## POLICE DISPELL SEATTLE STRIKERS WITH GAS

### SAN FRANCISCO AND PORTLAND ARE PEACEFUL

Minneapolis Trucks Move Under Heavily Armed Police Convoys.

SEATTLE, Wash., July 20.—An organized police offense directed against pickets by Mayor Charles Smith broke the longshoremen's picket line at Pier 41 today. When the strikers refused to leave their posts police swung into action with gas bombs. Strikers were unable to hold their old lines and many sought refuge in nearby hills. Three strikers and three patrolmen were injured seriously enough to receive hospital treatment while many were gassed.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 20.—Labor, although incensed at Governor Meier's mobilization of 1,000 national guardsmen for possible duty on Portland's waterfront, will not call an immediate general strike.

After issuing a statement criticizing the governor's action labor's strategy committee today renewed its promise to Senator Robert Wagner to give him a chance to attempt a peaceful settlement before proceeding with a general strike.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 20.—An estimated 150,000 men and women went back to work today after four days of general strike which paralyzed the San Francisco bay area.

Half of them were union members who returned to work in answer to orders of their leaders calling off the strike. The others were workers who were forced into idleness through closing of business.

There remained the teamsters, the carmen's and the maritime strike, yet to be settled.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., July 20.—Movement of trucks under convoys of police and preparations for meetings of 25,000 union members gave an ominous turn today to the strike of truck drivers, which has lasted four days.

Union leaders accused the chief of police with abetting truck operators and renewed threats of a general strike.

### Jurors Still Have Gate Rate Case Under Discussion

AUSTIN, July 20.—Jurors returned today to the problem of determining whether a city gate rate of 32 cents per 1,000 cubic feet, ordered for the Lone Star Gas company by the state railroad commission, is fair and reasonable. Rates are based on the value of the utilities properties. In attempting to reach a verdict jurors called for statistics on evaluation schedules, then returned to the jury room in 43rd district court.

### State Pays Bill For Foolish Call

AUSTIN.—How many employees of a private institution could survive an incident that occurred last week in a state department is doubtful. The department head received a long distance telephone call collecting from a traveling representative of the department. When he answered, accepting the charges, the employee at Fort Worth said his pay check had not been received and, further, that he had not received a reply to an inquiry about beginning his vacation.

"Is this all you put in a long distance call for?" asked the department head, disgustedly. "Your check was mailed last night. Your vacation does not start for four days, so what's the rush?"

### J. T. Baker's Name Is Given Back By Court Order

DALLAS, July 20.—Jefferson T. Baker, who by process of law became George B. Terrill, long a figure in Texas politics, filed a suit alleging Baker was attempting to defraud him for political purposes by use of the Terrill name.

### Chicago Has Lamplighters Still

CHICAGO.—"Larry, the lamplighter," familiar figure of the gay '90's, isn't a thing of the past. Only a few miles away from the ultra-modern electrical displays at a Century of Progress and even closer to the brilliantly illuminated loop Chicago has 575 gas-line lamps and 4,897 gas lamps, necessitating the employment of a score of 1934 "Larrys."

Scanty funds, according to William A. Jackson, who is in charge of the city's electrical bureau, is the reason for maintaining the lamps.

"I would like to replace them," he said, "but for this purpose have only a \$5,000 appropriation in the 1934 budget. That would give about one new light to each of the 50 wards."

"Until tax collections are normal it is likely that we'll continue to have gasline lamps." Each of the gas lamps has a pilot light and is controlled by an automatic time switch. But for the gasline lamps it is necessary to employ about 20 men, who travel about before dark with a ladder and a torch to light them—just like the original Larry had to do. Quite a few of the modern lamplighters, however, make their rounds in automobiles—something the Larry of the '90's merely dreamed about.

### 283 Drowned In Texas Last Year

AUSTIN.—The waters of Texas swimming pools, lakes and streams claimed 283 deaths last year, according to the bureau of vital statistics of the state health department.

The months of May, June, July and August represent the "open season" for drownings. Sixty per cent of the total deaths by drownings occur during those four months, the record disclosed.

Dr. John W. Brown, state health officer, has noted an increase of 38 per cent in the number of drownings in Texas during the past five years, as compared with the preceding five-year period. His department has sent out memorandums detailing the accepted method of restoring respiration in water-filled lungs.

Despite the increase noted over the five-year period, the 1933 total was less than the 338 drownings in Texas during the preceding year.

Drowning is only one of 200 ways in which a human being may die. That number of causes of death is listed internationally in bulletins issued by the U. S. bureau of census.

