This Is It! Mays Journey To Albany

Moore ... ABOUT Eastland By Virgil E. Moore

A while back, Eastland County commissioners agreed to install an air conditioner in the living quarters of the county jail, providing that the attorney general of the state ruled that the unit could be paid for out of the permanent improvement fund.

The ruling came back "No." The unit then, if it was purchased, had to be paid for out of the general fund. The Court, which was willing to pay out of one fund, immedi-

Doesn't make sense, you say. It's all county money, you say. Well, we agree with you, but we also agreed with the action of the commissioners court. For the Court realized that the general fund was overdrawn, while the permanent improvement fund had money to

That's just an example. To make it even more plainer, let's say you owed a \$50 grocery bill and a \$10 light bill. You had your budget fixed out so that you could spend \$45 on groceries and \$15 on lights. Your solution, of course would be easy. You would just transfer \$5 from the light money, which you had left over, to make up for your overeating.

But your elected commissioner can't do anything that simple. Somewhere down the line someone fixed it so that each fund would be completely seperated from all others. It is against the laws of this state for a commissioners court to take money out of one fund to place it in another.

We did a little checking just before we sat down in front of our Underwood, and we found that road and bridge fund has cash on hand of \$238,800. The permanent improvement fund lists \$32,720.67. Cash on hand in the jury fund is \$10,694.32. We can't use red ink here to impress you more, but look at this closely: The general fund is \$5,128.24 overdrawn.

What's the answer? Cut down on spending? Maybe so, to a degree. But as it now stands, the general fund is always going to be in the red, or close to it. For the fund simply doesn't get it's share Needed by 'Y' of the money to start with, and yet it is the fund which always gets hit with the unexpected items

We think the answer is for vo to go to the polls and vote for proposed constitutional amend ment 2. The amendment would allow the Court to allocate money constitutional purposes. The amount allocated for each fund will be set by the Court for one

taxable year. Let's quit making rules that we couldn't operate with ourselves, and still expect our elected offici-

Short Course On Sausage At Texas A&M

Fatal Fallacies

HIGH SCHOOL

COLLEGE STATION - What sausage? How did it get that way? How important is it in the American diet?

The Travelers Safety Service

Almost every American family eats some form of sausage at least once a week. Yet the ordinary housewife knows very little about this product which she feeds her

Sausage is defined as minced neat or a combination of meats, blended with various seasonings and spices and commonly stuffed into a casing or container.

That covers everything plain ground beef to the tinned hams and canned lunch meats. The variety is almost endless. Some of the large meat companies offer as many as 175 or 200 varieties. Sausage and prepared meats make up about one fifth of the total meat supply for this country.

For that reason, a short course o be held on the Texas A&M campus in November is important to every meat eater in the state. It is the Texas Meat Packers' short course on sausage, Nov. 16. Roy Snyder, extension meats specialist at Texas A&M, who is in charge of the short course, says subject will be thoroughly.

Some of the nation's top au thorities on various phases of sausage-making will discuss their special fields. Subjects to be discussed include everything from "Materials 'Needed for Top Quality Product" through "Bacteriological Aspects of Sausage Production" and "Chemical Methods for Quality Control" to "Packaging

In addition, George M. Lewis, vice president of the American Meat Institute Foundation, will discuss "Opportunities for Serve and Responsibilities of Texas Meat Packers to Consumers and

Dr. Butler says that about 150 meat packers in the state whom he can contact have been invited

This is the first short course of its kind to be offered by the college, he said, and he has particular interest in getting a broad attendance. His reasons are sum med up in the original letter which he mailed to the packers.

"Progress in the meat packing industry has been spectacular. The 10-year period just past has featured a change to self - service meat retailing, with consumer-size packages being an increasing requirement of packers ...

"Progress, however, frequently reates new problems. The Texas A&M College system desires to assist meat processors of Texas in solving these problems. Discussion with others engaged in the same business frequently will uncover

"Who's driving?"

"We could report and discuss some of the results in our meats research, and you could help us plan improvements in our meats teaching, research and extension to make these activities more beneficial to you. We wish to give the taxpayers a good profit for their investment in our modern meat processing facilities."







> The American Foundation for Animal Health reports that prompt application of control measures at this time of the year should greatly reduce the losses caused by these parasites and will help protect the herd during the winter months ahead.

> Lice not only cause damage to the skin and hair coat of cattle, but may also be responsible for serious anemia. In fact, the Foundation says that such severe infestations may result in death of young animals. Certain blood sucking cattle lice may serve as vectors (transmitters) of several cattle diseases.

> All cattle and their quarters should be sprayed with a recommemded insecticide, mixed according to directions of the manufac-


