#### SECY. ICKES HAS HIS SAY

Secy. Harold Ickes had his say Tuesday on the proposition that the federal government should control the oil industry down to the last well and the last royalty-right.

"The difficulty is Texas and has been Texas," the square-jawed federal officer told the Cole investigating committee. "In spite of the Texas state laws, producers there are bootlegging oil out of the state. The man willing to steal his neighbor's oil is willing to find a way to market it and will be able to find 'fences' to take that oil."

Artfully he suggested that he had tried to cooperate with Texas enforcement agencies and leave the impression the Texas railroad commission has not cooperated with him. This essentially is a straddle, with a prayer that the committee not know too much about the Texas situation.





Sails unfurled, but with atrusty marine engine below deck for emergency, the ketch will slip from the harbor soon for San Francisco, first leg of the globegirdling adventure. At the wheel will be Dwight Long and Jack Lowry, 20-year-old University of Washington students.

"I've studied navigation in my spare time and I think we'll get by all right," said Lowry.

"We'll sail first to San Francisco," explained Long, owner of the craft. "Then we may go south some distance before turning west, but our next definite destination will be Honolulu

The craft, "Idle Hour," has had plenty of brine washed along her beam. Built in Tacoma 11 years ago, the ketch was in iservice in Arctic and Alaskan waters. It grosses twelve tons and has space for 60 gallons of gasoline for the auxiliary motor.