### Officers Take Prize; Not In Contest

EL PASO.—American customs officers received a bottle of champagne presented at a Juarez cabaret as a prize.

The prize was awarded originally, however, not to the officers, but to a young woman who attempted to smuggle it across the international bridge.

The officers took the bottle despite the young woman's protest that she intended not to drink the liquor but to keep it merely as a souvenir.

### BAKER REPORT ON AIR FORCES IS COMPLETED

WASHINGTON, July 20.—The long awaited Baker report on the U. S. air forces today was said to oppose a unified independent command of the services, distinct from the present branches of the service.

The report had been submitted to acting secretary of war Harry Woodring. It has also been distributed confidentially to high officials of the war department. It will be made public Monday.

Contrary to expectations, the report was understood to contain no criticism of the present military aviation setup. It praised it as the most efficient in the world.

### Candidates For Governor Spend Many Thousands

AUSTIN, July 20.—Candidates for governor already have spent \$35,843, according to expense accounts filed today.

Attorney General James V. Allred reported the largest expenditure, \$5,969. Close behind were Senator Clint Small, \$5,916; Maury Hughes, \$5,853; Lieutenant Governor Witt, \$5,834; C. C. McDonald, \$5,713. Tom Hunter reported a total expense of \$4,782. The smallest expense was reported by E. K. Russell, \$1,824. He withdrew from the race yesterday.

### R.F.C. Showed a Profit For Year

WASHINGTON, July 20.—The R.F.C., the government's principal relief organization, today announced a net profit of \$21,784.386 for the year ending June 30, 1934.

Chairman Jesse H. Jones, pointing out the R.F.C. did a \$3,000,000 annual business for the first time, heralded rapid repayment of loans by railroads and private business a definite step toward recovery.

### Vet's Bicycle Gave Way to \$17 Car

LEWISTON, Idaho.—You've got to keep up with the times so Spanish War Vet Elmer J. Burnett sold his bicycle and bought a 1922 Ford.

He was getting too old to pump the bicycle up and down Idaho's hills. He sold the two wheels and frame, sprocket chain and all, for \$17 and paid \$15 for the car.

### GUNMAN GETS PRISONER OUT OF ARMY POST

NEW YORK, July 20.—A gunman rode over to the Governor's Island military reservation in New York harbor today, held up eight soldiers and escaped with Melvin Blanton of Camden, Ohio, a long term prisoner known in army circles as a "bad actor."

The island is the headquarters for the second corps area of the U. S. Army and the entire 16th Infantry is stationed there. Nearby were many boats in the harbor.

Disregarding these hazards the gunman beached his boat and stroled over to a sentry.

"Drop your gun or you'll get hurt," he said in conversational tones.

### Eastland Youth Registered In S. M.U. Drama School

The following news item is taken from a recent issue of the Dallas Times-Herald:

One of the most promising and certainly one of the most interested of the 48 students registered for the first semester of the Southern Methodist university drama school at the Dallas Little theater is a boy from Eastland, aged 10.

Undaunted by the fact that the entire school, with the exception of himself, is made up of adults (in many cases highly trained and sophisticated adults), Woods Butler Jr., insists on studying "everything you've got."

The mother of the boy wrote the school prior to his enrollment, asking for particulars regarding the curriculum and the possibilities for her child. Before she had time to receive an answer she and the little boy came to the Dallas Little theater, saying that they had taken an apartment in Dallas for the summer and wished the child to enroll in the diction and acting classes.

They had a number of little plays that the boy had written for production among his school friends, and showed newspaper clippings of his triumphs on the stage.

Special arrangements were made for the youngster's instruction by Miss Mary McCord, head of the department of speech or Southern Methodist university, who is a member of the faculty of the drama school.

One of the classes which has shown the steadiest growth is the evening class for business people conducted by Charles Meredith. It started out with eight registrants and now has 15. Many other professional men and women have signified their intention of enrolling for the second semester, which begins July 22.

### First Rehearsal Of Band to Be On Thursday Night

First rehearsal of the Eastland Fireman band was announced for next Thursday night at the city hall by A. J. Campbell, director, during the joint fireman and band meeting Thursday night.

Forty of the 60 persons who have signified their intention of becoming members in the band have instruments, Campbell says, and the remaining 20 are taking steps to obtain instruments.

### Old Timer Perished With First Mistake

PARK CITY, Utah.—They buried the "Old Timer" of Weber River the other day.

He swam his foaming waters for 11 years and never made a mistake. His first one finished him. It was mistaking a No. 10 GINGER-quill dry fly for a tasty morsel of fish food. The fly was tied to the end of a four and one-half tapered leader. Roy Wilson was holding the pole.

