Any door prize

Awards such as for winning an essay contest  
Incentive awards, prizes or bonuses from employers.  
The impact of taxes is pointedly illustrated by the current television program, the \$64,000 Question. Uncle Sam is the real winner, since he will keep \$36,200, leaving only \$27,800 for the contestant.  
The result is simple and unpleasant. Your entire winnings in anything that even remotely resembles a contest are taxable. As with other income, the more you win, the greater the share that goes for taxes. Before you spend your prize or award, you should set aside enough for the taxes.  
You should remember that all such winnings must be reported as taxable income. (The tax collector usually knows who the winners are.) Winnings or prizes are taxable even if all you did to win was as simple as answering the telephone and finding yourself given money.  
Congress tightened up the law to specify that all such financial or property gains are taxable, except as they meet three rules:  
(a) The award was given for achievements in the fields of religion, science, education, art, literature, charitable services, or civic affairs, and;  
(b) The winner was selected without any action on his part, and  
(c) He will not have to perform any substantial future work in

order to win the prize.  
Awards such as the Nobel prize, where there is no contest, qualify, but any aspect of a contest nullifies the exemption.  
If the prize is in property, such as an automobile, instead of cash, your tax is based on the fair market value of the property at the time you win it.

### TV Spiels Take Much More Time Than Imagined

HOLLYWOOD — Those filmed commercials may look like easy jobs knocked off in an hour before a camera, but they're the unsung "spectaculars" of TV.  
Filmed spiels for cigarettes, beer or what have you take up only an instant on the screen, often when the viewer is snatching a drink of water or letting the cat in.  
But he's ignoring a production that makes a small fortune announcing them, comes close to perfection.  
Bill Edwards, for example, announces one filmed commercial for a hair spray lacquer.  
That commercial that zips by between programs took from 7 p. m. to 2:30 a.m. to shoot. Edwards had to keep his peace-by smile on all that time while agency executives argued about the script.  
Naturally on those filmed commercials, the products always work.  
In Edward's hair spray film you see a girl with a half of her head lacquered and the other half plain.  
Bill turns a wind machine and a bucket of water on her locks but the lacquered half stays in place.  
"Well, her head had so much spray on it, it would have taken a pick axe to move it," grinned Edwards in an interview. "We had to do several takes and she was sprayed for each one."

### Meat Prices To Rise During 1957

WASHINGTON — The Agriculture Department says there will be slightly less meat available in 1957. It will sell at higher prices than in 1956.  
"Hog slaughter specially will be less than in 1956," the department said. "Fully as many cattle likely will be slaughtered as in 1956, but average carcass weights may be enough lighter to pull down the total output of beef to some extent."  
"Prices for hogs will be higher than in 1956. Those for cattle are expected at least to stay above their lowest points of 1956 and may average slightly above that year. With little change in slaughter in prospect, prices for sheep and lambs also might average slightly higher in 1957."

### Color Candles For Christmas

Colored candles of your own making will add colorful warmth to your holiday table and mantel. All-purpose dye gives soft, muted colors to household wax you can mold yourself in shapes you prefer.  
Use one to two teaspoons of dye for each pound of paraffin, suggests the December issue of Better Homes & Gardens magazine. One and three-quarter pounds of paraffin melt to make a quart. Milk and cheese cartons, juice concentrate cans, and gelatin molds are all suitable shapes for candles.  
The wick should be inserted first. Run a string through a hole you punch in the center of the bottom of the mold. Knot it on the underside, wrap it around a pencil, and secure across the mold top.  
Melt paraffin in a metal can set in a pan of hot water, then stir in the dye. Remove from heat and stir thoroughly three to five minutes. Don't be concerned about dye residue that remains in the bottom, the magazine says.  
On the underside of the mold, wax-seal the hole through which the string wick goes and let it harden. Then pour colored wax into the mold very slowly. Let it harden about 12 hours before removing from the mold. Use whipped wax for topping suggests the magazine.

### Staten Island Has Old Schoolhouse

NEW YORK — What is believed to be the oldest elementary school building in the United States is located on Staten Island.  
The building, restored in 1939 by the Staten Island Historical Society, is known as the Voorlezer's House. Voorlezer is a title the Dutch applied to a layman chosen to teach school and conduct limited church services in communities unable to support a regular minister.  
It is not known exactly when the two-story clapboard building was built, but the first mention of the structure in recorded history appears in a deed dated 1696.

