He cut the cost of government to figures which won the approval of the taxpayers of the commonwealth. He restored racing. He backed the bill for the sale of beer and light wines under state control. He fought for and won the repeal of the 18th amendment. He was renominated by a 35,000 majority over a lieutenant governor who was elected two years ago on the Berry ticket. Three democratic representatives were renominated. They snowed under their rival contenders. Governor Berry is a big husky of powerful frame as well as positive convictions of how the government should be run.

He is not a radical. He is not a hidebound conserva- May 13. tive. He believes in a government for all the people-and special favors for none of the people.

By United Press AUSTIN, Tex.-Research work as part of the state's educational expense is defended by Dr. E. P. Schoch, director of the University of Texas Bureau of Industrial

Chemistry. Laying aside the question of the value commercially of research discoveries, Dr. Schoch advocated research on the limited plane of its value to the educational sys-

"Research," he said, "builds up the scholarship of the faculty and makes them more enthusiastic teachers. It impels students to do work in which they otherwise would be less active."

"Research," he adds, "is an old-age insurance for teachers. When a teacher is limited to secondhand transmission of knowledge, he can readily be replaced by a younger and cheaper teacher; but if he continues to progress by research, he is always ahead of the

ess experienced teacher." Dr. Schoch does not agree that college research has not been valuable commercially, a point wav-ed for discussion of research from a strictly educational point of

view. For lack of adequate research, he said, the oil, building and other industries are handicapped and public water supplies are too

Any form of old gold such as out-dated jewelry, dental gold and odds an ends of all kinds may be sold legally at the advanced price, but gold coins are not eligi-

Government agents recently have arrested two men in Philadelphia; one for selling, the other for buying gold coins at the new price. The coins in the transaction had a face value of \$57.50 and were sold for \$83. Under the present law, all gold coins must be returned to the government for their face value. Meanwhile, as a result of the unprecedented adance in the price of gold, millions of dollars worth of old gold is being discovered in American homes and turned into cash.