The fish battled for half an hour but Wilson dragged him to shore. He weighed 16 1/2 pounds and angling experts said he was a German brown trout.

### RECORD HIGH TEMPERATURE ARE RECORDED

KANSAS CITY, July 20.—The death toll from the heat in the southwest continued to mount today as the mercury pushed past the 100 degree mark after establishing new July records yesterday.

Since Monday, 18 have died here of causes traceable to the heat. Two new victims were reported today.

Yesterday was the hottest July day ever recorded here and the second hottest ever experienced. The temperature rose to 107 degrees at the weather bureau and 109 at the airport.

Similar temperatures included Peoria, Kansas, 118; Nowata, Okla., 115; Mexico, Mo., 114.

### Three Men Die In a Collision

HOUSTON, July 20.—Three men were dead today and a woman was injured critically as the result of a head-on collision between an automobile and a grain truck on the Conroe highway, 26 miles north of here last night.

The two machines burst into flames when the crash occurred. The dead were M. A. Kornblatt, 35, manager of a Houston sewing machine agency, and two unidentified men believed to have been occupants of the truck.

Mrs. Mae Elmore, 34, an occupant of the automobile, suffered internal injuries.

### Lupe Velez Divorce Suit Withdrawn

LOS ANGELES, July 20.—The divorce suit of Lupe Velez against Johnny Weissmuller, film Tarzan, was dismissed today on motion of the actress' attorney.

Superior Judge Robert Kenny placed the suit off the calendar without comment but it was known the Mexican actress and her former swimming champion husband again had effected one of their many so-called reconciliations. The suit, filed last week, charged cruelty.

### LANGER WILL FIGHT AGAINST IMPEACHMENT

BISMARCK, N. D., July 20.—Close friends of William H. Langer, deposed for the moment as governor of North Dakota, intimated today they would ask the legislature to impeach Acting Governor Ollie Olson, four justices of the supreme court and other high state officers.

Langer will address the special session this afternoon. He is known to exercise some measure of political control over a majority of both houses. He was preparing in the seclusion of a river cabin a speech expected to demand impeachment of Olson and all of his followers.

Several hundred farmers milled through the town shouting threats against the four justices, who, in ruling Langer, under conviction for a penal felony, was disqualified to continue in office, first caused him to declare martial law to maintain his status and then yield temporarily to Lt. Gov. Olson.

### Cattle Prices at New Low Figures

KANSAS CITY, July 20.—Pens at the Kansas City stock yards today were glutted with cattle, dumped on a depressed market by stockmen unable, because of the drought, to give them water and feed.

As a result stocker cattle prices dropped to the lowest figures in many years. A farmer brought three cows to the stockyards today and sold them for 50 cents a 100 pounds, received \$3.50 a head.

Livestock commission men issued warnings about the serious situation and urged stockmen to hold their cattle to a minimum.

### Oil Company to Add to Building

HOUSTON, July 20.—Humble Oil & Refining company has made a scoffing gesture at bad business years in the form of a \$1,000,000 addition to their office building.

The 16-story addition, a skyscraper for Houston since the Sterling building, with its 29 stories, was completed in Oct. 1930.

Huge steel girders and braces were being riveted together and other steel parts of the framework were being swung about like straws this week.

The building will be joined by the Humble building, which now covers more ground space than any other major building in Houston.

Construction of the building was announced in January at about the same time the Humble company declared \$20,000,000 in undivided profits for the year 1933.

### Court Reporter Takes 200,000,000 Words

#### TEXAS TAX TOTAL TO U. S. DOUBLED

Texans are interested in tax payments to the federal government for the fiscal year 1934, ended June 30 as for the fiscal year 1933. According to figures made public by the bureau of internal revenue Texans paid the federal government almost twice as much in taxes as for the previous fiscal year. These are the figures: Texas totaled \$60,591,954 as compared with \$34,167,496 for 1933. According to the report a large part of the \$25,333,458 increase is attributed to better business generally but New Deal taxes collected during 1934 under the agricultural adjustment act accounted for \$10,070,720. Farmers in Texas, however, received about five times this amount in AAA rentals and benefit payments, the total being \$49,040,156 up to May 31. General increases in income tax receipts from Texas and other states reflected a much greater national income in 1934 than in 1933.

Figures tell the story. As for the farmer, he has ceased to be "the forgotten man"—since the coming of the New Deal civilization.

