Speaking of organizing a new bank for Eastland should also interest those who have capital which they have to invest as every indication would point to the fact that such an investment with the new banking laws now in effect offer inducements that are worthy of consideration. SPEAKING OF VAST GAINS IN BANK DEPOSITS

Uncle Sam is feeling cheery. Confidence on the part of his sons and daughters may be responsible.

A billion dollar increase in national bank deposits in the first two months of 1934 and a gain of \$2,000,000,000 since last June was shown May 17 by the reports in response to the March 5 bank call.

Confidence was on the high road to restoration, but despite the rise in deposits "the banks were shown to have continued to reduce their loan accounts despite urging by governmental officials that they lend money to help promote recovery."

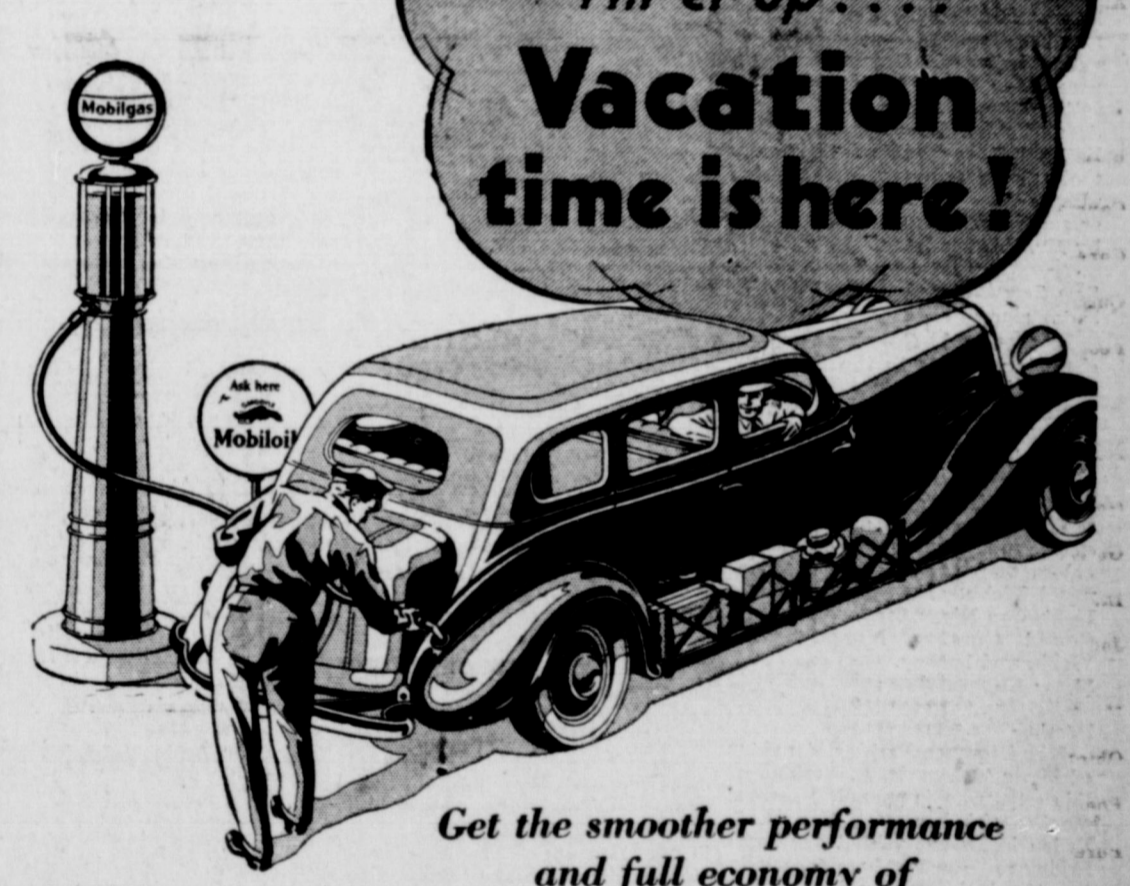
CHAPTER XXVIII

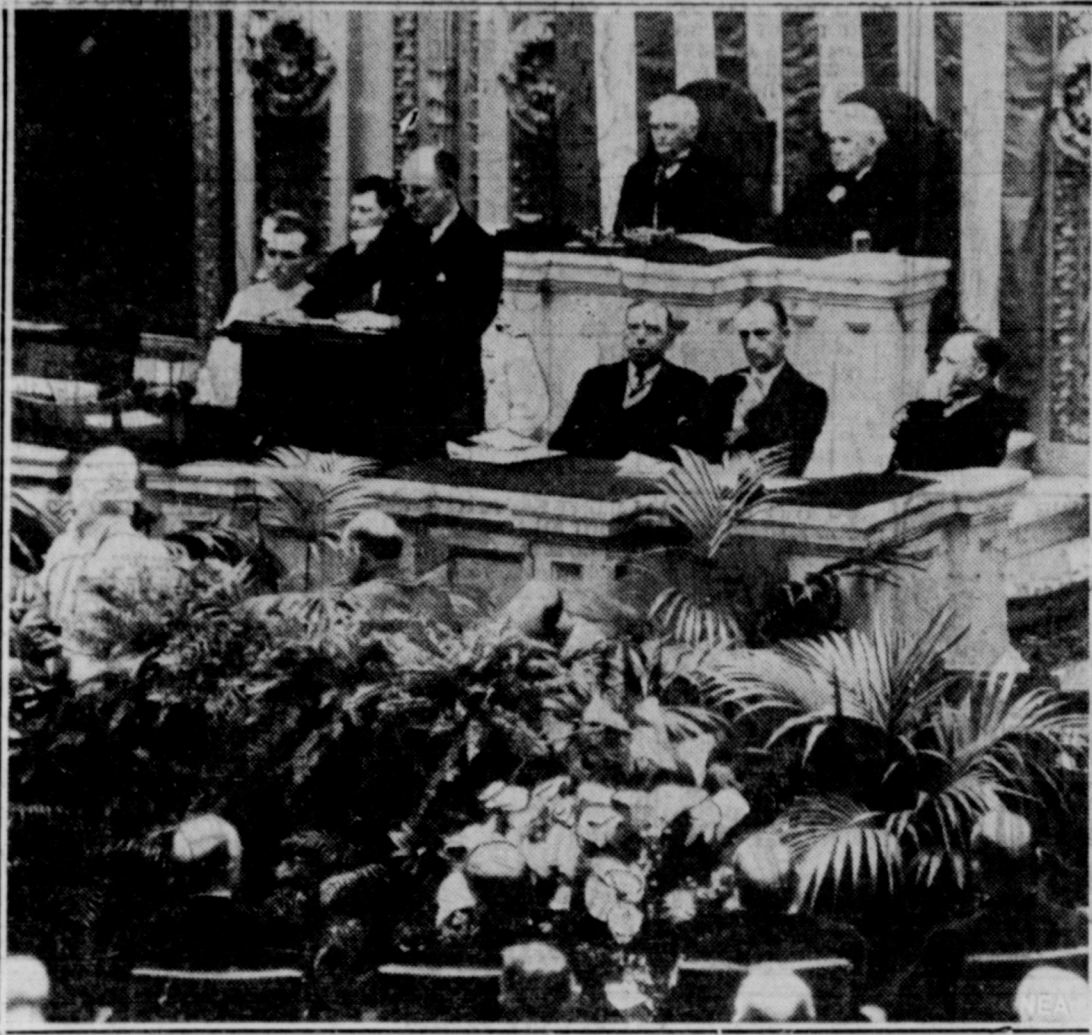

Congressman Urges Enlarging The United States Army and Arming More Men With Rifles and Bayonets

FRANTZ United Press Staff Correspondent WASHINGTON.—Machines can occupy territory but men must hold it, hence rifles and bayonets still are the decisive factors in military strength, according to Rep. Clark W. Thompson, democrat, Texas, author of a bill to enlarge the United States army. He is a former officer in the marine corps, and now a major in the reserves.

Congressing the tactical utility of motorized "cavalry," aircraft, and other military machines, Representative Thompson holds that mechanization does not reduce the need for human combatants.

"War is never won without holding territory, and you cannot hold territory with machines alone," he said in a United Press review. "It is men with cold steel that win wars, and for every new military machine some device is invented to counteract its effect. Anti-aircraft guns are becoming highly effective and for every combat plane there is another to shoot down. There are tank-traps for the tanks, and guns that can penetrate tank armor."