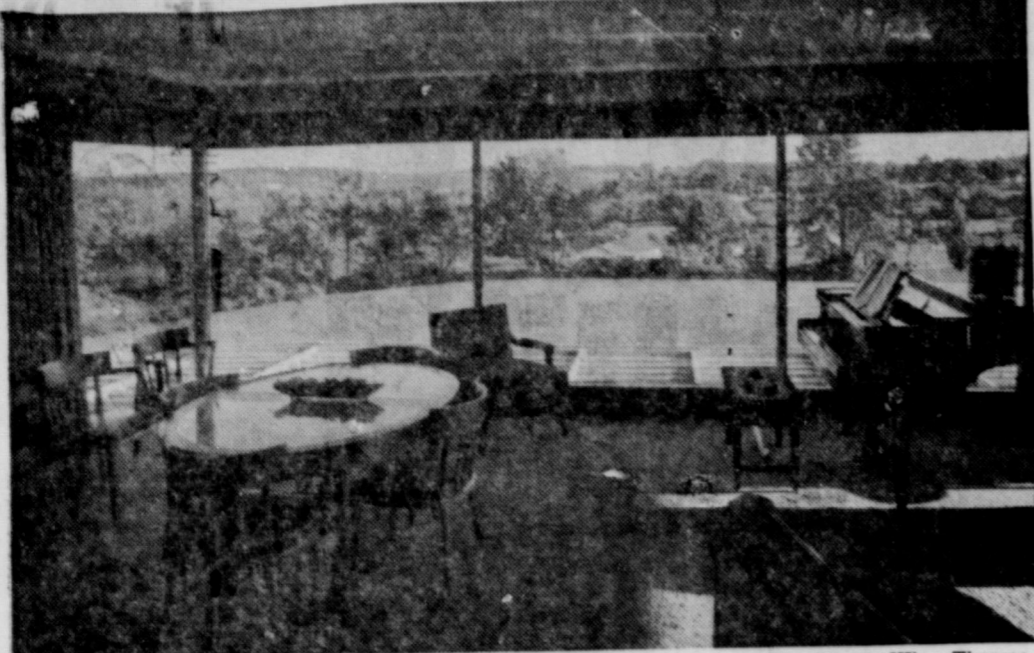

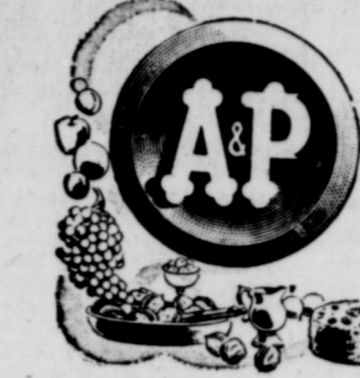
The meeting closed with the Christian Women's Fellowship benediction.

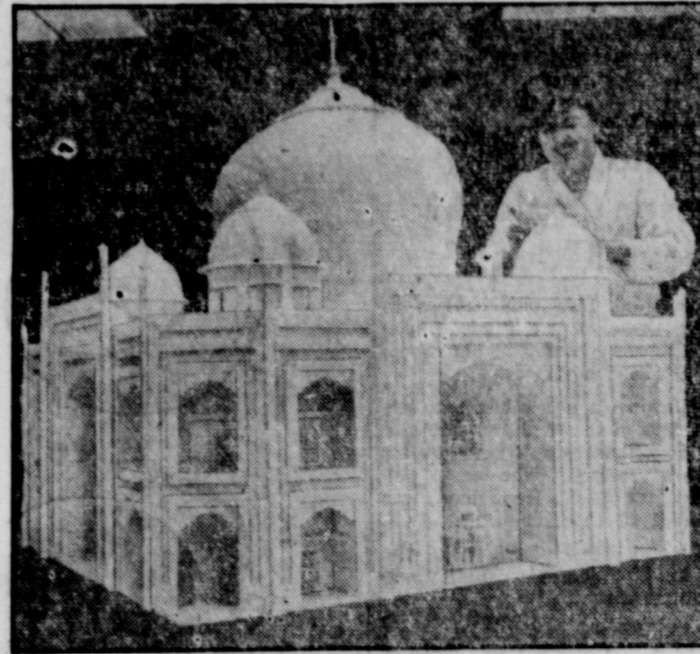

### Winter Care Of Evergreens

Evergreens can go through the winter undamaged if you anticipate the weather extremes and prepare for them in advance.