#### GRAIN CROPS HIT A NEW LOW LEVEL

Wheat farmers of the United States will harvest only 483,662,000 bushels this year. Last year's crop totaled 527,413,000 bushels, and was the smallest since 1894. Corn crop for this year will approximate 2,138,137,000 bushels, compared to 2,330,237,000 bushels in 1933. An oat crop of 567,839,000 bushels is indicated by the July 1 condition of the crop. It would be smallest since 1893. Approximately 7,900,000 tons of sugar beets will be harvested, compared with 11,085,000 tons in 1933. The department of agriculture predicted a tobacco crop of 1,140,000,000 pounds compared with 1,396,000,000 last year.

Drouths are expensive, to say the least. There is a way to guard against them. Storage of flood waters in vast reservoirs or lakes will come some day. And in their coming the blight caused by the drouth will be banished. Now Washington predicts that some farm land that was taken out of production by the AAA is going back to work again when another planting season rolls around again. There is a reason why. First, the report predicting one of the smallest wheat crops on record and correspondingly small fed crops. Another report showing the smallest cultivated acreage of cotton since 1905.

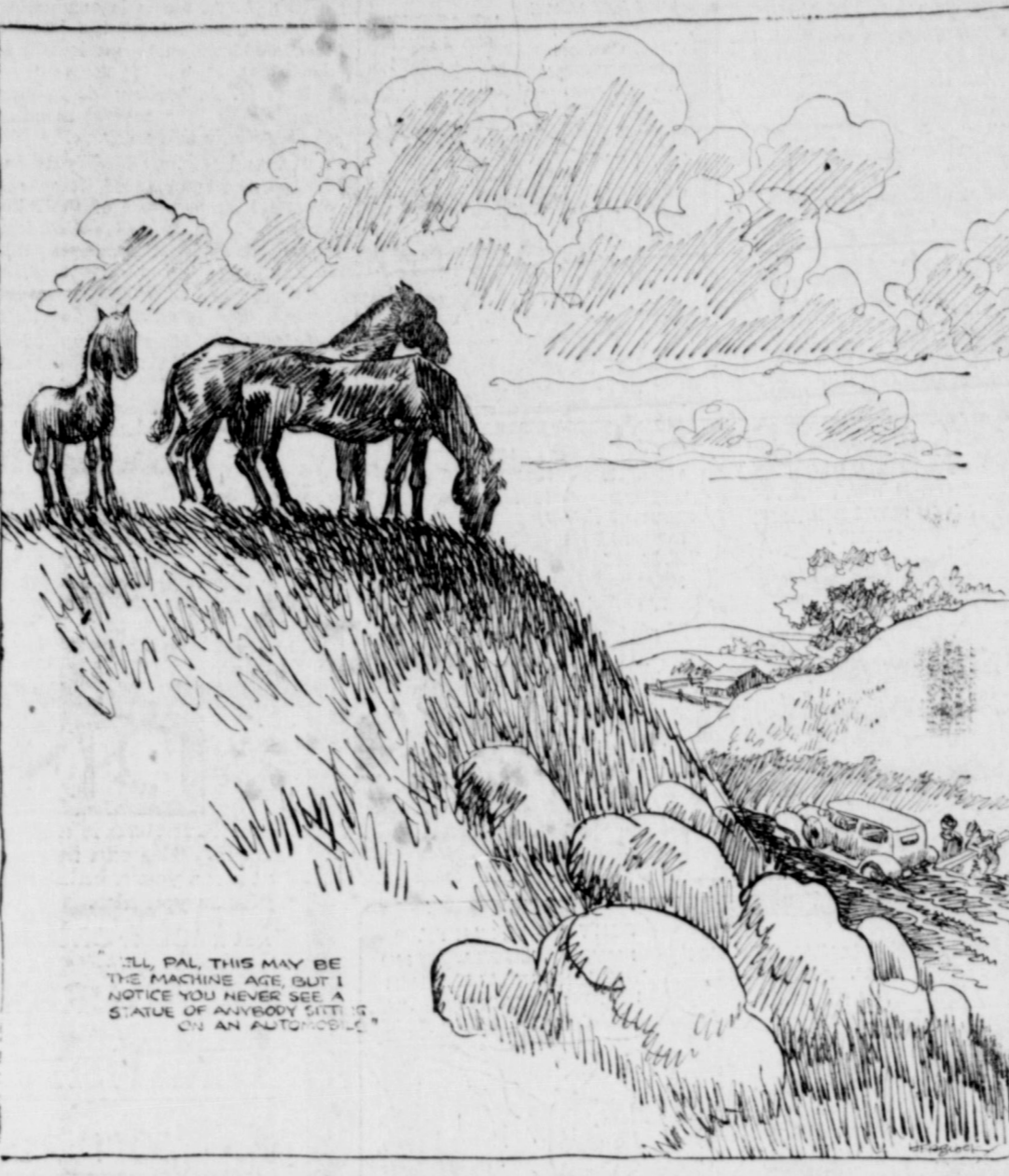

Regulation Upon Cotton Allotments Are Pointed Out

Under provisions of the Bankhead act each farmer who produced cotton before 1934 and has cotton growing on farm at present is entitled to exemption certificate on number of pounds of cotton allotted to his farm. This allotment is based on approximately 60 per cent of the five-year average from 1928 to 1932. If no cotton was grown on farm during base period 1928 to 1932 and none in 1933 there will be no allotment made for farm by the county committee. Such applications will be sent direct to state board for action. If any allotment is made it will not be taken from county allotment.

