ONE IS KILLED IN KILGORE REFINERY BLAST

OTHERS MAY BE KILLED IN ENSUING FIRE

Two Men Rescued From the Flames By Firemen Are Badly Burned.

KILGORE, Texas, June 23.—George Travis was killed here today in an explosion and fire which wrecked the Southport Petroleum company.

Firemen who fought a hopeless battle against the flames believed others were trapped and fatally burned.

Two persons, critically burned, were rescued.

Damage totaled more than \$50,000.

Fire fighters from Overton, Gladewater and Henderson assisted Kilgore firemen, but it was hopelessly beyond control.

The force of the explosion rocked residences throughout Kilgore.

The known death victim was a nephew of the vice president of the Southport Petroleum company.

ARMY SCANDAL MAY COME OUT OF INQUIRY

WASHINGTON, June 23.—Convinced a major army scandal is hidden beneath the red tape of war department sales and purchase methods, the house military affairs investigation committee today prepared to use the justice department in a summer inquiry. The move came as the name of Assistant Secretary of War H. H. Woodring, Ralph O'Neil, former American Legion commander, and Robert Jackson, resigned secretary of the democratic national committee, entered testimony concerning a surplus clothing sales contract. The committee is the same that startled the war department by recommending removal of Gen. Ben Foulis, air corps chief, on charges of inefficiency and violation of the law, requiring competitive bidding on plane contracts. Gen. Douglas MacArthur, chief of staff of the army, testified before the committee at a secret session Saturday. It was understood he discussed developments which included an admission by General McMullen of the advocate general's office that McMullen accepted fees while on active duty. The committee, it was learned, plans to continue hearings, again questioning McMullen and Quartermaster General Louis H. Pash.

RELIEF BODY MAY GET NEW MANAGEMENT

AUSTIN, June 23.—Texas relief commissioners will meet in special session here Wednesday, June 27, Commissioner Jack Reed disclosed today. The meeting was called by a majority of the commission, Reed said. A change in the Texas relief directorship, now held by Miss Marie Dresden, is probable. Commissioners are expected to ratify requests made by Governor Ferguson for federal aid in the July relief program in Texas. These requests total \$2,628,630.

The romance of the "gay nineties" and of the early days of the twentieth century; the glamor of war brides, the splendor of pre-depression days, and triumph of love over all obstacles, will be vividly portrayed in the elaborate "Pageant of the Wedding Gown," sponsored by the women of the Eastland Methodist church and to be given at 8 p. m., Thursday, June 28.

The pageant is being directed by Mrs. F. M. Kenny and will be given on the county courthouse lawn where comfortable seats will be arranged and where it will be cool and pleasant. A small admission charge of 25 cents for adults and 15 cents for children will be asked. The proceeds go to the church.

The pageant will show the wedding gowns of by-gone days, the 1896 wedding gown to the ultra-modern bridal robes. Everywhere the pageant has been put on it has been a great success and the prospects for the outcome of the undertaking in Eastland are very promising.

Mrs. Grady Pipkin will sing the pre-nuptial solo and a special arrangement of Lohengrin's wedding march will be played by the Drago violin octet as the processional music. When the wedding attendants have taken their places the "brides" will model the wedding gowns while a reader interprets the romantic setting of each period and reveals the love story around each costume. At the conclusion the entire wedding party massed in chorus, will sing the love songs of the periods represented.

Passenger Plane Crashes In Street

BURBANK, Calif., June 23.—A Central Airways passenger plane crashed into a street near here and exploded today, killing the pilot, just before it was to pick up passengers. Hope of determining the cause of the crash apparently perished with the pilot, C. L. Butcher, who died instantly. The ship was ferrying to the airport here where several passengers were awaiting the takeoff to Mexico.

In the Eastland golfers' last engagement with the Ranger golfers, Eastland eked out winner, 12 to 11.

Contrary to current opinion, the Moran aggregation of baseball players is not the same as that which is a member of the New Deal league, the group playing Eastland today being composed largely of oil plant workers.

Poderjaj Case Is Sent to New York

VIENNA, June 23.—Police today completed their investigation of the case of Ivan Poderjaj and are preparing to send a full report to authorities in New York. They will request an immediate reply in New York as to whether the evidence warrants extradition. The report will be mailed to New York where authorities desire to question Poderjaj about the disappearance of Miss Tufverson, New York and Detroit lawyer.

