oner. Lehman signed the warrant at once, and in accordance with regular procedure, the extradition case went to the courts, under habeas corpus proceedings brought by Attorney Fawcett.

Extradition proceedings differ from an ordinary trial. The burden of proof, in such cases, rests upon the defendant to show that he could not have been in the accusing State at the time of the crime with which he is charged.

Anna Hauptmann testified that "if March 1, 1932, were a Tuesday then I am certain he called for me at Christianson's bakery that evening. He always called for me on Tuesday evenings." Her statement was borne out in part by Mr. and Mrs. Frederick Christianson, her employers, although neither of those witnesses was willing to say, definitely and positively, that

Hauptmann actually did call for his wife on the fateful night.

Handwriting Expert Perhaps the most important testimony at the extradition hearing was that of Albert S. Osborn, world-famous handwriting expert.

Osborn swore that the ransom notes, including the original message left in the crib at Hopewell and the subsequent letters received by Dr. John F. Condon, were all written by the same hand.

The State of New Jersey asked, through Attorney General David T. Wilentz, whether it could logically be held that the man who wrote the Jafie letters had actually been at the scene of the kidnaping.

"The writer of the second ransom note," Wilentz pointed out, "admitted there in that he had been in Hopewell on that night when he said 'we left a ransom note in the crib.' How could he have known about the first ransom note unless he had participated in the crime?"

Heavy Guard for Transfer Hauptmann's extradition was ordered and on Oct. 19, he was taken under heavy guard to the model jail behind the century-old courthouse in Flemington, the Hunterdon County seat.

Five days later, the German ex-

machine gunner was arraigned formally and pleaded not guilty to them under indictment. He appeared, at that time, to be a strange combination of stoicism and apathy. Reports from the office of Sheriff John H. Curtiss—whose double-s at the end of his name differentiated him from John H. Curtiss of Norfolk—were that Hauptmann showed a healthy appetite, a fondness for heavy cigars, and a passion for reading.

Anna Hauptmann and her baby, Manfred, moved to Hopewell and took up a residence in a cottage, to be near the man to whom throughout the case, she remained utterly loyal.

Quick Trial Fought James M. Fawcett fought successfully against the State's proposal to rush Hauptmann to trial. Wilentz had asked for an immediate hearing, with the actual trial to begin on Nov. 7. The defense objected that it would have insufficient time to prepare a defense, and won a delay until Jan. 2.

Alienists, both for the State and the defense, peered into Hauptmann's eyes, examined his reflexes, threw questions at him, and emerged to declare, in their opinion, that he was sane.

"He is one of the coolest prisoners we ever had here," said the

sheriff. "He sleeps well, every night." As he slept, however—and all through his waking hours—Hauptmann was guarded by a small squad of State Police. The authorities took no chances with one who had twice escaped from the clutches of the German police.

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

1935 Fords Placed On Display At Connellee Hotel

Hundreds of people flocked to the lobby of the Connellee hotel Saturday to get first-hand information and an eye-view of the new 1935 Ford V-8 which will be displayed there during the next few days. This display was made possible in Eastland through the operation of the Nance Motor company of Cisco and Mr. J. T. Watson, zone manager of the Dallas district. The model on display is the de luxe coupe.

Mr. Watson states that in the near future that a permanent dealer will be named for Eastland and one of the best Ford dealers' quarters will be installed with complete parts and garage service available.

Most striking feature of the new car is body lines which are distinctly modern and a definite departure from any previous Ford design.

The new car also embodies combination of major engineering developments aimed at increased comfort—which has been called the "center-poise" ride.

Numerous improvements in chassis design to provide increased control also are included.

Two important improvements have been made in the Ford V-8 engine, of which more than 1,300,000 are now on the road.

In addition Ford has developed a new type of body—the touring sedan, with unusually sleek lines and embodying a fitted rear trunk compartment integral with body.

Safety glass is standard equipment not only in windshields, but also in all doors and windows.

In appearance, the new cars are characterized by a fresh new conception utilizing flowing curves to carry out the modern motif, a new treatment of interior appointments which sound an entirely new note in Ford body styling.

The engineering advances in engine and chassis are comparable in importance. Principal among these is the new "ride" effect—the new spring suspension system, proper car weight balance and passenger weight distribution and location of the passenger closer to the center of the car—so that the ride between the wheels.

Bodies are materially wider. Slanting vertical louvers with horizontal stainless steel beading combined to form an attractive hood-side adornment. The radiator ornament is fixed in position, radiator filler cap being under hood.

Better Brakes Are Ford V-8 Feature

Entirely new brakes, of time-tested Ford mechanical design which provide more effective braking control—with less pressure—are an important feature of the new Ford V-8 for 1935 now on display at showrooms of local Ford dealer.

Design of the new brake greatly simplified, with less wearing parts. They are of self-centering type, the brake automatically assuming the effective position within the drum to provide quickest and effective deceleration when pressure is applied to the pedal.

A "floating wedge" is part of the new design. This aids in equalizing the pressure applied to two brake shoes and by the hub. The fundamental principle of the brake mechanism is also equal distribution of force to each of the four wheels. Location of the levers provides a straight pull on the rods, reducing the effort needed for operation.

To provide more powerful braking effort, the linings of each are shorter and the shoes permitting full utilization of available brake lining surface. Effectiveness is also increased by larger area of contact provided by the new larger tires.

Tendency of the drums to warp from heating resulting from frequent use of the brakes is prevented by use of additional lining which expands the area by 40 per cent.

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