Every cotton farmer that does not have a contract with government must, with aid of community committee, give his yearly production on each farm. He should have this information ready to list in application for allotment and tax exemption certificates, which statements will be under oath. Producers who have signed contracts will be under oath as to correctness of statements presented in the former contract; however, they have the privilege of correcting figures before taking oath. These applications will be in the hands of local committees in near future and will be filled out in community centers designated by committee. This application must be filled out in order to sell any cotton tax free.

If there is less cotton produced on farm than amount of tax exemption certificate issued to this farm, the holder of such certificate will be allowed to sell them through the county office at a price set by the government. The privilege of selling these certificates is equal to crop insurance. If there is more cotton produced on this farm than allotment given, the owner of said cotton must either buy exemption certificate of pay tax to government when cotton is sold. Regardless of how long cotton is held either as seed cotton or lint cotton, the U. S. government will still hold a lien on it to the amount of the tax at the time it was harvested or ginned. Any person attempting to evade this tax is liable to heavy penalty.

All allotments, contracts and exemption certificates are handled by U. S. agricultural department. Tax collections are handled by U. S. internal revenue department. All farmers will be notified of

meetings that will be held at different communities in the county. At these meetings the provisions of the Bankhead act and program arranged by county cotton production control association will be more thoroughly explained. Every

cotton producer, whether contract signer or not, should be present at one of these meetings.

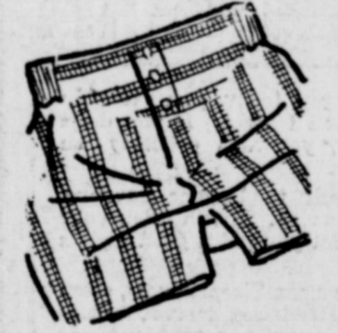

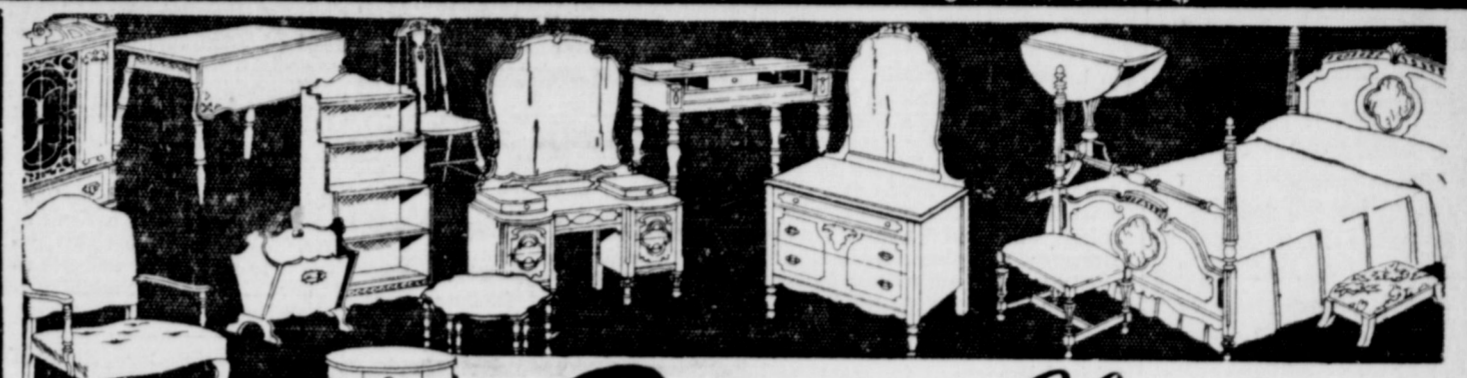
