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DID YOU EVER STOP TO THINK

N. D. WELTY, publisher of the Bartlesville (Oklahoma) Morning Examiner, says:

"Old age insurance and employment insurance may soon be provided for under Federal laws. Security for the aged and security for those able and willing to work are the ideals back of these measures. The thought of the day is turnig to the viewpoit that the average citizen isn't able to provide for old age and the average man able and willing to work is unable to finance himself during periods of unemployment.

"These measures would probably be financed by flat levies upon gross payrolls and then placed in the hands of distributing agencies. The total required is unknown, but the estimates run upwards from 5 per cent for old age insurance to 10 per cent for employment insurance. Regardless of the amounts, there are but two sources for the sources for the funds. One is from profits and the other is from wages and salaries. Of the two, the latter is the only one which assures large and steady accretions. Profits are uncertain both as regards regularity and amount.

"There is nothing in the new measures which would keep a wage earner or salaried employee from being thrifty and following the old self-dependence ideals of his forefathers, other than that the system must inevitably reduce the total he will, or would, receive. The measures do not make profits or increase wages and salaries. They merely take percentages of profits and wages and administer them for certain definite purposes.

"It is safe to assume this: The increasing difficulty of the middle aged to get employment or keep employment will become greater and the younger men will have to bear teh increasing burden of providing for the older men. Administration of the funds will be, at best, difficult and, at best, attended with inequities. Employers will be under increased pressure to pay larger salaries and higher wage. scales so as to help provide for the aged and the unemployed, and at the same time urged to makel larger profits so that the profits can be taxed for these funds and for income taxes.

"These measures will create new problems, which may prove far more serious than the problems they seek to solve. There may come a time when the urge to own a business and to engage in undrtakings to employ labor will be lost. Then there is nothing left but some form os state socialism of rigorous form."







Again may I say, what we need is less politics in business and more business in politics?



N. D. WELTY, publisher of the Bartlesville (Oklahoma) Morning Examiner, says:

"Old age insurance and employment insurance may soon be provided for under Federal laws. Security for the aged and security for those able and willing to work are the ideals back of these measures. The thought of the day is turnig to the viewpoit that the average citizen isn't able to provide for old age and the average man able and willing to work is unable to finance himself during periods of unemployment.

"These measures would probably be financed by flat levies upon gross payrolls and then placed in the hands of distributing agencies. The total required is unknown, but the estimates run upwards from 5 per cent for old age insurance to 10 per cent for employment insurance. Regardless of the amounts, there are but two sources for the sources for the funds. One is from profits and the other is from wages and salaries. Of the two, the latter is the only one which assures large and steady accretions. Profits are uncertain both as regards regularity and amount.

"There is nothing in the new measures which would keep a wage earner or salaried employee from being thrifty and following the old self-dependence ideals of his forefathers, other than that the system must inevitably reduce the total he will, or would, receive. The measures do not make profits or increase wages and salaries. They merely take percentages of profits and wages and administer them for certain definite purposes.

"It is safe to assume this: The increasing difficulty of the middle aged to get employment or keep employment will become greater and the younger men will have to bear teh increasing burden of providing for the older men. Administration of the funds will be, at best, difficult and, at best, attended with inequities. Employers will be under increased pressure to pay larger salaries and higher wage scales so as to help provide for the aged and the unemployed, and at the same time urged to makel larger profits so that the profits can be taxed for these funds and for income taxes.

"These measures will create new problems, which may prove far more serious than the problems they seek to solve. There may come a time when the urge to own a business and to engage in undrtakings to employ labor will be lost. Then there is nothing left but some form os state socialism of rigorous form."




