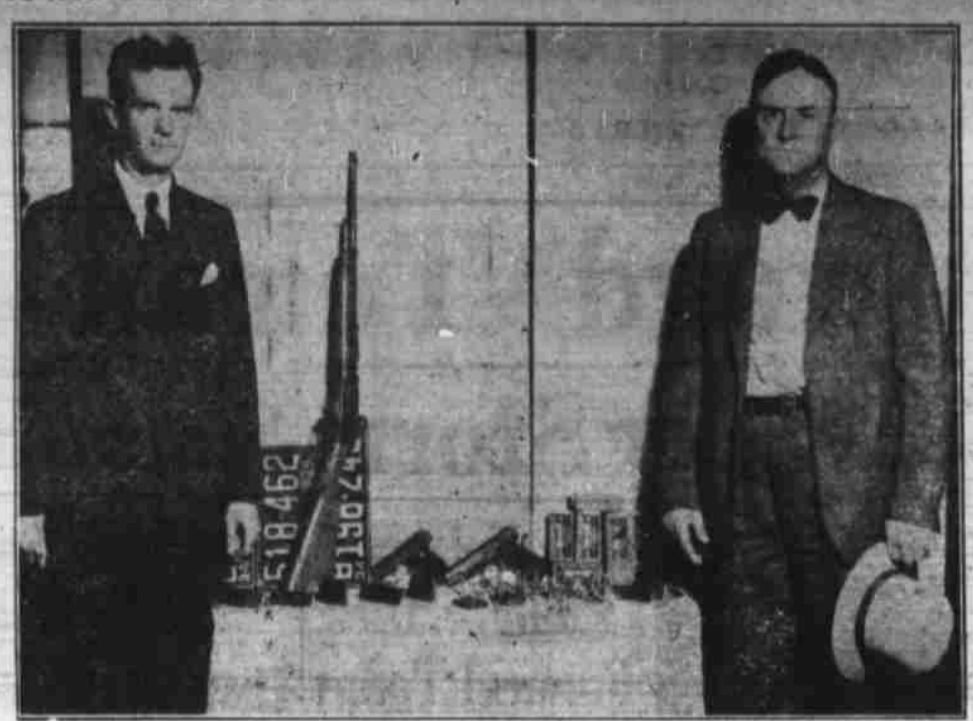

SAN ANGELO—Curtis Bishop, Big Spring's 20-year-old magazine editor and tennis star, Saturday added the Knights of Zocah college singles championship to his string of titles by beating back Herschel Boggs, local youth, in the finals 6-2, 3-4, 6-2, 6-4.

Bishop swept through the fairly strong field of local net aspirants in more or less easy fashion to add the college championship to the high school singles title he held in 1932. Boggs rallied after being soundly outplayed in the first set 6-2 to win the second frame 6-3, but Bishop came back in a burst of offensive play to win the third set 6-2 and to cap the last 6-4 after the local boy had taken a 3-1 lead in games.

In the semi-finals Boggs received a default from Stevens while Bishop had to play fairly hard to win from Hike Haynes 6-4, 6-2, but in spite of this extra match the Angeleno was no match in endurance with the Big Spring youth under a burning sun. Boggs could do no more than put up a pitiful resemblance of opposition in the final set after taking the lead 5-1.

In the quarter-finals Haynes defeated Albert Wolfe 3-6, 6-4, 6-1; Bishop smashed out an impressive win over Tom Masse 6-1, 6-1, and Boggs turned back Fred Nibling 6-4, 6-0.

