



Most likely you can't picture ourself being brought into court on anything worse than a speeding violation. Nearly everyone feels that way. Even so, it is good to know that in this country you can't be made to stand trial twice

We have a provision in the U.S. which makes it certain that once a How much should I spend on court has reached a verdict of ighting fixtures for my new "innocent," the aquitted person may not be put on trial again for the same offense.

To add to the protection, if a person has been acquitted, the prosecution cannot appeal the case to a higher court. The constitution states specifically: "Nor shall any person be subject for the same offense to be twice put jeopardy of life and limb.

This right holds good, however, only if a full trial is held and a verdict is reached. It is possible to face another trial on the same charge if the first trial ends with a "hung jury" or a "mistrial," or