Bolivians and Paraguayans In A Bloody Battle

BUENOS AIRES, June 23.—With bayonets and machetes, Bolivian and Paraguayan infantrymen fought hand to hand today for the sixth consecutive day. Each side had thrown its picked infantrymen against the other's position. Paraguayans fought for a victory that would rout the Bolivian army across the border of the disputed region into its own country. To Bolivia the battle was one that must not be lost. Thrown back mile by mile for many months, the seriousness with which they regarded their position was shown by the stoutness of their stand.

CALIFORNIA GIVES WOMAN DEATH VERDICT

LOS ANGELES, June 23.—Nellie May Madison, dark-haired and middle-aged, convicted slayer of her fourth husband, was destined today to become California's first woman to die on the gallows. A superior court jury spurned leniency and returned a verdict of death for the alleged murder of a man the defendant insists is alive.

The verdict was as astounding to the courtroom as was Mrs. Madison's plea that a man shot to death in her apartment was a stranger, and not her husband, Eric Madison, studio employe and reputed scion of a former Danish politician. She told the jury her husband, cashier in a studio cafe, abandoned the marital union the night the "stranger" was slain in her apartment. She has not seen him since, she said. Mrs. Madison denied killing the "stranger."

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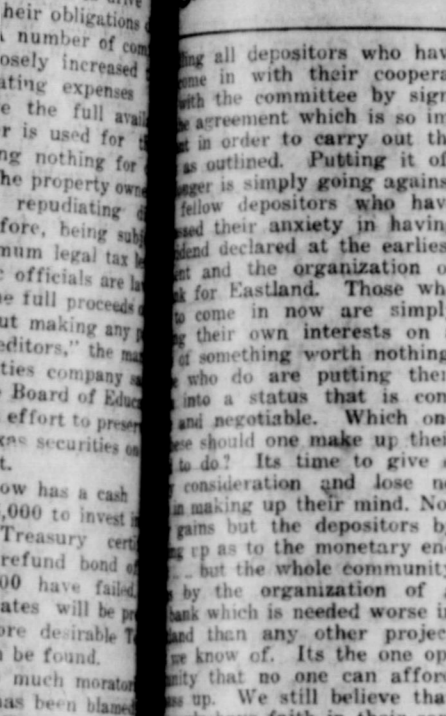
Germany to Send Delegate to London

BERLIN, June 23.—Great Britain's invitation to send a delegate to London in an effort to avert a trade war threatened July 1, when Germany is to impose a moratorium on foreign debt payments, was accepted today. Great Britain announced it would impose a clearing house to value, if possible, to meet services on German securities, but it offered to negotiate. Germany had announced it might retaliate by barring imports from the entire British Empire—a motive that would penalize the dominion.

Texas Woman Held In Murder Case

SHAWNEETOWN, Ill., June 23.—Evelyn Anderson of Woodsboro, Texas, today was held for grand jury action after a warrant was issued by county authorities naming her in connection with the slaying of Dr. Homer Meyers, Eldorado dentist. A warrant was issued for the woman, who was deserted by Harold St. Clair, an ex-convent, who yesterday confessed to New Orleans police he killed the dentist.

Street Car Runs Wild In St. Paul Injuring Forty

ST. PAUL, Minn., June 23.—Its controls smashed in a collision with a coal truck, a street car containing about 60 passengers, ran wild for nearly half a mile through traffic in the loop district today. At least 41 were injured, police announced.

None of the injured were believed serious. Two ambulance loads of passengers were taken to hospitals as soon as the car came to a stop and help could be brought. The entire front of the street car was battered in by the collision. The car finally came to a stop at the foot of a long hill. After the collision, the controls were useless, but the car continued on its rails.

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LITERARY DIGEST POLL SHOWS APPROVAL FOR NEW DEAL POLICIES

Very busy men are the ballot counters in the Literary Digest nation wide poll of policies of the Roosevelt administration. According to the count made public June 15, the total shows approval for the policies in 47 states. Vermont dissented, but it was close shave even for Vermont. F. D. R. received 534,804 votes or 61 per cent of the 875,373 votes cast. This to the Literary Digest prognosticators: this is interpreted as .77 per cent increase in the President's popularity compared with the 1932 election ratio. A poll of 21,250 bankers in 47 states. However revealed 11,275, or 52.88 per cent, against the President's policies. Of course the boys who hope to join the brain trusters some they may were busy.

They must have experienced a change of heart since the election of 1932. A student poll at Harvard, Yale, Cornell, Brown, the University of Virginia, the University of Wisconsin and New York university shows a vote of 5,201 in favor of the New Deal President and his legislation and 3,004 against. According to Literary Digest advices, the ballots are rolling in, and they will continue to roll in until the beginning of the fall months.