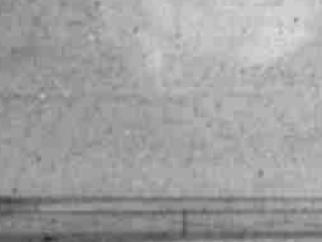

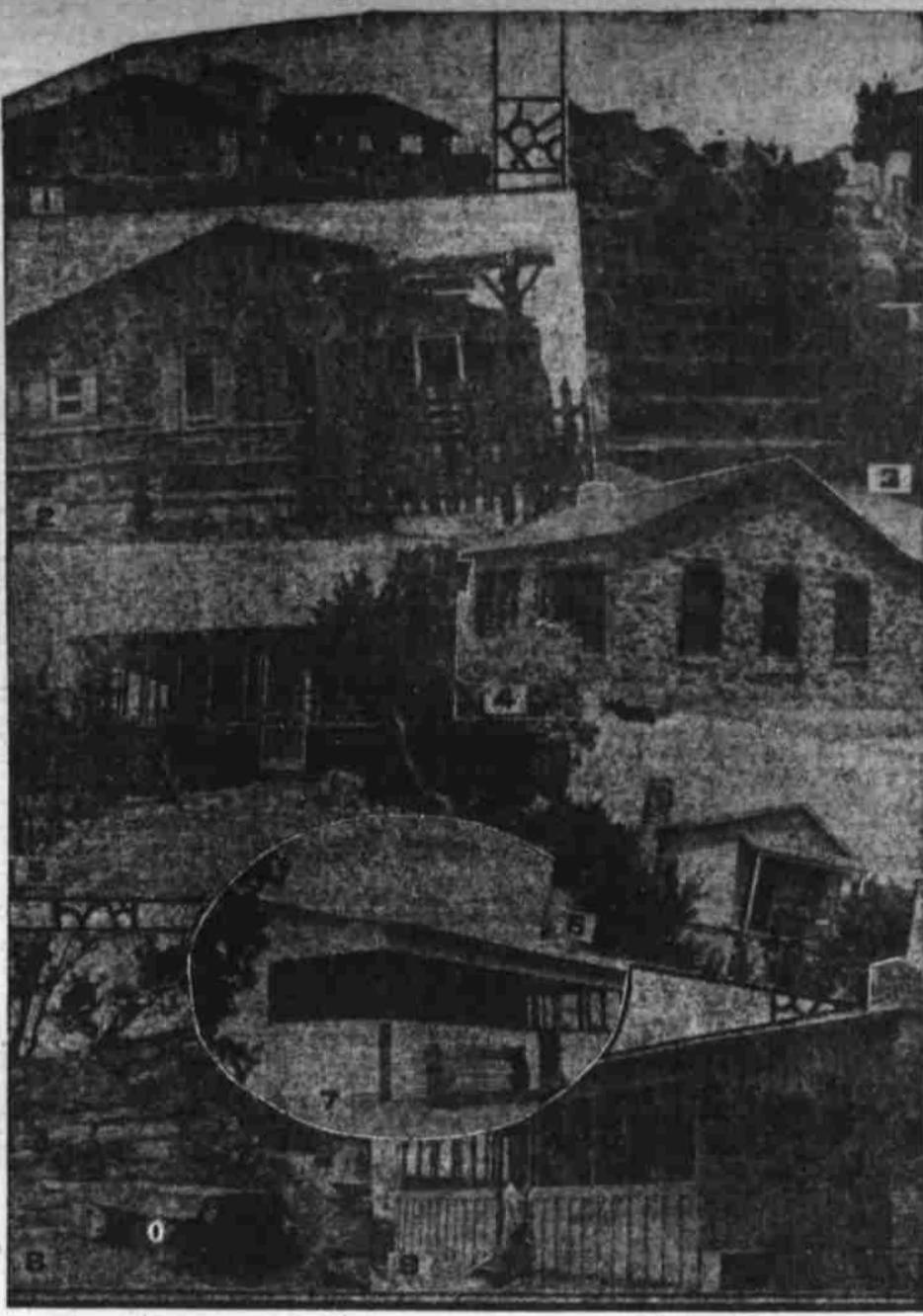

Two producers appeared in the making of the week closed within the one mile west extension to the Glascock county field which was effected by Lonnie Glascock and others No. 1 Edwards, now H. O. Wooten's No. 1-D Edwards.

Tribal Oil Co. No. 5-B Edwards obtained pay around 2,150 feet and drilled ahead. It is 330 feet from the south line and 960 feet from the west line of section 16, block 33, township 2 south, T. & P. Ry. Co. survey, H. O. Wooten's No. 2-C Edwards, in the southwest quarter of section 16, block 33, struck oil at 2,250 feet and drilled ahead.

Tribal 5-B And Wooten 2-C Edwards Producers In Making

Noble & Co. No. 2 Edwards, in section 17, block 33, had a slight showing of oil at 2,192 feet in drilling to 2,211 feet. Simms No. 2 Edwards, in section 18, block 33, drilled plug at 2,140 feet, where it cemented 6 5/8 inch casing then rigged up a spudler. Simms No. 3 Edwards had reached 1,580 feet in anhydrite.

H. O. Wooten No. 2 Sam Turner, in section 19, block 33, was standing with 6 5/8 inch casing cemented at 2,023 feet in lime, two feet above the total depth. Steve Currie and others No. 1 Sam Turner, also in section 19, block 33, bituminous at 2,065 feet in lime, was waiting for cemented 6 5/8 inch casing to set at 2,026 feet. Empire No. 3 Hall, in section 21, block 33, was running 8 1/4 inch casing to 2,060 feet in lime, where it was to be cemented.
