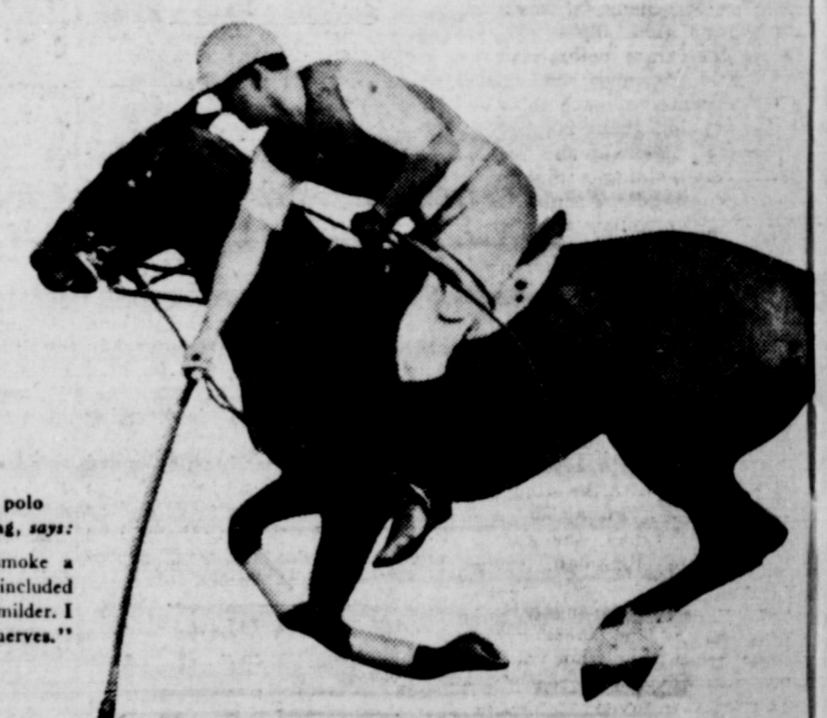

Livestock came through the winter in fairly good condition and reports indicated the stock was taking on flesh. The report said Texas lamb crop would be below normal. The condition of early lambs is poor and losses have been heavy during the winter. The report placed the condition of Texas ranges at 74 per cent of normal as compared with 81 per cent a year ago.