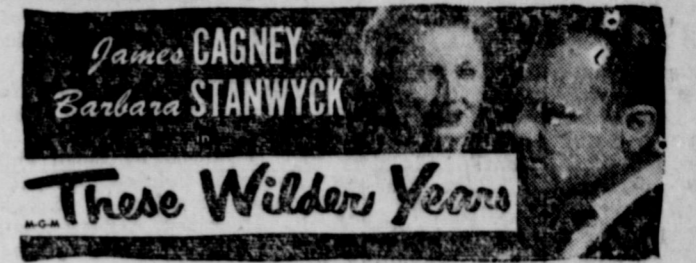
The two most common types of damage are winter burn, a drought damage, and mechanical damage by ice, snow, and wind.

Evergreens are winter burned when their needles lose moisture faster than their roots can replace

it. To prevent this, thoroughly soak the root zone of your evergreens as late in the winter as possible. Mulch the plants to prevent unnecessary water loss, and screen younger plants from drying winds with temporary screens.

Strong stakes tied to the central stems of upright evergreens will keep them from snapping under the weight of snow and ice, the magazine advises. When snow comes, brush it off the plants while it is still dry and loose.

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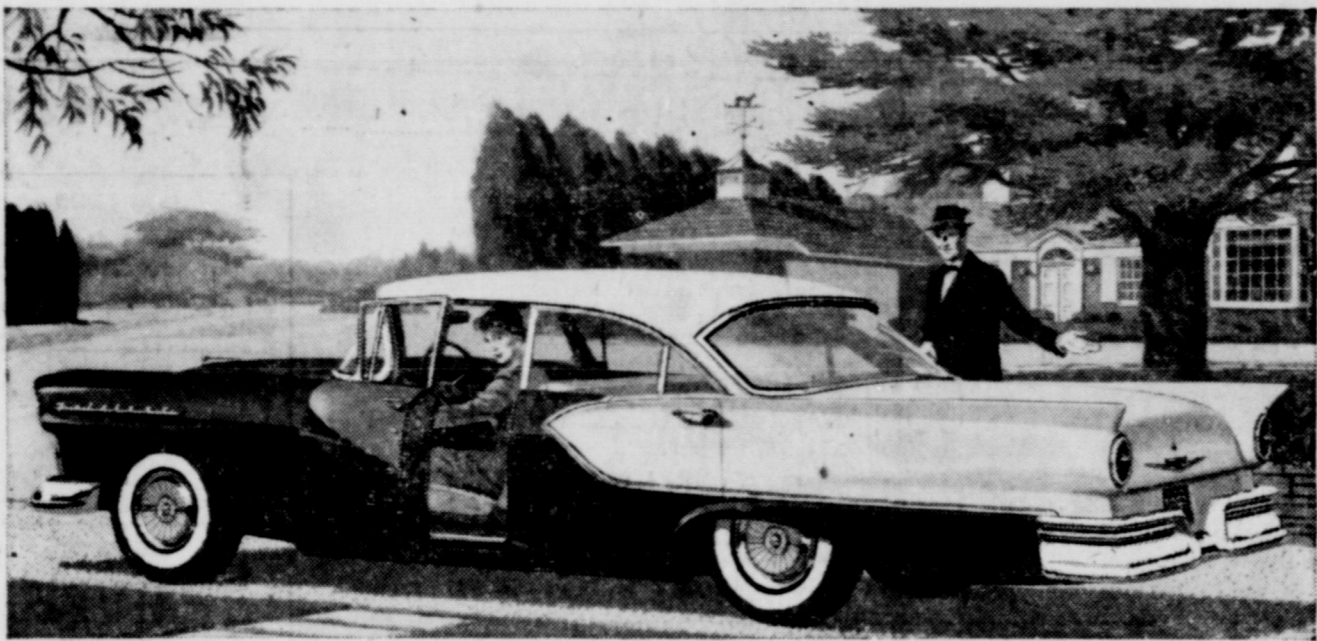
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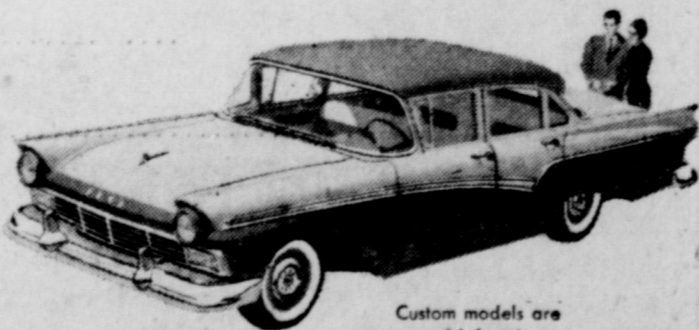