"I am not opposed to mechanization, but would oppose machines beyond adequate strength for their management. In the Chinese-Japanese clashes last year the Japanese had all the latest machinery and inventions but they made their real advances by infantry on the march."

The Thompson bill, already subject of extensive hearings before the house military committee, proposes that the commissioned strength of the active list of the regular army be fixed at an annual average of 14,063, and the enlisted personnel at 165,000 exclusive of Philippine scouts. Present strength is approximately 118,000 enlisted, including the scouts, and 12,000 officers. Increase in the army was endorsed by General John J. Pershing, war-time commander of the American expeditionary forces, and by General Douglas MacArthur, chief of staff.

"I know of no military expert who does not contend that the lowest possible safe point for the American army is 165,000 men," Representative Thompson said. "The present military strength of the United States, despite its great population, is less than that of small countries such as Greece and Belgium."

He furnished the following statistics of military strength for certain countries, according to best available estimates at the end of 1933: United States of America—Active 135,952 (since reduced), trained reserve, 330,000; total, 465,952. Argentina—Active, 34,798;

reserve, 5,885,000; air force, 173,171; total, 6,495,535. Mexico—Active, 59,249; trained reserve, 39,962; total, 71,466. Netherlands—Active, 29,500; trained reserve, 330,000; total, 358,000. Spain—Active, 203,033; trained reserve, 2,095,000; total, 2,298,000. Sweden—Active, 33,500; trained reserve, 841,700; air force, 925; total, 876,125.