FLOWERS FOR THE REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY

Flowers for the living—meaning the regents of the University. 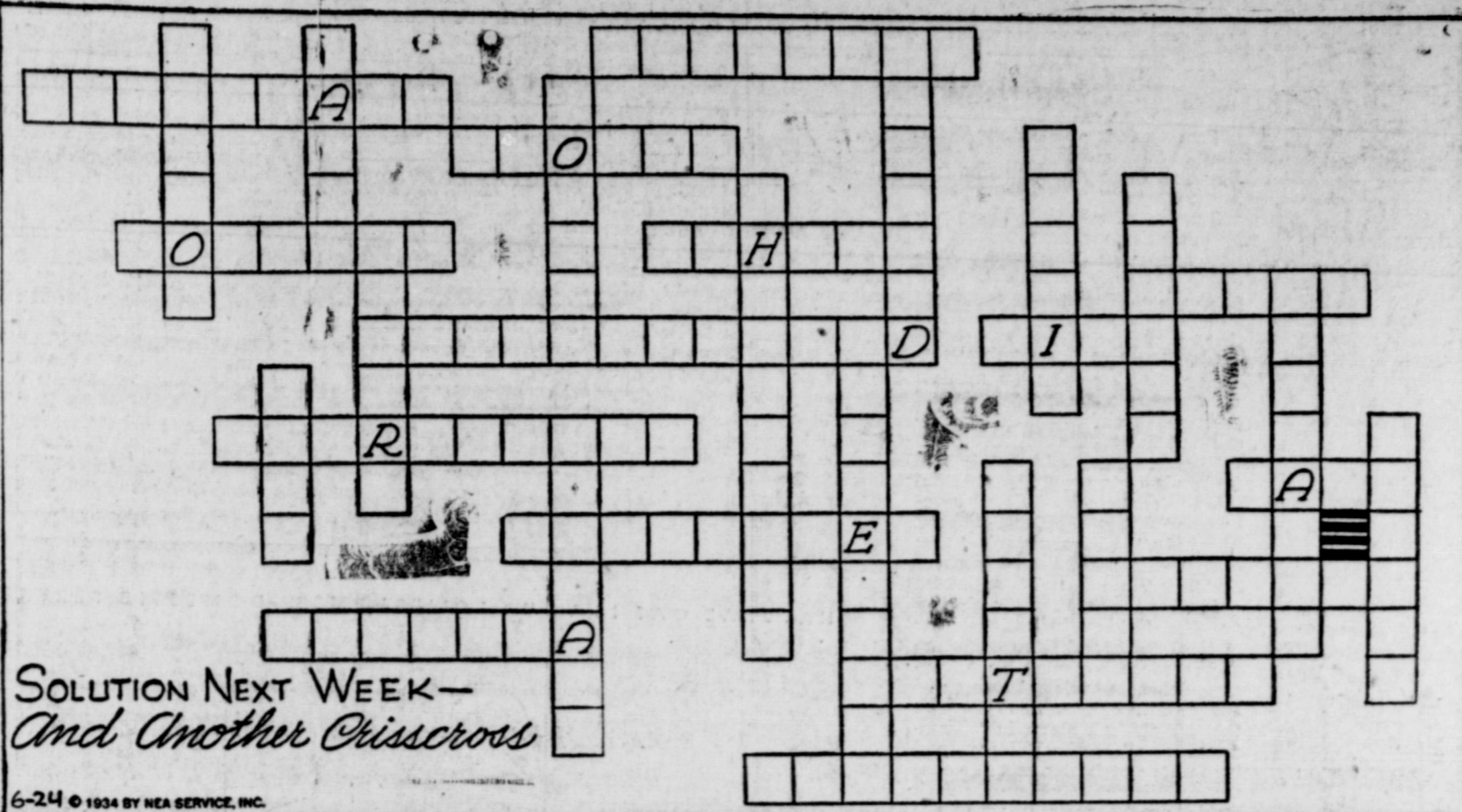
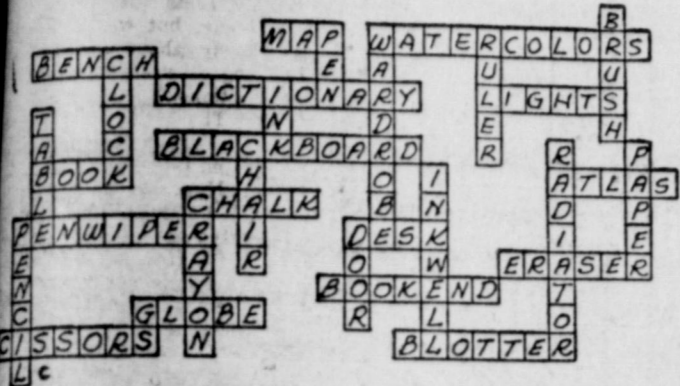

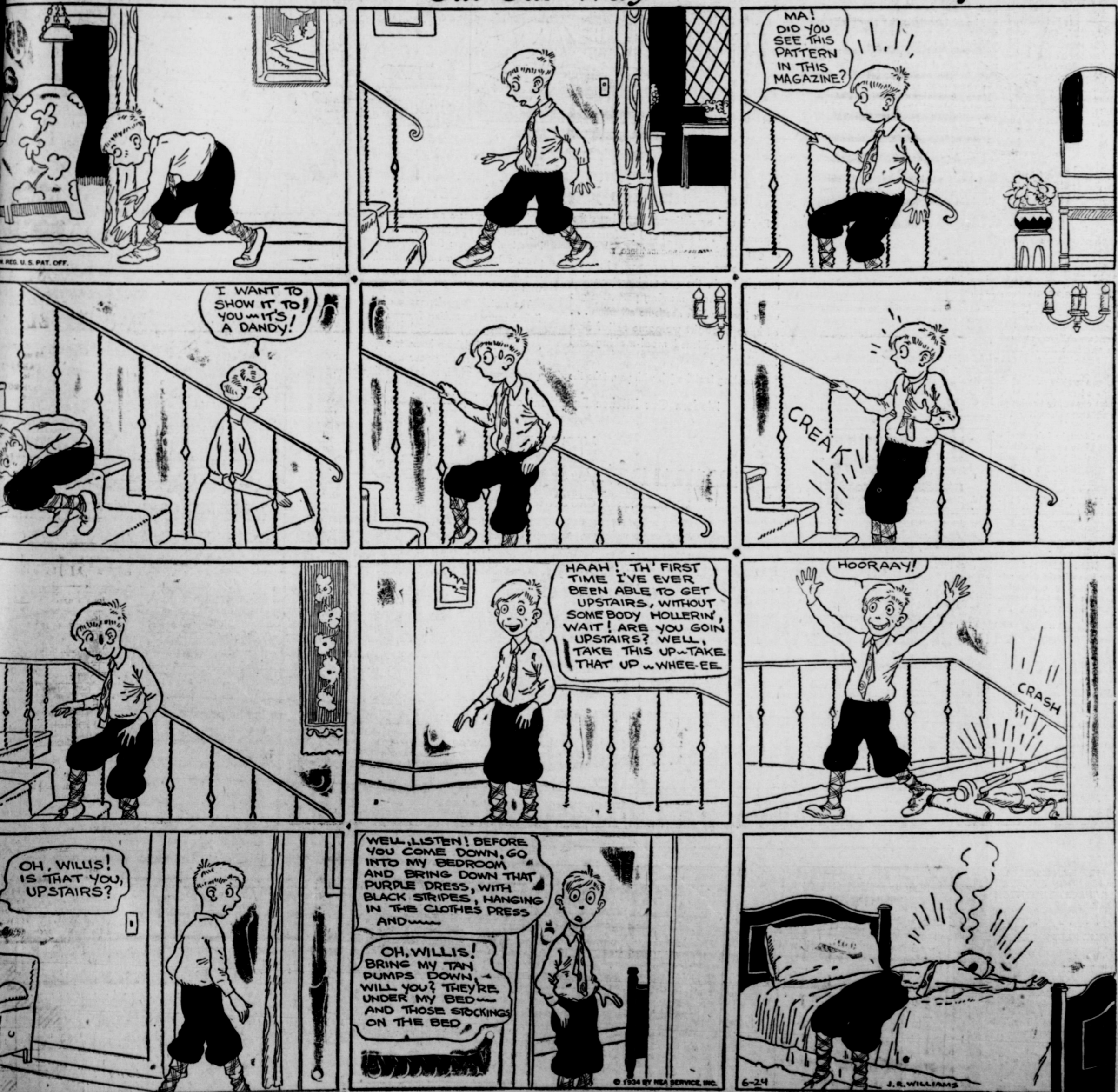
